From the Desk of Fr. Alex.....

Happy New Year! As we step into January, the feast of the Epiphany arrives like a gentle reminder that faith is often about journeying forward. The Magi's story is one of courage and trust: they followed a distant star across deserts and unknown lands, seeking a truth they did not yet fully understand. In many ways, our parish life can feel like that too. As we stand on the threshold of a new calendar year, I know that some of our familiar routines may need to change. Certain ministries might need to adapt, evolve, or even come to an end. It can feel unsettling, like wandering through a quiet desert where we're unsure what comes next.

Yet the Epiphany teaches us that deserts are not places of despair, but of possibility. The Magi were not lost; they were guided by light. Each step they took brought them closer to encountering Christ. In the same way, whatever changes we face, let's trust that God's light still leads us. After all, the Epiphany celebrates recognition—the "aha!" moment when the Magi saw the Christ Child for who He truly was. If we allow the Spirit to guide us through these transitions, I believe we'll discover fresh opportunities to serve and grow. What might seem like a loss at first may open the door to something new and life-giving.

Looking beyond our own parish, the Church as a whole is celebrating a Jubilee Year in 2025. I recall with fondness the recent procession of diocesan parishes at the Cathedral, a beautiful sign of unity and hope. It's heartening to know that we are part of something bigger than ourselves. We're connected to a vast family of believers, journeying together toward deeper faith and understanding. This bigger picture gives me confidence that, despite the uncertainty of change, we're all walking under the same star, guided by the same love.

As schools reopen and daily life resumes its ordinary rhythm, let's keep our eyes on that guiding star. The Epiphany reminds us that hope lies ahead, not behind us. Even if some paths shift course, God's grace remains steady. So let's move forward with courage, trusting that through every detour and desert, Christ awaits us at the journey's end—ready to welcome us, transform us, and keep us growing together in faith.

¡Feliz Año Nuevo! Al comenzar enero y acercarnos a la Epifanía, recordamos que la fe es un camino que a veces nos lleva por terrenos nuevos. Los Reyes Magos siguieron una estrella, cruzando desiertos y lugares desconocidos, todo por encontrar una verdad más grande. A veces nuestra parroquia también enfrenta cambios. Tal vez ciertos ministerios necesitan adaptarse, algunos puedan terminar, o

debamos explorar nuevas formas de servir a nuestra comunidad. Estos momentos pueden sentirse como travesías por un desierto: silenciosas, un poco inciertas y hasta incómodas.

Sin embargo, la Epifanía nos enseña que el desierto no es un lugar de desesperanza, sino de posibilidades. Los Magos no estaban perdidos; seguían una luz que los guiaba. De la misma manera, cuando nosotros enfrentamos cambios, confiemos en que la luz de Dios sigue mostrándonos el camino. La Epifanía celebra el reconocimiento de Jesús como el Salvador por parte de los Reyes Magos. Ese "¡ajá!" de fe nos recuerda que, si dejamos que el Espíritu nos guíe, descubriremos nuevas oportunidades para servir, amar y crecer. Lo que al principio parece un final puede ser el inicio de algo mejor, algo que responda a las necesidades presentes de nuestra familia parroquial.

Además, toda la Iglesia se prepara para el Año Jubilar de 2025. Quizás suene lejano, pero la reciente procesión de muchas parroquias de la diócesis en la Catedral fue una hermosa señal de unidad. Nos muestra que somos parte de algo más grande que nosotros mismos. Este sentido de comunidad amplia nos anima a confiar en el futuro, incluso cuando no vemos con claridad lo que viene. Somos una familia de fe que camina junta, guiada por la misma estrella.

A medida que las escuelas reabren, que la vida cotidiana retoma su ritmo y que las luces navideñas se van guardando, no perdamos de vista la dirección de esa estrella.
