
My dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In today's Gospel, Jesus once again reveals to us his ultimate identity and purpose in the last of the seven "I am" statements found in the Gospel of John. Last week, Jesus identified himself as the Good Shepherd; this week he tells us that he is the True Vine. Just as branches depend on their vine for life and growth, Jesus tells us that to live with him is to be nourished and bear fruit. As branches draw strength from their vines, Christians draw strength from the Lord Jesus in order to do good works pleasing to the Father.

How do we remain in Christ? Jesus tells us: "If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask for whatever you want and it will be done for you". Similarly, St. John tells us in the second Reading that to remain in Christ is to keep his commandments. Recall that Jesus gave us a new commandment before the events of his Paschal mystery: "LOVE ONE ANOTHER" (Jn 13:34). As Christ is the living image of the Father's love, we are called to love one another, not just in thoughts or words, but in "deed and truth". We can live with confidence before God, knowing that we are pleasing to him, if we believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another as he has commanded us.

In the first Reading, we also see that to follow Christ is to be united to his Church, the Body of Christ. After his conversion, St. Paul makes every effort to join the Christian community despite their initial mistrust. Together with the apostles, Paul boldly spoke out in the name of Jesus. Through our Baptisms, we are also incorporated into the mystical Body of Christ, one with the Father and the Holy Spirit. Through our faithfulness to his commandment of love, we remain in Christ as he remains in us. As we continue our journey together this Easter, let us renew our Baptismal promises to live a new and transformed life of love and service to our brothers and sisters in Christ, with Christ, and through Christ. Amen.

Mis queridos hermanos y hermanas en Cristo,

En el evangelio de hoy, Jesús nos revela una vez más su identidad y propósito últimos en la última de las siete declaraciones de "Yo soy" que se encuentran en el evangelio de Juan. La semana pasada, Jesús se identificó a sí mismo como el Buen Pastor; esta semana nos dice que él es la Vid Verdadera. Así como los pámpanos dependen de su vid para la vida y el crecimiento, Jesús nos dice que vivir con él es nutrirse y dar fruto. A medida que las ramas obtienen fuerza de sus vides, los cristianos obtienen fuerza del Señor Jesús para hacer buenas obras que agradan al Padre.

¿Cómo permanecemos en Cristo? Jesús nos dice: "Si permanecen en mí y mis palabras permanecen en ustedes, pidan lo que quieran y se les hará". Del mismo modo, San Juan nos dice en la segunda lectura que permanecer en Cristo es guardar sus mandamientos. Recordemos que Jesús nos dio un mandamiento nuevo antes de los acontecimientos de su misterio pascual: "AMAR LOS UNOS A LOS OTROS" (Jn 13, 34). Como Cristo es la imagen viva del amor del Padre, estamos llamados a amarnos los unos a los otros, no solo con pensamientos o palabras, sino con "hechos y verdad". Podemos vivir con confianza ante Dios, sabiendo que le agradamos, si creemos en el nombre de su Hijo Jesucristo y nos amamos unos a otros como él nos ha mandado.

En la primera lectura también vemos que seguir a Cristo es estar unido a su Iglesia, el Cuerpo de Cristo. Después de su conversión, San Pablo hace todo lo posible por unirse a la comunidad cristiana a pesar de su desconfianza inicial. Junto con los apóstoles, Pablo habló con valentía en el nombre de Jesús. A través de nuestros bautismos, también somos incorporados al Cuerpo místico de Cristo, uno con el Padre y el Espíritu Santo. Mediante nuestra fidelidad a su mandamiento del amor, permanecemos en Cristo como él permanece en nosotros. Mientras continuamos nuestro viaje juntos en esta Pascua, renovemos nuestras promesas bautismales de vivir una vida nueva y transformada de amor y servicio a nuestros hermanos y hermanas en Cristo, con Cristo y por medio de Cristo. Gospel Meditation For Your Day

“Spiraling out of control,” is a phrase that can easily describe the current display of human existence. In addition to the violence, unrest, uneasiness and turmoil that are common elements of our daily news, other essential pieces are misplaced or missing. Many lack an objective center around which to order and structure their lives or a clear set of definable goals or mores to act as guideposts and life directives. It appears that “feelings” have become a “new god” and traditional structures and ideals set aside. It is almost as if history only shows that we got this whole thing wrong and many are determined to finally set things right. The real truth, however, is that while wrongs and errors are certainly a part of our often-checked past, it is hardly the case that all was wrong. It is not our task to rewrite the history of our lives, but to learn from mistakes that were made, and preserve the perennial wisdom at the root of our successes. Learning is an essential part of being human.

The question becomes, however, from whom do we learn? Some have such a hard time placing God in that position, but that is precisely where God needs to be. God is the Master Teacher from whom all of humanity learns and gets its cues. It is in and through this relationship with the Gardener of Life that we are fashioned and pruned into the people we are intended to be and can be. It is only in God that we are able to find our best selves. Sadly, many think that religion too, as well as history in general, has also gotten all this wrong. Yet, our resurrection faith tells us differently. We are reminded, today especially, that we are meant to remain in Christ as Christ remains in us. We are also reminded that Jesus, the Incarnate God, is the vine upon which we grow, the branches that flow from the source of God’s life.

Giving up our will to God’s can be a painful endeavor. It is not easy to set our own

desires and wants aside and allow God to step in and direct and guide our growth. But this is the only way to prevent deadly weeds from overtaking us and bringing us to a place of self-destruction. God’s commandments are the very guideposts and benchmarks we need, yet many seek to remove them from all public view because they appear to limit self-expression and suppress what is considered by many to be “human freedom.” They are the only way we can find freedom, however. And, until we learn this fundamental lesson, we will continue to spiral out of control, never really knowing who we are, what our potential can be or how life really can be lived. We will not know peace. ©LPi

May - The Month of Mary

“May is Mary’s Month,” began the great poet Gerard Manley Hopkins, SJ, in “The May Magnificat.”

For centuries, the Catholic Church has emphasized the month of May as a time of honor and devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Parishes and families often celebrate with special pilgrimages, devotions, or placing a crown on a statue of Mary, traditionally called a “May Crowning.”

On April 29, 1965, Pope Blessed Paul VI promulgated his encyclical *Mense Maio* (“The Month of May”), which promoted May devotions to the Blessed Mother, knowing that, “the person who encounters Mary cannot help but encounter Christ likewise” (n. 2).

In Pope Francis’ recent Exhortation *Amoris Laetitia- The Joy of Love: On Love in the Family*, he states, “Every family should look to the icon of the Holy Family of Nazareth” (n. 30). Pope Francis goes on to say, “The treasury of Mary’s heart also contains the experiences of every family, which she cherishes. For this reason, she can help us understand the meaning of these experiences and to hear the message God wishes to communicate through the life of our families” (n. 30). Pope Francis reminds us that by honoring Mary, we honor Jesus and our families.

May devotions to Mary began in the 13th century, but there is little information to know how it was celebrated. In its present form, the practice of May devotions to Mary originated within the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits) in the 18th century under Father Latomia of their Roman College. Shortly afterwards, devotions were adopted at the Jesuit’s mother church in Rome, the Church

of the Gesù, and then began to spread throughout other area churches to the entire globe.

The image of Mary wearing a gold crown appears in early Eastern and Western iconography, drawing inspiration from the Coronation of Mary as understood in Catholic biblical tradition based on the passage from Revelation 12:1. Some churches and

families participate in a special May Crowning celebration. Pope Clement VIII (1592-1605) first placed two crowns on the Marian icon called “*Salus Populi Romani*” in the Roman Basilica of St. Mary Major, but the crowns were later lost. On the Feast of the Assumption in 1838, Pope Gregory XVI once again added crowns in a special rite, officially starting the tradition as it is still performed today.

One reason the devotion has come to extend over the entire month is the abundance of Marian feast days in May: Mary, Queen of Apostles, Our Lady of Fatima (May 13), Mary Help of Christians (May 24), and the Visitation (May 31). For good measure, May also celebrates our biological Mother’s

Day (May 9, don’t forget!). Let Mary’s month be a new reason to honor and celebrate your own mother.

There is no lack of reasons to stay close to Mary this month, and throughout our lives. Find ways to honor her with your words and actions by seeking new ways to bring about mercy and peace through our churches into our world.



HOW DO YOU PRAY THE HOLY ROSARY?

The Holy Rosary is a prayer that commemorates twenty mysteries of the lives of Jesus and Virgin Mary.

Steps to pray:

1. Make the sign of the Cross and recite the Apostle’s Creed
2. Say one Our Father
3. Say 3 Hail Marys and 1 Glory Be
4. Meditate on the first mystery and say the Our Father
5. Say 10 Hail Marys and 1 Glory Be
6. Repeat in each mystery
7. Recite the Hail Holy Queen

Communion Procession Updates



As we return to more normal operations, we will be implementing various changes to our Weekend Experience efforts. There will be some adjustments to our Communion procession beginning May 8th and 9th. Please make yourself familiar with the following adjustments:

Handicapped seating: The Celebrant/Deacon/Eucharistic Minister of Holy Communion will come directly to you and those seated in the designated pews.

Regular seating:

- We are returning to a communion procession.
- We ask that you please join the procession if you are physically able. If you are not receiving communion, a blessing can be given by the minister.
- Outside of the designated pews for handicapped seating, if you are unable to physically join the procession, please move out of the pews to allow others to pass by, then return to your seating.
- When receiving, please leave your mask in place as communion is placed in your hand. Step to the side, remove one side of your mask to consume, then put mask back in place.
- The Blessed Sacrament must be consumed in the immediate moments after being placed on your palm. It may not be saved for later, or taken to your pew for consumption. If a minister sees a person who has not consumed, Diocesan expectations direct any communion minister to ask the individual to consume at that moment.

Receiving on the tongue: Those wishing to receive on the tongue should proceed to the sanctuary steps following Mass, and the Deacon/Celebrant will serve you.



Saint Rose Venerini



(February 9, 1656 – May 7, 1728)

Rose was born at Viterbo in Italy, the daughter of a doctor. Following the death of her fiancé she entered a convent, but soon returned home to care for her newly widowed mother. Meanwhile, Rose invited the women of the neighborhood to recite the rosary in her home, forming a sort of sodality with them.

As she looked to her future under the spiritual guidance of a Jesuit priest, Rose became convinced that she was called to become a teacher in the world rather than a contemplative nun in a convent. Clearly, she made the right choice: She was a born teacher, and the free school for girls she opened in 1685 was well received.

Soon the cardinal invited her to oversee the training of teachers and the administration of schools in his diocese of Montefiascone. As Rose's reputation grew, she was called upon to organize schools in many parts of Italy, including Rome. Her disposition was right for the task as well, for Rose often met considerable opposition but was never deterred.

She died in Rome in 1728, where a number of miracles were attributed to her. She was beatified in 1952 and canonized in 2006. The sodality, or group of women she had invited to prayer, was ultimately given the rank of a religious congregation. Today, the so-called Venerini Sisters can be found in the United States and elsewhere, working among Italian immigrants.

Whatever state of life God calls us to, we bring with us an assortment of experiences, interests and gifts—however small they seem to us. Rose's life stands as a reminder that all we are is meant to be put to service wherever we find ourselves.

Baptisms in the Church


It is with great joy that All Souls announces that baptisms will once again be celebrated during the 10am and Noon Masses the 3rd Sunday of every month.

World Day of Prayer

The Rector/President of St. Vincent de Paul Regional Seminary, Very Rev. Alfredo I. Hernández, has invited the seminary community to respond to Pope Francis's call to pray for vocations to the ordained ministry on this **World Prayer Day, Sunday, April 25, 2021**. The Pope's Message for this occasion, which is always celebrated on the Fourth Sunday of Easter, bears the title: Saint Joseph: The Dream of Vocation. We invite our community and all those considering their future to join with St. Joseph in allowing God's dreams to become reality in them.

Fr. Hernández hopes to inspire parents and families to begin a conversation with young Catholics to consider how they may live lives of holiness as a priest or religious. These prayers have been very fruitful. This spring, 18 seminarians will be ordained as priests and just in the past two weeks, 12 men have been ordained as transitional deacons.

In his message for this day, Pope Francis discusses the joy that flows from being faithful to God's call and says, "It is the joy of simplicity, the joy experienced daily by those who care for what truly matters: faithful closeness to God and to our neighbor." The SVPD community will be praying that many may experience that "transparent joy."

St. Vincent de Paul Seminary is located in Boynton Beach, FL and is an ATS-accredited school. It currently has a student population of over 110 seminarians. Since its foundation in 1963 it has formed over 600 priests who have gone on to serve in parishes across the state, the Southeast, and parts of the Caribbean.
