

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

CATHOLICS AND THE BIBLE



pope Francis recently designated the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time as Word of God Sunday. The Catholic Church draws from two forms of Revelation:

Sacred Tradition and Sacred Scripture. The pope desires to raise awareness of and reflection upon the Holy Word. The Church is the steward

of Scripture. She gave us the canon (the list of accepted books in the Bible). The Mass is saturated with Scripture from beginning to end. As Catholics, we encounter more Scripture on Sunday than any other Christian denomination.

Despite all this Catholics sometimes lack familiarity with the Word of God. No matter your level of understanding, this should never be the case.

"IGNORANCE OF THE SCRIPTURES IS IGNORANCE OF CHRIST."

St. Jerome has written "Ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ." The Gospel of John provides great insight into this truth: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God... And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us..." (John 1:1, 14). This truth informs us that Christ is

present in the written word throughout the Bible! These verses describe the Incarnation of Christ, where Jesus is fully divine, fully human, and without sin.

There is another connection between the Incarnation and Scripture. We believe that the Scriptures have both God and man as their author,


and as such are inspired and inerrant. We trust that the human authors were guided by the Holy Spirit. Human beings put stylus to papyri, but it was God guiding the message (cf. 2 Peter 1:20-21). The result is that the Scriptures inspired — literally "Godbreathed" (2 Timothy 3:16). As a result, the Word of God has a character, quality, and

dynamism that transcends merely human words. God's Word is convicting, redeeming, and transformative.

Lastly, the Scriptures require proper interpretation and the Magisterium is uniquely authorized in this capacity.

If we want to know Christ intimately, we need to pray daily with the Scriptures, such as through *lectio divina*. We need to probe the depths of Scripture with the aid of commentaries, guidebooks, or instruction. God wants to encounter us daily in the Word, to encourage, guide, and transform us.

Find your Bible, blow off the dust, and open it. Christ awaits!
