rst Reading: Micah 5:1-4a

MARY VISITS HER COUSIN ELIZABETH

"Blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb..." (Luke 1: 39-45)

Our Gospel on this Fourth Sunday of Advent is Saint Luke's account of the Visitation. When we reflect on Mary visiting her older cousin Elizabeth we are reminded that visiting is sacred. Spending time with people is sacred. This week, in keeping with the generous spirit of Christmas abundance, I want to share two reflections with you. Here is the first.

At the Denver airport, a 46-year-old woman is sitting at the gate waiting for her flight. She glances up to find a young man in front of her. Although there are several open seats around, he tilts his head at the seat next to her, then toward her suitcase blocking the chair. "Why this one?" she wonders. Mildly annoyed, she moves her bag.

He sits and drops his duffel bag at his feet. He is wearing a U.S. Army camouflage uniform. "Where you headed?" he asks. "Home," she replies.

He tells her that he has just come home from Afghanistan and is heading to Florida to surprise his mom. It's been five years since he's seen her. What he was most looking forward to, the woman asked. A shower, he said. He grinned when she asked if his mother would cook his favorite meal.

He says it was almost harder to leave the war than to stay, leaving others behind, knowing he had to go back. But this might be his last chance to see his mother.


The woman notices how he keeps scanning the room warily as he talks. How when he looks at her, his eyes keep no distance. He wants something from her, but at first she doesn't know what. He says it's hard to stop scanning for danger. Yesterday he was in the desert. Fellow soldiers, men under his command, had blown into pieces around him. Today he is in an airport trying to fathom anger over flight delays, the rush for coffee. He doesn't know how to be here in this place.

The woman understands. One week before, her friend's teenage son had died suddenly and, being a mother herself, felt so disoriented and distant from the everyday world around her. She tells the soldier about it. He breathes deeply, shows a small smile.

They had made a sliver of connection. The woman writes:

"He'd seen the raw and unbearable. He knew what was real and mattered. He knew it was not the time of the flight, or a latte. But he did not know how to tell us. This was what he needed from me, I realized. What we all need. He did not want the seat beside mine. He wanted to sit with me. He needed to feel safe and understood for a brief while between here and there."

A soldier finds an understanding "mom" to talk to in a busy airport; a teenage mother-to-be goes to be with her elderly cousin, also pregnant, and finds consolation and support. In both meetings, we see grace: love that enables one cousin to put aside her own plight to help the other cousin, compassion that enables a mom to provide a safe, understanding place for another mom's son. In Mary and Elizabeth's visit and in our own similar "visitations," the Spirit of God is present in the healing, comfort and support we can extend to one another in such moments. Whether bound by blood or by spirit, in Mary's Child the inexplicable love of God becomes real to us, the peace and justice of God become possible in our own "visitations" and encounters with all our sisters and brothers in whom God is present.

Here is a second reflection I hope you enjoy as well.

The journey of Edith Stein from atheism to God, from Jewish scholar to Carmelite nun, is one of the great odysseys of faith. The former Jewish-atheist scholar died as a Carmelite nun in the gas chamber of Auschwitz in 1942. Edith Stein - Sister Teresa Benedicta of the Cross - was canonized in 1998.

One of the most influential people in Edith's life was the philosopher Adolf Reinach, her professor at the University of Gottingen. In Reinach's writings and teachings, Edith began to see the wisdom of God illuminating the philosophical wisdom of the ages. Both Professor Reinach and his wife, Anna, were unstinting in their friendship and support to Edith, one of the very few women pursuing higher studies in the early days of the 20th century. Anna's friendship and counsel were especially valued by Edith.

At the outbreak of World War I, the wise and humble professor went off to fight for the German fatherland. Awarded the Iron Cross for his bravery, Reinach was killed in Flanders in 1917. When word of Reinach's death was received, the devastated Edith immediately went to comfort Reinach's young widow. Edith had no idea what to say. But it was Anna who provided hope and consolation to Edith. Despite her grief, Anna's trust in God and the meaning of the Cross seemed stronger than ever.

Edith later wrote of that moment: "It was my first encounter with the Cross and the divine power it bestows in those who carry it. For the first time I was seeing with my very own eyes the Church, born from its Redeemer's sufferings, triumphant over the sting of death. That was the moment when my unbelief collapsed and Christ shone forth - in the mystery of the Cross."

Edith and Anna's "visitation" was a turning point in Edith's own journey of faith, leading her to Christianity and baptism, to profession as a religious, and, finally, to the company of the saints. In today's Gospel, Mary travels "in haste" to be with her cousin Elizabeth. Luke never says exactly why she goes, but we can guess: Mary wants to be with her beloved cousin in the last months of what must have been a very difficult pregnancy, but also to seek the elder Elizabeth's counsel and support during her own tumultuous time. In Mary and Elizabeth's meeting and in our own similar "visitations," the Spirit of God is present in the healing, comfort and support we can extend to one another in such moments. In the stirring of the infant in Elizabeth's womb, God calls to humanity in every time and place: I am with you every step of the way. I am with you in every storm. I am with you when the night seems unending. In Christ's birth, the inexplicable love of God becomes real to us, the peace and justice of God become possible. (Connections)

JOYFUL RECOGNITION

Elizabeth recognized the divine significance of Mary's visit because of the Holy Spirit. In the Spirit Elizabeth proclaimed Mary's greatness and called her blessed. Mary was also praised because of her trust in God's word of promise.

Adults: How has the Holy Spirit stirred me to recognize God's presence?

Children: What can I learn from Mary's visit to Elizabeth?

A Family Perspective: The theme of the season of Advent is sometimes described as a period of waiting for the birth of Jesus. However, today's Gospel reading suggests something different. John the Baptist did not tell the crowds to wait for the Messiah. He told them to prepare for the Messiah through acts of repentance. If Advent is a time of waiting, it is not the sitting in the doctor's office kind of waiting. It is a busy time of preparation, more like the waiting we might do when preparing for dinner guests. Our challenge is to not make this season a frenzied time, but rather a time of joyful anticipation and making ready for God who comes to dwell among us and changes our lives with the gift of salvation. As you gather as a family, work together on a word search or hidden-picture puzzle. Help one another until everyone has found each of the words or pictures in the puzzle. Talk about this experience, noticing how some people found words or pictures more easily than others and how easy it was to see the word or picture once someone else pointed it out. Observe that sometimes we need the help of others to recognize God's presence and action in our lives. Read together today's Gospel, Luke 1:39-45. Ask: What did Elizabeth recognize about Mary? How did Elizabeth know this? Pray together that as we share our faith together as a family, we may help one another recognize God's presence and action in our lives. Pray together the Hail Mary.





Blessing of a Christmas Manger or Nativity Scene

In its present form the custom of displaying figures depicting the birth of Jesus Christ owes its origin to Saint Francis of Assisi who made the Christmas crèche or manger for Christmas eve of 1223. However, as early as the fourth century, representations of the nativity of the Lord were painted as wall decorations depicting not only the infancy narrative accounts of Christ's birth, but also the words of the prophets Isaiah and Habakkuk taken to mean that the Messiah would be born in the midst of animals in a manger. The blessing of the Christmas manger or nativity scene may take place on the Vigil of Christmas or at another more suitable time.

When the family has gathered, a suitable song may be sung. After the singing, the leader says: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All make the sign of the cross and reply: Amen.

The leader continues:

Praised be Jesus Christ, who dwells among us, now and for ever.

R: Amen.

In the following or similar words, the leader prepares those present for the blessing.

As we prepare to celebrate the birth of Christ, we pause to bless this Christmas manger scene. The practice of erecting such mangers was begun by Saint Francis of Assisi as a means to set forth the message of Christmas. When we look upon these figures, the Christmas Gospel comes alive and we are moved to rejoice in the mystery of the incarnation of the Son of God.

The leader or another person present reads a text of sacred Scripture.

Brothers and sisters, listen to the words of the Holy Gospel according to Luke:

2:1-8

In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that the whole world should be enrolled. This was the first enrollment, when Quirinius was governor of Syria. So all went to be enrolled, each to his own town. And Joseph too went up from Galilee from the town of Nazareth to Judea, to the city of David that is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and family of David, to be enrolled with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. While they were there, the time came for her to have her child, and she gave birth to her firstborn son. She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn.

Now there were shepherds in that region living in the fields and keeping the night watch over their flock.

The Gospel of the Lord.

R: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

The intercessions are then prayed. The leader says:

Let us ask for God's blessing on this Christmas manger and upon ourselves, that we who reflect on the birth of Jesus may share in the salvation he accomplished. Please respond, "Come, Lord, dwell with us."

- + For the church of God, as we recall the circumstances surrounding the birth of Christ, that we may always proclaim his gift of new life for all people, we pray to the Lord.

 R: Come, Lord, dwell with us.
- + For the world in which we live, that it may come to recognize Christ who was greeted by the angels and shepherds, we pray to the Lord. R: Come, Lord, dwell with us.
- + For our families and our homes, that Christ who was laid in the manger may dwell with us always, we pray to the Lord.

 R: Come, Lord, dwell with us.
- + For parents, that their love for their children may be modeled on that of the Virgin Mary and Saint Joseph, we pray to the Lord. R: Come, Lord, dwell with us.

After the intercessions the leader invites all present to say the Lord's Prayer.

All: Our Father...

The leader then says the following prayer with hands joined:

God of every nation and people, from the very beginning of creation you have made manifest your love; when our need for a Savior was great you sent your Son to be born of the Virgin Mary. To our lives he brings joy and peace, justice, mercy, and love.

Lord, bless all who look upon this manger; may it remind us of the humble birth of Jesus, and raise up our thoughts to him, who is God-with-us and Savior of all, and who lives and reigns for ever and ever.

R: Amen.

The leader concludes the rite by signing himself or herself with the sign of the cross and saying:

May Christ our God enlighten our hearts and minds, now and for ever.

R: Amen.

It is preferable to end the celebration with a suitable song.


