June 5, 2022 Pentecost Sunday

PENTECOST

Jesus breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit." (John 20: 19-23)

On Pentecost Sunday we celebrate the birthday of the Church when the Holy Spirit came down upon the Apostles. Here is a reflection I hope you will enjoy.

She was flying home from three weeks in Vietnam, the latest of several trips she made to Southeast Asia to work on a Habitat for Humanity project in the Mekong Delta. He was a military officer called to Washington for meetings. He served on a nuclear submarine, part of the "silent service" that conducted around-the-clock surveillance in the region — nuclear weapons at the ready.

They came from different worlds, different perspectives, different generations. On this twenty-hour flight from Narita, Japan to Washington, D.C., they found themselves seated next to each other. Their unexpected conversation turned out to be an experience she would never forget.

"She" is novelist Nicole d'Entremont (**City of Belief** and **A Generation of Leaves**). In an essay in **Commonweal** Magazine [February 2021], she reflects on her conversation with "David":

"First, I was shocked at how much I agreed with what he was saying, though I am against nuclear arms and war. My trips to Vietnam are partly an extension of my belief that the United States owes reparations to the Vietnamese people for our country's actions during the war. But, at the same time, I respected much of what David was saying about duty and service; strangely, I also saw a connection between his conception of service and vigilance and the life of the Benedictine monks at a monastery I sometimes visit. Certain words David used reminded me of the prayers that those monks say around the clock . . .

"I learned from David that his missions sometimes lasted for 120 days or more, in a hushed underwater environment with one-hundred-plus other service members in close quarters. They live a regulated life, charged with work that must be performed at regular intervals around the clock. The safety of the ship and crew depends on this work being done well. I respected the devotion to that duty as I respected the devotion of the monks who prayed around the clock. Both groups, I believe, feel they are defending a sleeping and vulnerable world from the terrors of the night and the arrows that fly by day." For Nicole d'Entremont, her encounter with the submarine officer was not about the morality of war but the call to service.

"Do we as ordinary citizens not bound by oaths to country or religion have a mission or a duty to serve the wider community? Do we have a social expectation of engagement, one that we treat not as an extraneous burden but as something to be honored and encouraged? I saw in David someone who was not embarrassed to use those words: *Duty. Mission. Service.* Are these words now considered too naïve and old-fashioned, even dangerous? Maybe the question is itself naïve. Or maybe I need an answer."

The Spirit of God was animating this conversation, enabling two people from very different world-views and experiences to find a place of shared understanding and respect. This is the Pentecost event: the Spirit of God



opening our hearts and spirits to recognize the good of all in our midst and God's call to everyone who would follow his Christ to employ the talents and resources God has entrusted to us for the common good. The Spirit of God overcomes the barriers of language and perception and experience, opening not only our minds but our hearts to hear the voice of God in the context of God's peace, justice and compassion, enabling us to hear what God actually speaks and not what we want or hope or wish to hear. Pentecost is the awareness of that Spirit at work in our relationships, the peace that Jesus "breathes" into our churches and communities. (Connections)

BREATHING IN THE SPIRIT

The Spirit who Christ gives us is a Spirit of reconciliation. After breathing on the disciples, Jesus tells them that whatever sins they forgive will be forgiven. If we are to follow the Risen Lord, we must be agents of forgiveness to others.

Adults: Am I aware of someone I need to forgive? Am I willing to take one step to make reconciliation more possible?

Children: Am I sometimes mean to others? Am I willing to treat them better because Jesus asks me to do so?

A Family Perspective: Within the family, the domestic Church, we learn how to forgive and we learn to accept forgiveness. It is the gift of the Holy Spirit that enables us to do both. As you gather together as a family, sit quietly for a few minutes, inviting all to reflect upon their need to forgive and to receive forgiveness. If there is a situation or issue within the family that needs attention, spend some time reflecting upon the concern and how your family might address it. Talk together about how Jesus gave us the gift of the Holy Spirit to help us in the work of forgiveness and to bring us peace.

CORPUS CHRISTI FOOD COLLECTION FOR THE POOR

Catholic Charities here in our Diocese continues to be "the hands of Christ" in a world in need of greater compassion and service. Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, Catholic Charities' 3 food pantries (Fr. English Center in Paterson, Hope House in Dover, and Partnership for Social Services in Franklin) have helped more people than ever before in their 80-year history. Prior to the pandemic, these pantries assisted 5,000 individuals monthly. Now they help feed over 20,000 children, women, and men each month.

Over the past 9 years, the Corpus Christi Food Drive has helped bring in needed food, hygiene items, and funds for Catholic Charities' Food Pantries. Over the last 2 years, these drives have been held virtually. I am proud to announce that in 2022, in this *Year of the Eucharist*, we are bringing the Corpus Christi Food Drive back to a live (in person) format.

This year, I ask you and your parish community to participate in the Corpus Christi Food Drive to enable our Catholic Charities to provide help and create hope. Every summer, the demands upon food pantries escalate. Catholic Charities is one of the most important local sources of food for thousands of our brothers and sisters in genuine need - particularly children.

Celebrating Sixty Years a Priest

Monsignor Kenneth Lasch, (Father Ken), 85, of Morristown, NJ, will soon celebrate the sixtieth jubilee of his priesthood. This will be commemorated and celebrated by Catholics and many others in town, and across the state and country. Loved, deeply respected, and admired by all for his courage, commitment, and example, this dedicated pastor took "the road less traveled, and that has made all the difference."

Fr. Ken recalls: "Notwithstanding many fruitful and life-giving experiences throughout my years as a priest and my advocacy for victims of abuse, my life as a pastor is by far what energized me more than any other experience. Assignments at St Therese Parish in Paterson (1975-1978) and St Joseph Parish in Mendham (1983-2004) were a taste of Camelot. I was energized by the incredible enthusiasm and involvement of parishioners in the life of these parishes. I could write a book about each and all of these exceptional experiences."



People ask Fr. Ken what has kept him faithful to his ministry as a priest. "I believe my vocation to the priesthood has been a gift in all honesty. Christ has been at the center of my life as a priest. In the words of St. Paul, 'By God's grace, I am what I am, and God's grace to me has not been in vain.' So, I really cannot take credit for anything I have accomplished. There is a higher power at work in my life. The vibrant celebration of the Eucharist amid a Christian assembly is a microcosm of what the Church is called to be — a diverse community centered in Christ. That's what gives life to my ministry and keeps us connected with the Church at large as the people of God. How can I not be grateful?"

These days, Father Ken appears to be at great peace with his choices and continues to be hopeful and contemplative. "Though I remain just inside of the outer edge and sometimes just outside of the outer edge--I have always been on the cutting edge pushing the limits--I remain a 'radical centrist,' loyal and hopeful that honest and open dialogue will bear fruit over time. I think I would like to be remembered as a person of integrity and respect, persistent but patient in the pursuit of goals. Inclusive and collaborative. A good listener. Responsive to crises without panic."

As Al Florin said, "People had enormous trust in Father Ken. They bravely shared their stories with him, and together they changed the world." And as Father Ken Lasch counsels, "We just need to keep sowing seeds; God will do the rest."


