irst Reading: Acts 5:12-16


For the next few weeks our first reading, which usually comes from the Hebrew Scriptures, is taken This New instead from the Acts of the Apostles. Testament book is the companion volume to the Gospel of Luke and was written around the year 85. As is evident in today's passage, one of Luke's favorite themes is that the reconciling and healing power of Jesus lives in the family of the Church.

econd Reading: Revelation 1:9-13, 17-19

During this Easter Season, our second reading will come from the book of Revelation. This book was written around the year 95 during a persecution of Christians in Asia Minor by the Roman emperor. Fearful of what could happen if his letter fell into Roman hands, the author, John of Patmos, wrote in a very symbolic style that only believers could easily understand. Due to this deliberate secrecy, the book of Revelation is often misinterpreted today.

🖔 <u>ospel: John 20:19-31</u>

This Gospel reading is the original ending of the Gospel of John. In explaining why he wrote his Gospel, the author suggests to us that authentic faith is based not on seeing spectacular signs, but on believing the Word made flesh.

THE SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER: DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus stood in their midst and said to them,

"Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

[Jesus] said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." (John 20: 19-31)

We continue to rejoice on this Sunday within the Octave of Easter also known as Divine Mercy Sunday. Here is a reflection I hope you will enjoy.

When many of us were children, we took part in our parish's religious education program. For eight years, we learned the prayers and rituals of our Church. In high school, we were confirmed. Soon many of us were off to college — and "church" may have been put aside as we earned our degree and, after graduation, establishing our career. Then we married and began a family — and our faith took on a renewed importance as we wanted our children to have the same connection to God that we had.

That's the "first half" of a typical spiritual life when we learned the language and choreography of a religious institution. We learned the words and rituals for articulating our faith; we established a spiritual identity in belonging to a church community. The values and beliefs of faith we learned then became a bridge to instill those same values and beliefs in our children.

But then came a crisis in our life — an unexpected illness or death, a divorce, a financial setback, a lost job. After that crisis, we entered the "second half" of the spiritual life, one in which we hear a "deeper voice" of God. It's a voice calling us to compassion, forgiveness, risk, surrender.

We now hear God not just in the rituals and creeds of our church; we hear God in the deepest part of our heart. Our faith is now fully ours. [Adapted from Falling Upward by Richard Rohr.]

The apostle Thomas might be considered the patron saint of this "second half" of our spiritual lives — when we struggle to make sense of lives that have been turned upside down by crisis or catastrophe. In today's Gospel, Thomas feels that the faith he experienced and



embraced in Jesus has been betrayed in Jesus' crucifixion. But, in his resurrection, Jesus offers Thomas a reason to hope, a base line for belief, a prism for looking at the world with gratitude for what has been and what will be. Faith in the "second half" of our lives is the ability to hope that we can transform and remake, re-create and re-focus

our lives in the love of God and life of the Risen Christ. (Connections)

I'LL BELIEVE IT WHEN I SEE IT

There is a doubting Thomas in all of us. We say we believe, but when we lose a loved one, we often express our doubts about the Resurrection: "After all, nobody has come back to tell the story."

Adults: In a similar situation, would I react like Thomas and demand to touch Jesus' wounds in order to believe?

Children: How am I sharing the peace of Christ with my friends?

A Family Perspective: Within normal family life, there are many opportunities for conflict. Jesus did not promise us the absence of conflict in our lives. Instead, he gave us the gifts of peace, forgiveness, and reconciliation so that we could reduce conflict. The measure of Christian family life is not the absence of conflict, but the manner in which conflict is resolved. Filled with the gift of the Holy Spirit, we ask Jesus to help us to bring peace and forgiveness to situations of conflict in our families. As your family gathers, take this opportunity to examine how your family resolves conflict. Recall a recent argument or disagreement and discuss how the conflict was resolved. Consider whether the conflict was resolved peacefully, in the spirit of Jesus. If not, discuss alternatives that might be tried in the future. Recall that we have each received Jesus' gift of the Holy Spirit and that the Holy Spirit helps us to be people who forgive others and seek peace.



Papal Succession: Mourning, Transition, and the Election of a New Pope

The death of a pope marks the beginning of a solemn and deeply symbolic transition for the Catholic Church. After the official confirmation of death, the Church enters a nine-day mourning period, followed by the process of electing a new Bishop of Rome. This period is steeped in tradition and draws global attention.

Initial Protocol

Following the Pope's passing, the Camerlengo (Chamberlain) is responsible for confirming the death. Traditionally, the Camerlengo would tap the Pope's forehead with a silver hammer and call out his baptismal name three times. However, this practice has been discontinued, and the verification now occurs through other means, such as medical confirmation. Once the death is officially declared, the Camerlengo notifies senior church officials and the people of Rome. The Camerlengo then seals the papal apartments and other offices, a tradition that originated to prevent looting and now serves as a symbolic end to the Pope's rule. The Vatican enters into a nine

-day mourning period, during which multiple Masses are held in honor of the late Pope. According to the Universi Dominici Gregis constitution, which governs papal transitions, the Pope must be buried between the fourth and sixth day after death. Before the burial, the Pope's body lies in state, allowing the public to pay their respects. The funeral, held in St. Peter's Square, is attended by world leaders and thousands of Catholics. Pope Franics will be laid to rest in Santa Maria Maggiore Basilica in Rome.

The Interregnum

The period between popes, known as the Interregnum, is a crucial time for the future of the Vatican. During this time, the College of Cardinals oversees the Church's administration, but no significant decisions are made. The conclave, the process of electing a new pope, begins 15-20 days after the Pope's passing. Only cardinals under the age of 80 are eligible to vote, which typically includes around 120 cardinals. Before voting, they take an oath of secrecy and are secluded in the Sistine Chapel, cut off from outside influences. The election requires multiple rounds of voting until a candidate receives a two-thirds majority. If no decision is reached after several rounds, a day of prayer and reflection is held before resuming the vote. Throughout this period, the world watches for smoke signals from the Sistine Chapel: black smoke indicates an inconclusive vote, while white smoke announces the election of a new pope.

Once a pope is chosen, the dean of the College of Cardinals asks the elected candidate if he accepts the position and invites him to choose a papal name. The new pope is then introduced from the balcony overlooking St. Peter's Square, where the words "Habemus Papam" (We have a Pope) are proclaimed, and he gives his first blessing to the crowd.

The passing of a pope is not only the end of a leader's reign but also the beginning of a sacred transition for the Catholic Church. From the solemn mourning period to the historic conclave, these traditions reflect the Church's deep-rooted customs and continuity. The election of a new pope marks the start of a new chapter, interweaving tradition with the future of the Vatican and the global Catholic community.



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


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
