GOSPEL MEDITATION

I remember as a child the meticulousness my father would bring to a task. Whether it be tending to a chore in the yard, repairing something, or painting a room, the tiniest of every detail demanded his attention. He had great patience. I benefited greatly by his example and remember these lessons well. We all need examples to follow. It is important to identify folks who excel at simple things and show us how to do things well. There are those among us and those who have gone before us who serve as these models and witnesses. They are ordinary people who in their “extraordinary ordinariness” capture our attention and allow us to see things more clearly.

These are the prophets, martyrs, teachers, witnesses, heralds, and innovators who bring a single-minded devotion to God to even the simplest of tasks they perform. They have an openness to being used and become vessels of Divine justice, mercy, and presence. They call us to the “more” of life and point us to the Gospel in all of its simplicity and splendor. They remind us of the little ones of the Kingdom and the values we all need to cultivate and possess. They are the poor in spirit, the meek, the merciful, and the peacemaker who often are rejected not only by those who have far different agendas but by those you think would welcome them.

All of the saints in heaven and on earth form this cloud of witnesses who journey with us as we make our way through life. They offer us inspiration, wisdom, intercession, and support. They direct us toward true happiness and remind us that we are all called to be saints. All it takes is desire, love, and fidelity. There is much we can learn from the official saints of the church. Their guidance is ever before us and ever with us. But there is also a lot to learn from the unofficial saints of the church. They sit beside us every Sunday, are our neighbors and ordinary people we meet every day. Because of the devotedness of their faith, they remind us to keep going, remain focused, and cultivate purpose and meaning, and give voice to those who have none. The inspiration is all around us.

Pay attention to the details. Do what you do with great love. Know that you are not alone. Believe that you can persevere. Have great faith.

Televised Mass from the Cathedral

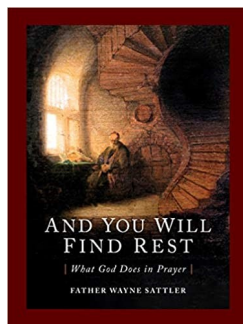

MONTH OF THE POOR SOULS IN PURGATORY

As November begins, we enter into the month of the Poor Souls in Purgatory. The month starts off with two very important days—All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day.

November 1—All Saints' Day—Holy Day of Obligation

Instituted as a feast by Pope Gregory III in the eighth century, this day commemorates the faithful departed who are in heaven today. We celebrate all the saints—those who the Church has canonized and those who have not been canonized—the known and the unknown saints. The truth is that everyone in heaven is a saint, even those who do not have a set, or regular, feast day on the Church calendar.

November 2—All Souls' Day

This day commemorates the faithful departed who are in purgatory today. As Christians, we believe that the dead are not gone because their souls live on forever. The Church sets aside this important day for the poor souls in purgatory. We refer to those in purgatory as the “poor” souls because they can no longer pray for themselves, make sacrifices, do good deeds, or merit anything for themselves as they await their entry into Heaven; they rely completely on us to make sacrifices, to pray, and to obtain indulgences on their behalf to ease their suffering and quickly advance them through their purification.

On this day, a partial indulgence may be obtained for the souls in purgatory by reciting the *requiem aeternam* prayer: “Eternal rest grant to them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.”

You may also gain a plenary (or full) indulgence for the souls in purgatory by visiting a church and praying the Our Father and the Creed during the visit, if the usual conditions for indulgences are met (*Manual of Indulgences*, 1999):

- ◆ To gain an indulgence, you must be a baptized Catholic, not excommunicated, and not in a state of mortal sin at the time of completing the actions performed for the indulgence.
- ◆ To gain a plenary indulgence you must be free from all attachment to sin, even venial sin; this means that you must be willing to resolve not to sin again, as we profess in the sacrament of Reconciliation when we recite the Act of Contrition.
- ◆ You must perform the required actions (in this case, praying the Our Father and Creed), receive Holy Communion, make a sacramental confession, and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father.
 - ◇ It is preferred that you receive Communion and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father on the day you perform the actions, but it is acceptable to do so within several days before or after the day.
 - ◇ Confession should be made within three weeks before or after the actions of the indulgence.
 - ◇ The usual prayers offered for the intentions of the Holy Father are one Our Father and one Hail Mary.

November 1-8

A plenary indulgence can be gained each of these days for a soul in purgatory by devoutly visiting a cemetery and praying for the for the departed, even if only mentally. As with all plenary indulgences, the above requirements must be met to gain a plenary indulgence in this manner for the poor souls in purgatory.

I heard a story the other day of a very holy man. The commentator said, "We shouldn't call him a saint. If we sanctify him, we don't have to imitate him." This is precisely the opposite of the meaning of saints! Throughout the Church's history, we have honored saints, but not to set them apart. We honor saints to remind us what is possible for a person who loves God. The saints have stories as varied as our own. We have bishops, martyrs, teachers, doctors, former thieves and prostitutes, politicians and kings, soldiers and pacifists, single mothers, desert hermits. The list goes on! On this Solemnity of All Saints, we remember this garden of holiness, rich with diverse flowerings of a holy life. When you look at the life of your favorite saint, ask yourself, "How can I imitate this person? What is possible for me when I love God?"
