GATHER IN PRAYER


Pray the Rosary weekdays 20 minutes before the 12:05 p.m. Mass. On Thursdays, the Rosary before 12:05 Mass is offered for priests and for vocations to the priesthood.

First Reading: Exodus 17:3-7
This first reading

This first reading comes from the book of Exodus. During their trek from the oppression of Egypt to the freedom of God's promise, the people of Israel again experience God's life-giving concern for them.

Second Reading: Romans 5:1-2, 5-8
In his letter to the early Church in Rome, Paul recounts how God's life-giving concern has brought sinful and godless Gentiles into the love of God's Spirit. Through Christ's death, God's love has been powerfully manifest.

In this passage from the Gospel of John, Jesus is portrayed as the embodiment of God's life-giving concern. After questioning Jesus about three important issues in Samaritan theology, a Samaritan woman is energized with new life. By evangelizing an entire town, she becomes this Gospel's first Christian missionary.

OUR DEEPER QUESTIONINGS


Vatican II's pastoral constitution on the Church in the Modern World (Gaudium et spes) has some beautiful paragaraph's about the deep questions we all have as we live in our modern world. In this space today, I want to share with you a bit of what the Council fathers wrote. I think that you will find this informative and consoling and I also hope it will whet your appetite and encourage you to read or re-read this entire document and others from Vatican II. The Council taught that Christ is the One who brings hope to this suffering world.

Since all these things are so, the modern world shows itself at once powerful and weak, capable of the noblest deeds or the foulest; before it lies the path to freedom or to slavery, to progress or retreat, to brotherhood or hatred. Moreover, man is becoming aware that it is his responsibility to guide aright the forces which he has unleashed and which can enslave him or minister to him. That is why he is putting questions to himself.

10. The truth is that the imbalances under which the modern world labors are linked with that more basic imbalance which is rooted in the heart of man. For in man himself many elements wrestle with one another. Thus, on the one hand, as a creature he experiences his limitations in a multitude of ways; on the other he feels himself to be boundless in his desires and summoned to a higher life. Pulled by manifold attractions he is constantly forced to choose among them and renounce some. Indeed, as a weak and sinful being, he often does what he would not, and fails to do what he would. Hence he suffers from internal divisions, and from these flow so many and such great discords in society. No doubt many whose lives are infected with a practical materialism are blinded against any sharp insight into this kind of dramatic situation; or else, weighed down by unhappiness they are prevented from giving the matter any thought. Thinking they have found serenity in an interpretation of reality everywhere proposed these days, many look forward to a genuine and total emancipation of humanity wrought solely by human effort; they are convinced that the future rule of man over the earth will satisfy every desire of his heart. Nor are there lacking men who despair of any meaning to life and praise the boldness of those who think that human existence is devoid of any inherent significance and strive to confer a total meaning on it by their own ingenuity alone.

Nevertheless, in the face of the modern development of the world, the number constantly swells of the people who raise the most basic questions or recognize them with a new sharpness: what is man? What is this sense of sorrow, of evil, of death, which continues to exist despite so much progress? What purpose have these victories purchased at so high a cost? What can man offer to society, what can he expect from it? What follows this earthly life?

The Church firmly believes that Christ, who died and was raised up for all, can through His Spirit offer man the light and the strength to measure up to his supreme destiny. Nor has any other name under the heaven been given to man by which it is fitting for him to be saved. She likewise holds that in her most benign Lord and Master can be found the key, the focal point and the goal of man, as well as of all human



history. The Church also maintains that beneath all changes there are many realities which do not change and which have their ultimate foundation in Christ, Who is the same yesterday and today, yes and forever. Hence under the light of Christ, the image of the unseen God, the firstborn of every creature, the council wishes to speak to all men in order to shed light on the mystery of man and to cooperate in finding the solution to the outstanding problems of our time. (Gaudium et spes. Nn 9-10)

LEAVING THE GOOD FOR THE BEST

The spiritual journey of the Woman of Samaria is a gradual one. It begins with suspicion, recognizing Jesus as "a Jew." Soon, she recognizes him as "a prophet." Finally, she sees him as "the Messiah." Step by step she finds eternal life.

Adults: Can I identify a moment in my life that could be validly called a conversion? What did I turn from and turn to?

Children: Have I ever stopped doing something that I knew was not what God wanted me to do?

Family: Lent is a season for repentance. It is a season during which we are called to reflect upon and to live deeply the promises of Baptism. The well and the conversation about water immediately recall for us the Sacrament of Baptism. As the Samaritan woman was converted and sent on a mission because of the conversation about water, we too are converted and sent by our Baptism to preach the good news of Jesus to others. If you have photos or other mementos of your family's Baptisms, bring them out and take some time to recall the day of Baptism and its importance to you and your family. Create a prayer table that includes these mementos and a bowl of holy water. Then, invite everyone to listen carefully and prayerfully to today's Gospel. Read John 4:5-42 together. Ask how Jesus' meeting with the woman at the well is like Baptism. (Jesus knows the woman's sin and forgives her. The woman comes to know Jesus as the Messiah. The woman invites others to meet Jesus.) Pray a prayer of blessing for each member of the family that God will help each one live the promises of his or her Baptism. Pray together the Lord's Prayer.




OCIA RITE OF ELECTION


On March 9, 174 catechumens became the elect, moving a step closer to being welcomed as full members of the Catholic Church at this year's Rite of Election ceremony at St. John the Baptist Cathedral in Paterson on the First Sunday of Lent. These adults, teens, and children will receive the Sacraments of Initiation — baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist — at the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday, April 19. Bishop Kevin J. Sweeney formally selected — or elected —them at the Rite of Election that he presided over in English and Spanish. The ceremony formally sets the newly elected toward full sacramental unity with the Church.

The catechumens have been studying the tenets of Catholicism through their parish's Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) program. This is the Church's official process by which new members are prepared for the sacraments of baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist. The program was previously called the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

In his homily, Bishop Sweeney echoed Pope Francis' call for the elect — and Catholics everywhere — to become Pilgrims of Hope during this Jubilee Year of Hope. "Our world needs hope. Too many of our young people and adults and others are sad or depressed or worried...Yes, the cross is there — the difficulties and challenges — but we have something to offer. When our world is hurting and in pain, we can offer to someone we meet on the journey a gift of hope. God is with us. We're not alone. He can give us peace and healing."


