HISTORY OF THE CHURCH

THE TRAVELS OF ST. PAUL


St. Paul's tireless and intrepid missionary work spread the Christian Faith far beyond the borders of Palestine and across most of the Roman Empire, founding some of the earliest and most prominent early Christian communities along the way. By some estimates, St. Paul's travels totaled well over 10,000 miles and brought him to Jerusalem, to every corner of Asia Minor, into Arabia, across Macedonia and Greece, to Eastern Europe, Rome, and many scholars believe he may have traveled as far as Spain.

Along the way, he found many eager disciples, but he also found many enemies among both the Jews and Gentiles. He endured many dangers and sufferings along the course of his travels. He describes some of his experiences in 2 Corinthians 11:24-25: "Five times I have received at the hands of the Jews the forty lashes less one. Three times I have been beaten with rods: once I was stoned. Three times I have been shipwrecked; a night and a day I have been adrift at sea." St. Paul was driven out of many cities by mobs. He narrowly escaped death several times, as when he sneaked out of Damascus in a basket to avoid the guards at the gate (cf. Acts 9: 23-25). Other times, he did not escape, as in Lystra where a mob caught him, stoned him until they thought he was dead and dragged him out of the city (cf. Acts 14:19).


St. Paul was fearless in his apostolate despite his physical shortcomings. There are several accounts of what St. Paul looked like. Even in his own words, he writes that his "bodily presence is weak" (2 Cor 10: 10). Other early Christian accounts coincide in saying that he was short, broad-shouldered, bow-legged, and balding. He also had big eyes, a rather long nose, a thick, grayish beard and closely-knit eyebrows.

St. Paul also spent a good deal of time in prison. He was arrested in Philippi, and again later in Jerusalem, after which he spent a two-year stint in Caesarea, and two more years on house arrest in Rome. He was finally martyred in Rome around the year A.D. 64 by beheading. Tradition holds that when he was beheaded, his head bounced three times, and each time it hit the ground a fountain miraculously sprang up.


ST. PAUL'S FIRST JOURNEY, ca. A.D. 46-48



ST. PAUL'S SECOND JOURNEY, ca. A.D. 49-52




JESUS CHRIST AND THE FOUNDING OF THE CHURCH



THE FIRST MISSIONARIES

THE STORY OF THE first Christians centers on those whose mission it was to pass on the good news about Jesus. Most Christians did this in a small way, but some devoted all their time to spreading the message. It was not long before the news had been taken around the Mediterranean world, and beyond.



PAUL

Meaning: Small Appears: 196 verses in the New Testament, esp. Acts 7-9, 13 When he is first mentioned, Paul is referred to by his Hebrew name Saul ("God hears"). Paul was his second, Greek name. A brilliant young Pharisee, Paul was originally determined to stamp out Christianity. On his way to Damascus to arrest the Christians there, Jesus appeared to him in a vision and Paul was converted to Christianity. Very soon he started preaching the Christian message. Over the next thirty years he traveled all around the Greek-speaking world,


specializing in preaching to non-Jews. He was thrown in prison several times, but kept in touch with his new churches by letter. Thirteen of his letters now form part of the New Testament.

JOHN MARK

Meaning: God is gracious
Appears: Acts 12, 13, 15; Col. 4;
2 Tim. 4; Philem. 24; 1 Pet. 5
John Mark's mother had
a large house in Jerusalem
where the first Christians
used to meet. John Mark
went as a helper with Paul
and Barnabas on their first
missionary journey, but he
lost heart halfway and went
back to Jerusalem. He later
went to Rome with Peter.
John Mark is the author of
Mark's Gospel.

BARNABAS

Meaning: Son of encouragement Appears: Acts 4, 9, 11-15; 1 Cor. 9; Gal. 2; Col. 4 One of the earliest converts to Christianity, Barnabas was a close friend of Paul, and traveled with him on his first missionary journey to Cyprus and Asia Minor. His real name was Joseph. "Barnabas" was a nickname the apostles gave him, because he was so good at teaching and

encouraging people.

Missionaries like Paul felt that they had a unique message to pass on. They believed that Jesus died to save the world from evil, that he had risen from death to give people new life, and that God would give his Holy Spirit to all who believed.



Paul's conversion

Paul discovered that he was to be a missionary while on the road to Damascus. Jesus appeared to him in a heavenly light, and told Paul to go out and preach all over the world. For three days he could not see and did not eat. Not all missionaries had a dramatic vision like Paul.

Paul's journeys

Paul made three long journeys from his home church in Antioch, Syria. Sometimes he went by ship, but he often walked from town to town, preaching on the way. He gave a famous sermon in Athens.

PHILIP


Meaning: Lover of horses Appears: Acts 6, 8, 21 Philip's first job was distributing food to the poor in Jerusalem. He became a missionary and was the first to preach the good news in Samaria. On his way back to Jerusalem, Philip was taken by an angel to help an Ethiopian official who was confused by a passage in Isaiah. The official was so impressed, he asked to be baptized and became the first Ethiopian Christian.

LUKE

Meaning: unknown Appears: Col. 4; 2 Tim. 4; Philem. 24 Luke is the author of Luke's Gospel and also the Acts of the Apostles. He was a good friend to Paul, and was with him when they experienced the storm and shipwreck (Acts 27). He was a Gentile and a doctor, and was able to care for Paul who suffered from a mysterious illness. Luke was the only person with Paul when he finally faced execution in Rome.

SILAS

Meaning: Woody
Appears: Acts 15, 16, 17, 18; 2 Cor.
1; 1 Thess. 1; 2 Thess. 1; 1 Pet. 5
Silas traveled as a missionary
with both Paul and Peter. He
also sang hymns in jail with
Paul during the earthquake
in Philippi. Impressed by
their faith, the jailer became
a Christian. Peter described
Silas as "a faithful brother."



SILAS

TIMOTHY

Meaning: One who honors God Appears: Acts 16, 17; Rom. 16; 1 Cor. 4, 16; Phil. 1; Col. 1; 1 Thess. 3; 1 Tim. 1 One of Paul's chief helpers, Timothy also went on missions of his own. Paul called him "my true son in the faith" and gave him advice in two letters in the New Testament.

TITUS

Meaning: Pleasant Appears: 2 Cor. 2, 7, 12; Gal. 2; 2 Tim. 4; Titus 1 Titus was one of Paul's most trusted associates. Paul gave him an especially difficult task: to go ahead of Paul to the new church in Corinth, which was rebelling against Paul's leadership. Paul was delighted when Titus came back and said that the Corinthian Christians had now begun to soften their attitude. Later, Paul wrote Titus a letter (the book of Titus) that is preserved

EPAPHRODITUS

in the New Testament.

Meaning: Handsome, charming
Appears: Phil. 2, 4
A leader of the church in
Philippi, Epaphroditus was
sent by the church with
a gift for Paul, who was
under house arrest in Rome.
Epaphroditus stayed to help
Paul, but fell seriously ill.
When he recovered, he
returned home with Paul's
letter to the Philippians.

APOLLOS

Meaning: Named after
the Greek god Apollo
Appears: Acts 18, 19; 1
Cor. 1, 3, 4, 16; Titus 3
A Jew from Alexandria
in Egypt, Apollos was
a missionary before he
met Paul. He had been
a disciple of John the
Baptist and was a powerful
preacher. Priscilla and Aquila
helped Apollos to a clearer
understanding of Jesus when
they met him in Corinth.

Meaning: Radiant

Appears: Rom. 16
Phoebe was a church
leader near Corinth.
Unlike Jewish

Tychichus

Meaning: Lucky Appears: Acts 20; Eph. 6; Col. 4; 2 Tim.

4; Titus 3


A Christian from Asia, Tychichus traveled with Paul to Jerusalem. He also took Paul's letters to the Ephesians and the Colossians to the churches there, and gave them news of Paul at the same time. Paul trusted him with other missions as well.

Matthias

Meaning: Gift of God
Appears: Acts 1
After Judas Iscariot
committed suicide, the
remaining apostles decided
to replace him. Of the two
candidates, Matthias was
chosen as the new apostle.



ANANIAS

Meaning: God is gracious Appears: Acts 5 Together with his wife Sapphira, Ananias joined the church in its earliest days. The love between the first Christians was so strong that they were willing to give up all their possessions if they were needed by other church members. Some brought very large gifts that they presented to the apostles to be distributed among the poor in Jerusalem. Ananias and Sapphira sold a field, but pretended they had sold it for less than the actual amount, and secretly kept the extra money for

themselves. God told Peter what Ananias had done, so Peter confronted him. "You did not have to give the whole sum," he said, "but you have lied to the Holy Spirit!" As Peter spoke, Ananias collapsed and died.

SAPPHIRA

Meaning: Beautiful
Appears: Acts 5
About three hours after her husband Ananias's death,
Sapphira called on Peter the apostle, not knowing what

had happened. Peter tested her by asking if the money was the total from the land sale, but she kept up the pretense about the value of their gift. She and Ananias wanted to be admired for making a greater sacrifice than they actually had. Peter knew how God would react, and warned her. It was too late - she collapsed and died. As a result, people inside and outside the church became very afraid, realizing that they could not be dishonest with God.

THE FIRST MARTYR

It was not long before the church mourned its first martyr – someone who gives their life for their faith. Stephen was the first of a long line of people who died for proclaiming their Christian beliefs.

St. Stephen

When Stephen was brought before the Sanhedrin, he made a long speech in his defense. As he finished, he had a vision of Jesus standing beside God. This incensed his enemies who stoned him to death. Before dying he said, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them."

The Sanhedrin

The Sanhedrin – from the Greek word for council – was the Jewish high court. It had seventy-one members, with chief priests, teachers of the law, and elders. New Testament members included Gamaliel, Caiaphas, and Nicodemus.



STEPHEN

Meaning: Crown Appears: Acts 6, 7, 11, 22 Stephen was one of seven young men chosen to organize help for the poor, and to distribute food in Jerusalem. He was a deep thinker and a gifted speaker, and was full of the Holy Spirit. He miraculously healed the sick, and argued powerfully with the Greekspeaking Jews, persuading many of them to become Christians. But opposition to him grew and his enemies accused him falsely before the Sanhedrin. He was wrongly convicted of blasphemy and stoned to death. He became the first Christian martyr.

Ananias of Damascus

Meaning: God is gracious
Appears: Acts 9
One of the Christians in
Damascus, Ananias was told
by God to go to the house
where Paul went after being
blinded. Ananias knew that
Paul had come to arrest
all the Christians, but he
went anyway. As he prayed,
Paul's sight was restored.



SIMON THE TANNER

Meaning: God hears
Appears: Acts 9, 10
Tanners are people who
treat the skins of animals
to produce leather. They
were generally shunned by
strict Jews because of their
contact with dead animals.
Simon the Tanner must
have been delighted when
the great apostle Peter did
not avoid him, but stayed
at his home outside Joppa.

Cornelius was a Roman
soldier stationed at
Caesarea. He was a "Godfearer," the name given to

Appears: Acts 12
Rhoda worked in Mary's

Peter, who was in prison
awaiting execution the next
day. When Rhoda heard
Peter's voice at the door
she was so amazed that
she forgot to let him in.



synagogue, seeking God. One day an angel appeared and told him to send for Peter. Cornelius gathered his friends and relatives to meet Peter. When he arrived, Cornelius knelt before him, but Peter said "I am only a man myself!" Then he told them about Jesus, and as he spoke the Holy Spirit came upon Cornelius and his friends. They were baptized immediately, praising God.

MARY, MOTHER OF JOHN MARK

Meaning: unknown
Appears: Acts 12
Mary's house in Jerusalem was where church members met.
According to tradition, the last supper took place there.

JUDAS BARSABBAS

Meaning: Praised

Appears: Acts 15
A member of the Jerusalem church, Judas took an important letter to the church in Antioch. Church officials had been discussing whether Gentile believers should be circumcised. The apostles met in Jerusalem

to talk about this, and sent their answer through Judas and Silas: no, they need not be circumcised.

However, he really only wanted the power, for which he offered money to Peter. Peter told him, "Your heart is not right before God!" According to tradition, Simon became even more famous, but he continued to value magic above true faith in God.

ELYMAS

Meaning: unknown Appears: Acts 13 Elymas was a Jewish magician, who had great influence with the Roman Governor of Cyprus, Sergius Paulus. When Paul arrived, and Sergius showed interest in the Christian message, Elymas saw his position threatened. In turn, Paul denounced Elymas as "a child of the devil," and he was struck with temporary blindness. Sergius Paulus was so amazed that he became a Christian.

LYDIA

Meaning: Lady from Lydia Appears: Acts 16 Lydia lived in Philippi, where she had a successful business selling purple cloth from her hometown of Thyatira. She was a Gentile, seeking God by worshiping at the Jewish prayer center. It was here she met Paul and his fellow missionaries. Lydia responded warmly to the Gospel, and she and all her family and workers were baptized. She immediately invited Paul and his friends to stay in her home.



LYDIA

IASON

Meaning: God saves
Appears: Acts 17
Jason was a Jew, living in
Thessalonika. Paul came
to the synagogue there and
convinced Jason and others
of the truth of the Christian
message. But some of the
Jews were jealous and had
Jason thrown into prison.



STEPHANAS

Meaning: Crown Appears: 1 Cor. 1, 16 Stephanas and his household were the first people to become Christians during Paul's ministry in Achaia, the Greek province that included Corinth where he lived. Stephanas and his household were baptized by Paul. As the church grew. Stephanas began to care for new Christians himself. Paul always retained a special affection for Stephanas, and was delighted when he visited him in Ephesus.

PRISCILLA

Meaning: Ancient
Appears: Acts 18; Rom. 16;
1 Cor. 16; 2 Tim. 4
Priscilla and Aquila, her
husband, worked closely
with Paul, and even risked
their lives for him. They
became loved and respected
in many churches in Greece
and Asia Minor. Unusually,
Priscilla's name is often
mentioned before Aquila's.

Aquila

Meaning: Eagle
Appears: Acts 18; Rom. 16;
1 Cor. 16; 2 Tim. 4
Aquila was a Jew from
Pontus who ran a successful
business in Rome. When
Claudius expelled the Jews
from Rome, he and his wife
traveled to Corinth where
they met Paul and became
Christians. They became
good friends with Paul, and

DEMETRIUS


Meaning: Servant of Demeter Appears: Acts 19 Demetrius was a silversmith in Ephesus. He made a good living selling silver images of the goddess Artemis, whose temple in Ephesus was visited by many people. Paul's ministry in Ephesus began to affect sales because people stopped buying idols. Demetrius persuaded his fellow craftsmen that the honor of Artemis was under threat. They started shouting, "Great is Artemis" and soon the city was in an uproar. Paul tried to speak to the crowd, but his friends stopped him. In the end, the city clerk quelled the riot.

IOHN'S REVELATION

The Book of Revelation, the last book in the Bible, was written by John. John's vision is a celebration of Jesus' triumph over death.


An angel of God told John to write his visions down and send them to the seven main churches in Asia. John's first

EUTYCHUS

Meaning: Lucky Appears: Acts 20 On his last evening in Troas, Macedonia, Paul was preaching and talking with a group of Christians. The heat from several lamps and the stuffy atmosphere in the room led Eutychus, a young man, to fall asleep on a thirdfloor window ledge. Unfortunately, Eutychus fell three stories to his death below. Everyone rushed downstairs and Paul embraced Eutychus. "Do not worry," he said, "he is alive!" Eutychus soon regained consciousness.

AGABUS

Meaning: Desire
Appears: Acts 11, 21
Agabus was a Christian
prophet from Jerusalem. He
predicted the famine that
caused great hardship in
Jerusalem. He also met Paul
during Paul's last journey
to Jerusalem and predicted
that he would be imprisoned
by the Romans there. Paul's
friends tried to persuade
him not to continue but
they failed. Agabus's
prophecy came true.

PHILEMON

Meaning: Kiss
Appears: Philemon
Philemon was a wealthy
Christian of Colossae, who
was converted by the apostle
Paul. Philemon had a slave
named Onesimus who ran
away but became a Christian
when he met Paul. Paul
sent him back to his master,
asking Philemon to receive
him as a "beloved brother."
