




Easter Sunday, Year C

Luke 24 March 27, 2016

PREPARING FOR NEXT WEEK'S LITURGY

Second Sunday of Easter

First Reading: Acts 5.12-16

During the seven weeks of Easter, the first reading is from the Acts of the Apostles. Its author, Luke, saw the history of salvation in three great stages: First, found in the Old Testament, God's Spirit raises up leaders and prophets to guide the people; second, found in Luke's Gospel, the Spirit anoints Jesus as God's holy one; and third, described in Acts of the Apostles, the Spirit works in the Church, fulfilling Christ's promise to be with us until the end of time.

Second Reading: Revelation 1.9-19

This year during the Easter Season, the second reading each Sunday is from the book of Revelation, written near the end of the first century. Revelation is an Easter book because it focuses on the Risen Jesus and our final victory over sin and death. Today's passage describes the call that the author received. He was to convey God's message of hope to Christians who were being persecuted.

Parish on a Journey

Happy Easter

The Resurrection of Jesus is not just something we believe; it is the reason we believe anything at all. Paul said it clearly: If Christ has not risen, our faith is in vain and we are still trapped in our sins, the most pitiable of people. (1 Cor 15:17)

A large diverse group of credible witnesses testified that they had seen Jesus alive again, days after his death and burial. Paul listed some of them: Peter, the Twelve, 500 disciples at once, James and "last of all, he appeared to me" (1 Cor 15: 34). These men and women spread the news of the Resurrection through the Middles East, then on to Greece and Rome.

The Resurrection of Jesus was a wholly unprecedented event. Jesus had raised Lazarus from his grave but Lazarus died again and so did the little girl of Galilee. When Jesus rose, however, he drained death of most of its power. It can still claim us but it cannot hold us. We too shall live again and forever as God's children, sharing the joyous, unending life of the Father, Son and Spirit.

The Bible ends, as it began, with the act of creation: "I will make all things new," says the Lord, "a new heaven and a new earth" (Rev. 21: 1, 20).

Let us journey anew each day with the Risen Christ!

Encountering the Risen Lord

Suggested Reflection Questions

- On Easter, the liturgy is exultant and celebratory. After the austerity of Lent, parishes are filled with flowers and music and triumphant "Alleluias." We proclaim, "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad." Why do we rejoice at the Resurrection? What does it mean in general? What does it mean to you?
- Paul speaks of newness and transformation. Now that our fast of Lent has been completed and we celebrate the Resurrection, we invite a sense of newness into our lives. What lessons did you learn this Lent? How do they help you understand Easter? How can you use these lessons to be a joyful witness to the Resurrection in your community?
- The Gospel readings for our Easter celebration describe the friends of Jesus discovering his empty tomb. He is risen! Have you experienced a loss this year — a friend, family member, or even a relationship or job? What does the empty tomb symbolize for you? What does it tell us about God?

SUNDAY, MARCH 27, 2016

SOLEMNITY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD (EASTER SUNDAY) By any other name

Mary Magdalene is often confused with other women named Mary in the gospels (there were many!). But there are things we know for sure about this specific Mary: She was a prominent follower of Jesus, she was present at his Crucifixion and burial, she was the first to discover his tomb empty, and she was the first to see him after his Resurrection. Whatever else about her life, the most important thing she did was bear witness to Christ and inform others that he has risen. It's the most important thing you can do, too.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Colossians 3:1-4 or 1 Corinthians 5:6b-8; John 20:1-9 or Luke 24:1-12 (42, 41) or, at an afternoon or evening Mass, Luke 24:13-35 (46).* “. . . they did not yet understand the scripture that he had to rise from the dead.”

MONDAY, MARCH 28

EASTER MONDAY; MONDAY IN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER The future starts now

Ever feel fear and joy in the same breath? New parents say when they first hold their newborn in their arms something like that happens. Starting a new job or signing papers for a new home might bring a similar combination of a lump in the throat and a fast-beating heart. With the drama and passion of Holy Week behind us, we live in the dawn of Easter Resurrection. Pope Francis urges us to see the signs of the Risen Lord all around us in this season and open our hearts “to a present that is full of the future.” We do so with wonder and awe, a mix of joy and fear. Jesus gave his all—now it's our turn!

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 2:14, 22-33; Matthew 28:8-15 (261).*
“*Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went away quickly from the tomb, fearful yet overjoyed.*”

TUESDAY, MARCH 29 TUESDAY OF HOLY WEEK Meet the Resurrection in person

Father James Martin in his book *Jesus: A Pilgrimage* observes that the “Resurrection appearances show that the Risen Christ understood what each of the disciples needed in order to believe.” For Mary Magdalene, she “needed to hear her name.” From that point forward she believed and went to tell the other disciples about the Resurrection, earning her the title “Apostle to the Apostles.” Each of us needs something different to bolster our belief; luckily, our Savior meets us where we're at and, in the process, invites us deeper into the mystery and the miracle that are faith and Resurrection.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 2:36-41; John 20:11-18 (262).* “*Let the whole house of Israel know for certain that God has made him both Lord and Christ.*”

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 30 EASTER WEDNESDAY Lightbulb moment

The Feast of the Epiphany was celebrated back in January, commemorating the Magi's visit to the infant Jesus. It's called Epiphany because the word's original meaning is “appearance.” (And this one came complete with a big, bright star!) An epiphany has come to mean a revealing moment or a sudden realization. Despite all the foreshadowing, going back to Jesus' birth and long before, it isn't until after the Resurrection that Christ's followers had epiphanies about what took place and what it all meant. Open your eyes, too, to the light of truth they experienced.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 3:1-10; Luke 24:13-35 (263).* “*Were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way and opened the scriptures to us?*”

THURSDAY, MARCH 31 EASTER THURSDAY Peace to you

On many a day, fear keeps us bound in self-absorption and is a huge waste of time. It can keep you from knowing God better and stunt your growth in faith. If you keep the door closed, what do you miss? If you let go of fear, what might happen? If you listen and talk to God every day, what might God say? If you surrender control, where will God take you? Theologian Gustavo Gutierrez reminds us that the “initiative in encounter belongs to the Lord. But if we open the door of our being to him, we shall share his life.” What is it that you fear and worry about today? Can you open the door and give it to God?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 3:11-26; Luke 24:35-48 (264).* “*Why are you disturbed? Why do such ideas cross your mind?*”

FRIDAY, APRIL 1 EASTER FRIDAY Build on solid ground

An often-heard refrain at Easter—“The stone rejected by the builders has become the cornerstone”—is a good summary of Jesus' life and mission. In any stone construction, the cornerstone or foundation stone is critical because if it is not “true”—perfectly even and level—the whole structure might collapse. The religious leaders of his day regularly rejected Jesus because, in their eyes, Jesus was unsuitable, not what a Messiah “should be.” It's the ultimate irony. Is *your* foundation stone “true”? Does it bear the weight of your life?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Acts 4:1-12; John 21:1-14 (265).* “*By the Lord has this been done; it is wonderful in our eyes.*”

SATURDAY, APRIL 2 EASTER SATURDAY Praise the Lord, my soul

As of the beginning of Lent, the word “Alleluia” was silenced—neither sung nor spoken. At Easter, however, the word is resurrected and echoes all through the season. But what does it mean? It's Hebrew, a one-word contraction of “Praise ye the Lord.” Saint Augustine wrote, “We are the Easter people, and Alleluia is our song.” For some, it's like a blare of trumpets in a single word of exuberant joy and faith, while for others it is a quiet mantra repeating itself in silent prayer. Alleluia is everything.



Easter Feasting for Fifty Days



HALLE, HALLE, HALLELUJAH

From Easter to Pentecost come eight Sundays, beginning to end of the great Fifty Days that are Easter season. Each Sunday we begin our liturgy with a single word. It is a Hebrew word (especially when written “Hallelujah”), though often we pronounce it as it comes through the Greek (usually spelled “Alleluia”).

What does “hallelujah” mean in Hebrew? “Praise the Lord!” But almost everyone would agree, “hallelujah” or even “alleluia” is a more beautiful and exuberant sound than “praise the Lord.” Just listen to how the letter “L” flows through the vowel sounds! Apparently that is so in many languages because we find hallelujah/alleluia used in many places instead of the vernacular. Latin had “Laudate Dominum!” but the Latin liturgy never stopped using the Greek alleluia. Thus what we have for our entrance song comes from the Caribbean where so many languages mingle: “Halle, halle, halle – lujah!

Here is what Bishop Augustine wrote fifteen centuries ago to his church in Africa:

Let us chant Alleluia. Then the word of scripture will be accomplished, the word not of combatants any more, but of victors: Death has been swallowed up in victory!

Let us chant Alleluia here in the midst of dangers and temptations.... O blessed Alleluia of heaven! No more anguish, no more adversity. No more enemy. No more love of destruction. Up above, praise to God, and here below, praise to God. Praise mingled with fear here, but without disturbance above. Here we chant in hope, there, in possession; here it is Alleluia on the way, there it is Alleluia on arriving home.

How Augustine must have loved singing the great alleluia of Easter! Alleluia up above! Alleluia here below!

Alleluia in our fear! Alleluia when we're home! As we move through the entrance rite on Easter's Sundays, we go to the font and take blessed water in buckets to rain down on the whole assembly. We pick up singing the “Halle” again, but now the cantor alternates with us. We wrap the cantor's words in our hallelujah sung over and over:

Glory to God on high!
Glory from far and wide!
Glory and peace on earth abide!
Glory, Creator, praise!
Glory and thanks we raise!
Glory and blessing all our days!
Glory! O Christ, you reign!
Glory! O Lamb, once slain!
Glory! O Lord, let loss be gain!
Glory! Receive our plea!
Glory to Christ now be!
Glory! The world from sin set free!
Glory! O holy Lord!
Glory! O Christ, adored!
Glory! O Spirit, now outpoured!



Who, Where Why, How ...

Why is Easter so early this year? It's barely Spring?

Spring began last week, that's why it's Easter. Actually, Easter can be as early as March 22 but the last time that happened was 1818. The origins of Easter's date are tied into old celebrations of spring as well as the Jewish feast of Passover. There was no standardized date of Easter until the Council of Nicea in 325. The Council bishops decided that Easter would fall upon the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after the Vernal Equinox. Prior to this decision, Easter was celebrated at different times and days, often decided by local custom. In the west, only the church in Britain and Ireland refused to accept the date until 664 because of their own Celtic calendar. There is still no standard date for all Christians since some eastern church use the older Julian calendar rather than the shorter more accurate Gregorian calendar. There has been an attempt to establish a common date for all churches, such as a specific Sunday in April every year. After many years, this agreement finally seems attainable.
