
Our first reading praises the pursuit of Lady Wisdom. Those who seek God's way before anything else will find authentic wealth.

GIVE TO THE POOR!

Jesus said to the rich young man: "You are lacking one thing. Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." At that statement his face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions.

"... there is no one who has given up house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or lands for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not receive a hundred times more now in this present age ... "(Mark 10: 17-30)

Jesus continues to instruct us about the requirements of discipleship. Here is a reflection I hope you will enjoy.

"So what must I do to inherit eternal life?" the rich young man asks Jesus. Jesus' reply: "Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor." "And the young man walked away sad," Mark writes, "for he had many possessions."

No doubt.

"I knew it," he muttered as he walked away, "another bleeding-heart, sunshine-and-lollipops dogooder. *Sell what you have and give to the poor.* Sure. Easy for him. He has nothing. Easy to suggest giving away other people's money. It's always the same spiel.

And even if I did — like it's really going to make a difference? If I sell everything, I might make a few people less poor for a while, but what really changes? Nothing.

Treasure in the next life is one thing — but what about *this* life, now? Jesus, you don't have a business, a mortgage or students loans to pay off. How can I just walk away from those responsibilities? Being poor is better than rich? Trust me. It's not.

Who pays the taxes that supports programs for the poor? Who pays workers so they can feed their families? Who supports the temple and the schools and academies?

Sell what you have and give to the poor?

Sorry I asked, Jesus. Just another one of those traveling religious medicine shows. He talks a great line — but that's not the way life is. Jesus, you just don't get it."

Or is it the rich young man who doesn't get it? Listen carefully to what Jesus says in today's



Gospel: Jesus doesn't condemn wealth and possessions as evil in themselves — what is evil is when the pursuit of wealth and riches displaces God as the center of our lives, when material wealth becomes the focus of our existence, when what we own owns us. Given the choice between the life of God and the life of materialism, the young man opts for the latter. May we possess the faith to center our lives on the things of God, to embrace the "wisdom and prudence" (Reading 1) to realize that the things we have are not an end in themselves but the means for living lives of meaning and purpose and re-creating our world in the justice and peace God. THE WAY OF WISDOM

The difficulty for the rich to enter into the Kingdom of God is like the impossibility of a camel going through the eye of a needle. Jesus responds to the confusion of the disciples over this puzzling statement by explaining that "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible." (Mark 10:27)

Adults: In what impossible situations have I experienced God's wondrous intervention?

Children: When has God helped me through a difficult circumstance?

A Family Perspective: Today's Gospel might make us uncomfortable about our possessions. This discomfort offers us an opportunity to consider our possessions and our family's commitment to the poor. Material possessions are a necessity in our culture. Our use of these possessions and our attitude about their importance is our choice, however. It is a choice we can make with the awareness that our faith in Jesus commits us to show our care for the poor.

As you gather as a family, consider together these questions: Would it be possible to inventory our possessions? Are there things in our house that we no longer need or use? What might we do with these things? Read together today's Gospel, Mark 10:17-30. Talk about the warning about material possessions that Jesus gives in this Gospel. How does this make you feel? Choose an action that helps your family show its commitment to the poor.

THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK **OCTOBER 17 AT 1:00 P.M.**

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick will be administered to those needing to be anointed after the 12:00 p.m. Mass on Sunday, October 17 at 1 p.m.

Often, when people are sick, they get discouraged, depressed, angry, annoyed, and afraid. The Church believes that the sacrament offers a special grace to calm the spirit. If physical recovery is God's will, so be it. If not, then the person needs the grace, strength, and encouragement to bear the illness with dignity.

In the Church's Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, through the ministry of the priest, it is Jesus who touches the sick to heal them from sin – and sometimes even from physical ailment. His cures were signs of the arrival of the Kingdom of God. The core message of his healing tells us of his plan to conquer sin and death by his dving and rising.

The Catholic belief of redemptive suffering, that is, uniting your own suffering with the crucified Jesus, gives a person's unavoidable suffering meaning and purpose. This notion is explicitly and implicitly expressed in the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

OCTOBER IS RESPECT LIFE MONTH

Each year the Church in the United States celebrates October as Respect Life Month. This is a time we can use to deepen our understanding of why, as Catholics, we "Respect Life" and what that looks like day-to-day.

We are also in the midst of celebrating the Year of St. Joseph. So, this year, we are looking to the witness of St. Joseph as a defender of life. He didn't hesitate to follow God's will of faithfully caring for and protecting Jesus and the Blessed Mother. St. Joseph's example reminds us that we are also to care for, protect, and defend the lives of our brothers and sisters.

In the Bible, we see that St. Joseph makes sacrifices out of his love for Jesus and Mary. Over and over, he shows himself to be a faithful protector of them both.

After an angel of God appeared to St. Joseph in a dream, he welcomed Mary into his home, even though her pregnancy was mysterious. On the long road to Bethlehem, Joseph guided and provided for Mary and the unborn Christ Child. He welcomed Jesus as his own son in a humble stable and loved Him with a father's heart. When the infant Jesus' life was threatened by Herod, Joseph left the comfort and familiarity of his homeland and fled to Egypt with Mary and Jesus to protect Him. And as Jesus was growing up, He learned from Joseph to do the will of the Father. In every circumstance, St. Joseph cared for, defended, and protected the gift of life that had been given by God.

During this Respect Life Month, we can start to become more like St. Joseph by asking ourselves a few questions and reflecting on them: Do we realize how precious every person is? As we go about our day, do we treat people accordingly? How can we help those in our society who are struggling to welcome new life, like moms who are pregnant or parenting in difficult circumstances? How can we reach out to those having a hard time seeing the worth of their own lives? How do we reassure those at the end of life who are afraid they are a burden or feel like their lives don't have meaning?

At times, we may feel like we can't make a difference, or that we're unequipped for what God is asking of us. But St. Joseph "teaches us that faith in God includes believing that he can work even through our fears, our frailties and our weaknesses" (PC, 2). When human life is threatened, when our brothers and sisters need support welcoming or embracing life, may we lovingly respond with the faithfulness of Joseph.


