



Life changing impact!

When students connect across borders, they grow in ways that last a lifetime. Seton Catholic High School's graduating class of 2021, many of whom are in the workforce or recent college graduates moving on to the next chapter, are examples of this. In 2017, when they were 8th graders in Dan Reichley's homeroom class, they contacted the Unbound organization. They were first partnered with a student from Guatemala, then partnered with Luisa, a 14-year-old student from Mexico.



Luisa and her family received financial support from Mr. Reichley's class for education and other needs. At the time Luisa, a student just like our SCHS students, dreamt of becoming an engineer or doctor so someday she could help take care of her family and community.

The sponsorship connected Luisa and the Class of 2021 across geographic, economic and social boundaries and fostered the development of a unique relationship.

One of the most rewarding aspects of sponsorship is writing to your sponsored friend. The class of 2021 and Luisa got to know each other over the years by exchanging letters and photos written back and forth, learning about each other's lives, and exploring global issues together.

Jonah Falcone recalls the sponsorship of Luisa being a big part of the class of 2021. "One of the many memories I have of Mr. Reichley is when he would announce at the beginning of class that we had received a new letter from Luisa. It would often detail her most recent high moments, as well as what she was struggling with. The letters always conveyed the immense amount of gratitude she had for our class's donations and prayers. They continue to serve as such a powerful reminder of how blessed I am to have such a supportive family and to have attended Seton Catholic."

In her letters Luisa shared details about school work and life, all of her birthdays, especially turning 18, and choosing to pursue nursing. She also opened up about how the COVID-19 pandemic impacted her and her family. Since the Class of 2021's graduation, students from other classes have continued the sponsorship over the last four years. Luisa recently graduated from nursing school and in her last letter dated December 2024 to Mr. Reichley's class she said: To [my sponsor Seton Class of 2021] "There are truly no words to express everything I feel right now, and I can only say that things will go very well for you in life. There are not many people like you, and just as you gave without receiving anything in return, God will multiply it for you. My best wishes and blessings to each one of you."



Once a sponsored child leaves the Unbound program, the sponsor is offered another opportunity to support another child. The Class of 2028 will carry on this act of kindness by sponsoring a girl named Merlin, from El Salvador.

What's missing these days in our ever-changing world?

V-I-R-T-U-E!

While many of us learned our ABCs & 123s at school, virtues were not necessarily taught in the classroom. It seems they were learned more through examples of virtuous people in our lives. Most of us can think of individuals that stand out like shining stars! Perhaps a great-grandmother, or a kind neighbor comes to mind, or maybe even Jesus, Mary & Joseph because they've left a wonderful model to follow...

Like pilgrims on a journey, this world is not our home...We are headed to Heaven, we hope! It is good to remember that we are fearfully and wonderfully made (Psalm 139:14). God loves us as we are, but calls us deeper to love like He loves. He promises us a heavenly crown based on our upstanding actions here on earth. Pope Francis concurred when he said, "Holiness isn't reserved for a select few, but is a calling for each one of us."

So, how can you personally grow in virtues if you don't really know what they are? And how can you pass them on to your children? Great question! The answer is simple: Look

them up and start practicing one and then another...no one will do "them" perfectly, but over time and with God's grace, we will become more and more like our Heavenly Father.

Nationally known Catholic speaker, Dr. Edward Sri says, "The good news is that it is never too late to get started. Whether we are seventeen or forty-seven years old, we can still play catchup and form our minds with the correct vision for a virtuous life. And that's the first step for growing in virtues: educating ourselves about them (see CCC 1810). The more we learn about the virtues, the clearer picture we will have for what we want to aim for in life."

How many virtues are there, you ask? Accordingly to St. Thomas Aquinas, there are sixty-four virtues but don't let that alarm you because they can be broken-down into 3 theological virtues (faith, hope & love) and all the rest fall under the 4 cardinal virtues (prudence, fortitude, temperance, & justice)! Interestingly, the word cardinal means 'hinge'. Like a door depends on the hinge to move appropriately and easily, we too can depend upon the virtues to help us live more fulfilling lives, foster positive relationships, and contribute to a more just and harmonious world.

opportunity is welcomed to help students grow in virtue, whether it be in the classroom, hallway, cafeteria or at recess. So too, it is important to practice virtue at home. To aid our busy parents, the Primary building extended an invitation to students' families each month, introducing a different virtue to build into their daily routines. Starting the year with "orderliness" and ending with "prayer", worksheets & activities were sent home to help create teachable moments and reinforce good, holy habits, as well as help track their progress. Students who participated were "crowned" by Principal Berger after school Mass and encouraged to continue growing

ATHLETICS' NEWS: FALL SPORTS ROUND-UP

This year's fall sports season was one of the most successful and memorable in school history. This was highlighted by great team and individual performances. For evidence of this you have to look no further than our varsity volleyball and varsity girls cross country teams.

Our volleyball team, led by seniors Bella Cornell, Allie Hamilton and Bryn VanVleet, won its second regional championship in program history and advanced to semi-state, finishing with a 26-9 record. They also finished 2nd in the PAAC and won the Union County Invitational for the first time in program history.



Bryn VanVleet accumulated many awards including being named an IHSVCA Indiana All-Star and the PAAC Player of the Year. VanVleet also signed to play at NCAA Division I school Cleveland State University. Bella Cornell was named 1st Team A11-Conference while Taryn Tremain named 2nd Team A11was Conference.



Our cross country team advanced as a team to regionals for the third time in program history. They also won three invitationals throughout the season, led by seniors Kelsey Brim, Jackie Clemente, Jana Clemente and Gwynie Falcone.

Gwynie Falcone was this year's PAAC champion. **Sara Swinney**

and **Jackie Clemente** also earned All -Conference honors at the conference meet. Falcone will continue her running career at Franciscan University (OH) while Jackie Clemente will compete at St. Mary's College (IN).


In varsity boys' cross country, Gaige Dunkin-Natusch was the only boy competing. Despite battling injuries throughout much of the year, he did a great job.

Also during the fall sports season, our varsity soccer team doubled their win total from the previous season as they finished with a 4-10-1 record. **Gavin Killion** was named 2nd Team All-Conference while **Ethan Nisewonder** and **Ian Vournazos** were named Honorable Mention All-Conference.



Our JV volleyball team often played two set matches to gain experience, but that experience will be beneficial as they will have some huge shoes to fill next year to replace our graduating seniors.

In junior high sports, our 8th grade volleyball team finished with a record of 4-11, while our 7th grade volleyball team finished with a record of 3-11. We had our highest participation numbers for several years in cross country, and their times steadily dropped throughout the season.



ATHLETICS' NEWS: WINTER SPORTS ROUND-UP



The winter sports season is always a long one; however, hard work and dedication led to success and great memories for our athletes. Our varsity boys' basketball team led by Jason Moynihan, Eric Parker and Grant Semler, opened the season 0-5, but finished the season with a 16-11 record, including a program record 10-game winningstreak.

They brought home the championship trophy in the inaugural Village of Spires Holiday Classic at Oldenburg Academy. Jason Moynihan was named 2nd Team All-Conference while **Jackson** Feist was named Honorable Mention All-Conference. Our JV boys basketball team may not have finished with the record they desired, but their roster was comprised mainly of freshmen and they gained valuable game experience for the future.








FINE ARTS' NEWS
