### Other:

- Lectors will be notified when there is a change in reading and/ or a modified version
- Lectors will often be asked or assigned to proclaim the Word at weekday Masses and/or during certain times of the year as Holy Days, Advent, Lent, and others
- If you cannot be present, contact a substitute so that they have enough time to prepare; if you cannot find a substitute, please contact Marta or Gail at the Church Office.
- Schedules will be sent by e-mail or by calling Marta/Gail (5:00 p.m. Sunday Mass lectors will also be contacted by the youth minister as a reminder)
- Wear appropriate attire conducive to worship
- Microphone basics
  - —pointing at the chin
  - —stay within the area of the cone (shaped from the cheekbones out)
  - —stay one "fist" distance from the microphone
  - —you do not have to shout; microphone works well.
- As a lector, we proclaim the word as written. We do not add anything or make any additional announcements, or greetings

"When the Sacred Scriptures are read in the Church,

# NOTRE DAME CATHOLIC CHURCH HANDBOOK (Sunday Masses)

-LECTOR-

The function of the lector is to **Proclaim** the assigned sacred Scripture at Mass.

We believe this is a solemn calling that invites each lector to experience the Word internally and as it comes alive before the faithful at Mass. We look for the grace that compels all to listen attentively and to respond to the Word with renewed faith.

### The Week Before Mass

- Prayer—pray the reading, using it as part of your daily prayer; study, reflect, and meditate on the Word.
  - The reading can be found in several different places—missalettes, bulletin, or USCCB website (daily scripture readings), a good resource is "Laudate" a free phone app. This app also provides a verbal reading listed as "listen podcast". This is very helpful for pronouncing words.
- Consider using Lectio Divina; if you have never used this practice, consult the online service for Lectio Divina, or reading aids such as <u>The Magnificat</u> or <u>Give Us This Day</u>.

## **Before Mass**

- Check yourself in at the Sign In Book 15 minutes before Mass begins
- Check the reading in the lectionary at the ambo to make sure it is in the correct place
- Check to make sure microphone is turned on

### **During Mass**

- Lectors sit in your Reserved pew—1st Reader on the right, 2nd Reader on the left end of the pew.
- Approaching the altar for your reading:
  - —step out in front of the altar and make a profound bow (from the waist)
  - —take time to adjust the microphone
  - —take time to look up at the assembly
  - —having memorized the introduction (A reading from...), continue to look at the assembly as you begin
  - —it is a good idea to keep your fingers on the reading (as in primary school) so that you are free to look up from the words occasionally.
  - —end the reading as you began (by looking at the assembly) as you say: "The Word of the Lord."
- Silence is asked for in the <u>General Instruction of the Roman Missal</u>; one of these is after each reading...
  - ....a good measure is to silently pray the "Glory be..." before leaving the ambo.
- As you reach the bottom step, turn, and (for the 1st lector—usually with the cantor), make a profound bow before entering the pew again.
- After the second reading, place the lectionary on the ambo shelf.

# **After Mass**

• Stay long enough to greet others as they leave the church: you have just "taught" the Word of God.
