#### THE PARABLE OF THE PHARISEE AND THE TAX COLLECTOR

Jesus addressed this parable to those who were convinced of their own righteousness and despised everyone else. (Luke 18: 9-14)

Here is a reflection I hope you will enjoy.

He is hardly noticed. Waves of students and faculty move in and out of the building every day. He makes sure the floors and bathrooms are clean, that broken furniture and equipment are repaired and replaced without missing a beat. Some of the professors who have been around a few years will say a quick hello when they walk by, a couple of them actually know his name. During his time, more than forty graduating classes have been educated in this hall that he takes such conscientious care of, hardly noticed, taken for granted . . . like the tax collector.


They spend most of the night driving around the city ready for the call. An accident, a shooting, a bar fight, a "jumper." They're the first ones there to stop the bleeding, talk the poor soul down, clean up the mess. They get the victims to the hospital, often with just seconds to spare - and then they're back out on the streets. They stay on the edges, in the distance, doing their jobs, unheralded, never recognized . . . like the tax collector.

She is one of hundreds of nurses working in a large city hospital. Every shift, day or night, she works countless small miracles of compassion and mercy for the patients on her floor. To her, they are more than numbers and charts in the massive hospital system: they are the terrified child, the desperately-ill woman, the confused senior, the overwhelmed family. For her, mercy is something real, something that love makes possible . . . as the tax collector understands.

What would we do without these good and dedicated souls? But, often, we don't even see them or acknowledge them; we don't appreciate their presence in our lives; we seldom realize how much our community and society depends on them.

Maybe because there exists in each of us a bit of the Pharisee.

In our own time and place, the parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector is played out not so much as a lack of humility before God but as a lack of awareness of the gifts and contributions, as well



as the needs and hopes of those around us we have come to take for granted, whose work is considered of less importance or consequence than our own. The Gospel of Jesus challenges us to embrace the humble, God-centered faith of the tax collector, not the self-centered and self-absorbed claims of the Pharisee. We give thanks for God's love for us by returning that love to one another, by accepting one another as God has accepted us; we honor God as Father of us all by honoring one another as brothers and sisters. #### **KNOWING MY LIFE**

The Word of God summons us to an extraordinary level of self-knowledge. It is the self-knowledge that can only come to us as we stand before God in complete, honest reflection and discard, as best as we can, all self-serving distortions.

Adults: Who or what best helps me to look clearly and honestly at myself?

Children: When I listen to God's holy Word, how do I find out who I am?


A Family Perspective: In the family, one sometimes observes a level of competition between children for parent attention, for acknowledgement of their abilities. Somehow, children seem to internalize that the attention given to one member of the family diminishes the attention given to another. In this way, children can often sound like the Pharisee in Jesus' parable. As a family, talk about what it means to compare oneself to another. Discuss whether it is helpful to compare oneself to another. In what ways might this be positive? In what circumstances might this be unhelpful? Discuss: What was wrong about the prayer of the Pharisee? How can we emulate the prayer of the tax collector? Pray together as a family in thanksgiving for the blessing that is each member of your family. Pray that your family will be free from unhealthy competition.

- If you are unable to drop-off gifts after Masses on weekends, please drop them off at the Parish Office.

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












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# POPE FRANCIS ON LOVE IN THE FAMILY


very pope is called upon to take his own experience of the eternal truths of the Catholic faith and express them in words and actions that speak to the generation he serves. In doing so, he builds on the wisdom of those before him, while adding, as God demands, his own gifts.

In 1981, in response to a synod on the family, Pope John Paul II wrote On the Family (*Familiaris Consortio*), a document that gave the Church, especially those of us in family ministry, our marching orders. Now, thirty-five years later, comes another family synod and Pope Francis' apostolic exhortation The Joy of Love (*Amoris Laetitia*), from which we hope to be similarly instructed.

Readers who go to the text itself will be rewarded because much of the writing is informal, almost conversational. An astonishing number of topics are dealt with, and the pope himself suggests that people might start with the chapters that most pertain to them, taking the time to ponder the contents. The pope often returns to topics, approaching them from different lights and contexts. With this in mind, I believe there are three central ideas that can give a helpful perspective to the entire exhortation.

#### Spousal Love

Marriage is on Pope Francis' mind and heart more than anything else. To address it, he begins with Scripture. There is much advice about marriage in the Bible, but the pontiff's message goes deeper. The relation of a man and a woman in marriage is used as the key image to describe the relation between God and his people in the Old Testament and Christ and his Church in the New Testament. This is the heart of our Catholic sacramental understanding of marriage.



All of Pope Francis' pastoral advice about marriage, his suggestions for pastoral care of the family, and his concern for treating people outside the marital norm with sensitivity are driven by this key Catholic insight: *The purpose of marriage is not just to make two people happy; it is ultimately to tell the truth, through billions of individual stories, about God's love for us.* The stakes couldn't be higher, and, for this reason, marriage demands our attention and care.

Pope Francis briefly reviews Church teaching about marriage from the beginning to the most recent writings of Pope John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI.

In the lived, embodied experience of marriage, not only is love made visible, but so is God. Through the couple's commitment to each other, we get a glimpse of the kind of forever commitment God has for us. Through the friendship the couple develops, we see the kind of relationship God wants with us. Through the couple's passion for each other in all its searing intimacy, we see God's deepest desire and the reason for our being: *God created us to love us.* In Genesis, God says, "It is not good for...man to be alone" (2:18). It would seem it isn't good for God to be alone, either.

Such is the ideal laid out for marriage for all of us. There's only one problem: Marriage as it exists in the real world is far from ideal. It's often lived out poorly or not at all. Again, if marriage is to be all that it could be and should be, it needs our loving care. This brings us to Pope Francis' second area of focus.

#### Care of the Family

One of the most beautiful concepts in the exhortation is that of *accompaniment*. This concept is very much in line with Pope Francis' overall philosophy and, especially, with his emphasis on mercy. Accompaniment in this context means to walk alongside someone, sharing the journey, and doing one's best to empathize with and to aid the one being accompanied.

All of us—the Church as a whole and each one of us individually—are called to accompany families on their journey

to the fullness of God's vision. Usually our steps along the road toward wholeness are halting and mistake-filled. At the beginning, accompaniment is similar to a parent who's helping a child take his or her first few steps: encouraging, smiling, willing to help when the child falters, and trying to keep the child from harming himself or herself. Later on, accompaniment has larger elements of teaching and modeling.

At its most sophisticated, accompaniment resembles the walk Jesus took with the two disciples on the lengthy road from Jerusalem to Emmaus (see Luke 24:13–35), which might be called the first example of the New Evangelization. The newly resurrected Jesus was in no hurry to disclose himself. He listened carefully to the story the two disciples told of Jesus' crucifixion and death and the disappearance of his body from the tomb. Then, using Scripture, Jesus helped them make sense of their experience. At that point, the two disciples were so captivated that they wouldn't let Jesus go until he broke bread with them.

Pope Francis says we're called to walk the path of Emmaus with families, especially those families who haven't yet reached the fullness of the teaching of the Catholic Church. The ways in which Pope Francis suggests we do this constitute the new marching orders for Catholic family ministry.

Marriage Preparation. Couples need to be caught—I would almost say intoxicated—by the Catholic Christian vision of marriage. The transfiguration, dying, and rising of Jesus must be lived out in every marriage as couples experience their own mountaintop experiences, their own little deaths, and their own experiences of new life. Through their relationship with Jesus and the sacraments of the Church, couples can unite their own experience of the paschal mystery with Jesus.

That vision can be explained with words, but the engaged couple needs to see it lived out in the married couples they come into contact with. In addition, couples need to learn the relationship skills that Pope Francis explains with such insight and affection. Finally, the entire Christian community must in some way support them and walk with them.



**Early years and children.** The challenge continues during the early years of marriage where the unitive and the procreative ends of marriage must both be supported. Pope Francis devotes much time talking about children. He emphasizes attention to, but not obsession with, their needs. We're to strive to be aware of "where our children are at" existentially and spiritually, and not just physically.

**Diverse experiences of family life.** The pope is both moving and effective as he talks about the challenges to love as a couple ages. The pope also singles out for pastoral care couples in interchurch and interfaith marriages, couples facing crises that threaten their marriages, the widowed, the divorced, and the single parent, as well as divorced and remarried Catholics, noting the recent changes in annulment procedures designed to make them more efficient.

Same-sex relationships are not to be equated to marriage, but should be given "respectful pastoral guidance" (*AL* 250).

Immigrant families and families with children with special needs, linked in the exhortation, are both forced to navigate unfamiliar territory.

The pope is striking in his language, suggesting that even people who are in situations that aren't in agreement with the Church's teaching can still grow in grace as they try to make the best possible decisions within their own range of options. Life gets "wonderfully complicated," says the pope, when we journey with people in their real-life situations (*AL* 308).

#### **Church Teaching and Discernment**

Pope Francis devotes a good deal of attention to the relationship between Church teaching and conscience and the process of discernment that connects the two. The pope offers a clear definition of marriage (see chapter 8): "Christian marriage, as a reflection of the union between Christ and his Church, is fully realized in the union between a man and a woman who give themselves to each other in a free, faithful and exclusive love, who belong to each other until death and are open to the transmission of life, and are consecrated by the sacrament, which grants them the grace to become a domestic church and a leaven of new life for society" (292).

However, the pope points out that there are many people in situations where the ability to choose the ideal has eluded them for a variety of reasons. The pope is very aware of what might be called "moral imperialism": imagining that people are free to make moral decisions, unaffected by their particular life situations. The pope won't let us avert our glance from the realities of poverty, difficult social

environments, traumatizing family situations, and other unjust settings that people are born into, which all affect their ability to make the best choices. Indeed, he says that a person who has to make a compromised decision in "the heat of battle" might deserve greater praise than somebody who has the leisure to make good choices under easier circumstances.

Pope Francis says, "We have been called to form consciences, not to replace them" (AL 37). We are called to walk with people, including those in imperfect situations, and through our own word and example do our best to bring both us and them toward wholeness. To suggest, however, that we're only honor bound to follow conscience if it's been in every way conformed to the teaching of the Church is to indeed make conscience replaceable. The call is first to pray honestly and sincerely to do God's will. Second, we're to listen carefully to the voice of the Church and to other tested sources of wisdom. After forming our conscience as best as we can, we make our decision with humility and respect for the teaching authority of the Church while staying open to more wisdom in the future.

#### **Bending Toward Mercy**

This document was written and released during the Year of Mercy. When a tree leans too far in one direction, the solution is to tie it down in the other direction for a while so when it's released, it stands straight up. The pope is encouraging us to bend toward mercy. During the Year of Mercy, we're asked to reach out in a special way to those who are trying to love in difficult situations, partly of their own choosing, and partly not. Dorothy Day, who spent her life in service to the poor, said her mission was to work for a world where "it was easier to be good." Our care for families must be embedded in a larger vision of caring for the world.

However, we have fundamentally misjudged what Pope Francis means by mercy if we think it implies letting somebody off easy or letting somebody "off the hook." The person the Lord shows mercy to, the Lord chooses, not for less, but for more. He lifts us toward the sky, he doesn't drop us

below. He calls us not to defeat, but to what the Bible calls *hesed*—a life of righteous and wholehearted living.

Our call is to balance empathy and clarity. Yes, the Church circles the wagons, making very clear our structure of beliefs, but we must then bring our wounded into the center, not the periphery, of Church life. It's been said, "Love without truth is sentimentality. But truth without love is arrogance." Our call, as always, is to speak the truth, and live the truth, in love.

DIG DEEPER

Look: How does your family interaction relay the message of God's love and commitment?

Judge: Do we embrace the reality of family "messiness" in our own family and those we encounter?

Act: How can you and your family be a source of encouragement and an example of mercy to others in your community?



## **QUOTING POPE FRANCIS**

#### ON FAMILY

• It is my hope that... all will feel called to love and cherish family life, for "families are not a problem; they are first and foremost an opportunity" (AL 7).

• The family is also a sign of

Christ. It manifests the closeness of God who is a part of every human life, since he became one with us through his Incarnation, death and resurrection (AL 161).

#### **ON MARRIAGE**

- We need to find the right language, arguments and forms of witness that can help us reach the hearts of young people, appealing to their capacity for generosity, commitment, love and even heroism, and in this way inviting them to take up the challenge of marriage with enthusiasm and courage (AL 40).
- After the love that unites us to God, conjugal love is the "greatest form of friendship." It is a union possessing all the traits of a good friendship: concern for the good of the other, reciprocity, intimacy, warmth, stability and the resemblance born of a shared life (AL 123).

#### **ON IMPERFECT SITUATIONS**

- Seeing things with the eyes of Christ inspires the Church's pastoral care for the faithful....Following this divine pedagogy, "the Church turns with love to those who participate in her life in an imperfect manner: she seeks the grace of conversion for them; she encourages them to do good, to take loving care of each other and to serve the community in which they live and work....When a couple in an irregular union attains a noteworthy stability through a public bond—and is characterized by deep affection, responsibility toward the children and the ability to overcome trials—this can be seen as an opportunity, where possible, to lead them to celebrate the sacrament of Matrimony" (AL 78).
- Although she constantly holds up the call to perfection and asks for a fuller response to God, "the Church must accompany with attention and care the weakest of her children, who show signs of a wounded and troubled love, by restoring in them hope and confidence, like the

beacon of a lighthouse in a port or a torch carried among the people to enlighten those who have lost their way or who are in the midst of a storm" (AL 291).

#### ON DIVORCE AND REMARRIAGE


• It is important that the divorced who have entered a new union should be made to feel part of the Church. "They are not excommunicated" and they should not be treated as such, since they remain part of the ecclesial community.... The Christian community's care of such persons is not to be considered a weakening of its faith and testimony to the indissolubility of marriage; rather, such care is a particular expression of its charity" (AL 243).

#### **ON MERCY**

- "The Church's way...has always been the way of Jesus, the way of mercy and reinstatement....The way of the Church is not to condemn anyone forever; it is to pour out the balm of God's mercy on all those who ask for it with a sincere heart....For true charity is always unmerited, unconditional and gratuitous." Consequently, there is a need "to avoid judgments which do not take into account the complexity of various situations" and "to be attentive, by necessity, to how people experience distress because of their condition" (AL 296).
- I understand those who prefer a more rigorous pastoral care which leaves no room for confusion. But I sincerely believe that Jesus wants a Church attentive to the goodness which the Holy Spirit sows in the midst of human weakness.... The Church's pastors, in proposing to the faithful the full ideal of the Gospel and the Church's teaching, must also help them to treat the weak with compassion, avoiding aggravation or unduly harsh or hasty judgments (AL 308).

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
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
