



GOSPEL MEDITATION

It is no wonder that followers of Christ are called the Body of Christ. After all, sharing in the same spiritual food and sacred meal, they become what they eat and reveal the Divine Image. There is so much power for healing in the community of believers. Through the Eucharist, Christ becomes as present in those who have partaken of his Body and Blood as he has the elements themselves. The very presence of God touches the depths of the human soul and visits a part of us that no human being can ever hope to explore. We are God's. The sacred Eucharistic meal is a celebration of intimacy, the reunion of two loves in constant search of and longing for the other.

The community of believers receives the power and the presence to touch and heal in the name of the One they have welcomed within. It is now within their grasp to change the way life is lived and to more intentionally put into practice the Beatitudes that the Divine Guest has revealed. We are asked to be like Christ and work to create a world of sufficiency, where the greed of some no longer creates the want of others but where all of God's children can find a home and a place at the table of life. The One who makes a home within calls us to live a life that transforms. We are changed ourselves and now become agents of change for others. We are the Body of Christ. God is with us. We have been nourished.

Sadly, many are afraid to try. We know what we are called to do, but we struggle with feelings of doubt as to whether God really is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Do our systems have to change? Is it possible that we somehow missed the mark when we put all of our social networks in place and established the business of our lives? Perhaps we have to radically rethink our approach, and that can scare us. We might have to give something up or change, and we don't want to. As long as want, injustice, division, prejudice, and scarcity still exit, there is tremendous work for the Body of Christ.

CORPUS CHRISTI

This Sunday, we celebrate the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, also known as Corpus Christi Sunday. Starting in the thirteenth century, the Church instituted this feast to celebrate the Real Presence of the Eucharist. Prior to this, the Eucharist's big feast was on Holy Thursday because that was the day on which Jesus instituted the Eucharist. However, Holy Thursday commemorates so many other important aspects of our Catholic faith, and it is intricately tied into the sorrows of Jesus' Passion and death; because of this, the Church sought to set a completely separate date to honor the amazing miracle of the Eucharist.

As Catholics, we believe something totally radical that clearly separates our doctrine from other Christian doctrine. We believe in the Real Presence of the Eucharist. We believe that the bread and wine become the *actual* Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. We believe that Jesus is present in every tabernacle in every Catholic church around the world; this is such a humbling, and even disconcerting, belief, isn't it?

Jesus thought so. In John 6:52-71, Jesus taught the crowd about the Real Presence of the Eucharist. Many of his followers argued that it was nonsense because it was too difficult to understand, so they left him. Jesus was left with the twelve disciples who knew that even though it was a difficult teaching to accept and comprehend, it was nonetheless true and beautiful; they knew that it was the core of Jesus' teaching and was a nonnegotiable point of the faith He was handing down to them.

Since then, this teaching hasn't really become any easier for us to accept. Consider other Christian denominations who reject this teaching and chalk it up to being a bunch hooey. Think about Catholics who do not realize, or even outright reject, that the Eucharist truly is Jesus' Body and Blood and think that the Eucharist is simply a symbol. As a community of faith, we are truly set apart from other denominations because of our belief in the Real Presence. We believe in transubstantiation, meaning that we believe that the while the bread and wine still retain the appearances or form (color, taste, shape, nutritional components, etc.) of ordinary bread and wine, the moment of Consecration completely changes the substance or matter into Jesus' Body and Blood; therefore, it is not a simple symbol. This is so important that we do our best to draw attention to this great moment during Mass; this change is signaled by the ringing of bells during the Eucharistic Prayer in most parishes.

Consider your belief in the Eucharist. The next time that the Body of Christ is held up before you during Communion, take a moment to really look at it, hear the words "The Body of Christ," recall the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, and respond "Amen" (which means "so be it") with great conviction.



Our parish has received special permission from Bishop Kagan to offer a Holy Hour in lieu of a traditional Eucharistic procession for the feast of Corpus Christi. Join us for a special Holy Hour on Sunday, June 14, for the feast of Corpus Christi! All are welcome to come and adore our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament from 2pm-3pm!

*Please note that our regular weekly Thursday Eucharistic Adoration time has not yet been reinstated and will only be once Bishop Kagan releases a new directive regarding it.

*No additional safety guidelines are required for this special Holy Hour other than the ones already present for Mass.



MONTH OF THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS



This week, we celebrate two important feasts in conjunction with the month's devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. On Friday, we celebrate the feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, and we celebrate the Immaculate Heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary on Saturday. Since the solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus falls on a Friday, that means that there is no obligation to observe a Friday penance. The feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus celebrates Jesus' endless love and compassion towards humanity and his free choice to suffer out of love for us in order to obtain our salvation. The feast of the Immaculate Heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary celebrates the interior life of Mary that we are called to model.

These two feasts coincide with one another, but there are several key distinctions between them. The devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is specifically directed to God's divine heart overflowing with love for humanity, and the Church venerates that love and considers our response to this divine love. The devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary is about the love Mary has for God, and the Church reflects on how we can imitate Mary's way of life to grow in love for God. If we think about it, the difference between the two feasts is how we view love; on the feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, we view love as the "object" of the devotion, and on the feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, we view love more as the "result" of the devotion.

On Friday, we have the opportunity to receive a partial or a plenary indulgence for the feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, provided that all the usual requirements for receiving an indulgence are met as spelled out in *The Manual of Indulgences*:

- To gain an indulgence, you must be a baptized Catholic, not excommunicated, and not in a state of mortal sin at the time of completing the actions performed for the indulgence.
- To gain a plenary indulgence you must be free from all attachment to sin, even venial sin; this means that you must be willing to resolve not to sin again, as we profess in the sacrament of Reconciliation when we recite the Act of Contrition.
- You must perform the required actions (in this case, praying the Act of Reparation to the Sacred Heart of Jesus publicly), receive Holy Communion, make a sacramental confession, and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father.
 - ♦ It is preferred that you receive Communion and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father on the day you perform the actions, but it is acceptable to do so within several days before or after the day.
 - Confession should be made within three weeks before or after the actions of the indulgence.
 - ♦ The usual prayers offered for the intentions of the Holy Father are one Our Father and one Hail Mary.

Act of Reparation to the Sacred Heart of Jesus

Most sweet Jesus, whose overflowing charity for men is requited by so much forgetfulness, negligence and contempt, behold us prostrate before Thee, eager to repair by a special act of homage the cruel indifference and injuries to which Thy loving Heart is everywhere subject.

Mindful, alas! that we ourselves have had a share in such great indignities, which we now deplore from the depths of our hearts, we humbly ask Thy pardon and declare our readiness to atone by voluntary expiation, not only for our own personal offenses, but also for the sins of those, who, straying far from the path of salvation, refuse in their obstinate infidelity to follow Thee, their Shepherd and Leader, or, renouncing the promises of their baptism, have cast off the sweet yoke of Thy law.

We are now resolved to expiate each and every deplorable outrage committed against Thee; we are now determined to make amends for the manifold offenses against Christian modesty in unbecoming dress and behavior, for all the foul seductions laid to ensnare the feet of the innocent, for the frequent violations of Sundays and holydays, and the shocking blasphemies uttered against Thee and Thy Saints.

We wish also to make amends for the insults to which Thy Vicar on earth and Thy priests are subjected, for the profanation, by conscious neglect or terrible acts of sacrilege, of the very crimes of nations who resist the rights and teaching authority of the Church which Thou hast founded.

Would that we were able to wash away such abominations with our blood. We now offer, in reparation for these violations of Thy divine honor, the satisfaction Thou once made to Thy Eternal Father on the cross and which Thou continuest to renew daily on our altars; we offer it in union with the acts of atonement of Thy Virgin Mother and all the Saints and of the pious faithful on earth; and we sincerely promise to make recompense, as far as we can with the help of Thy grace, for all neglect of Thy great love and for the sins we and others have committed in the past.

Henceforth, we will live a life of unswerving faith, of purity of conduct, of perfect observance of the precepts of the Gospel and especially that of charity. We promise to the best of our power to prevent others from offending Thee and to bring as many as possible to follow Thee.

O loving Jesus, through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mother, our model in reparation, deign to receive the voluntary offering we make of this act of expiation; and by the crowning gift of perseverance keep us faithful unto death in our duty and the allegiance we owe to Thee, so that we may all one day come to that happy home, where with the Father and the Holy Spirit Thou livest and reignest, God, forever and ever.

Amen.

While we are not able to obtain an indulgence on the feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, an excellent prayer to recite on Saturday's great feast would by the Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary, also known as the Litany of Loreto. This prayer was approved in 1587 by Pope Sixtus V, and it is one of only six litanies that the Church ha approved for public recitation. The different invocations to our Blessed Mother within the litany encompass different titles that were given to her by the early Church Fathers.

O Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us! Immaculate Heart of Mary, pray for us!
