Blast From the Past(or)
Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time
August 18, 2019

Today Jesus Christ, the Word made Flesh, King of the Universe and Savior of the World proclaims the purpose of His coming: 'to set the earth on fire!' Further, the Prince of Peace tells us that He has come not to establish peace on earth, 'but rather division.' Wait. What? Is anyone else confused? I keep hearing how divided and polarized we are as a culture, where people accuse each other of various intolerant phobias. But Christ is the Fire which is the very humility of God, a helpless baby born in straw poverty; this can make us very uncomfortable. Christ is the sieve. His Fire does not affirm that we are great, noble or inclusive. The Fire does not mean that everyone gets a trophy. Rather, the Fire rescues us from self-preoccupation. This Fire exposes the inconvenient Truth that your life is not about you. Thank God for the Fire of Christ, transforming me, painful as it may be, to that by Whom I am formed. The Fire strips my ego down to the Imago, the image and likeness in which I am fashioned in my mother's womb. The Fire is Divine Love Incarnate. And as we know, true *love...is a harsh and dreadful thing*, so wrote Dostoevsky. (Disclaimer: I have to admit that I have tried on four separate occasions to read *The Brothers Karamazov* in its entirety and failed each time. One of the big movie studios has to be coming out with a more approachable adaptation soon, right? Think of the possibilities-- maybe even a cartoon version! '*Coming soon, The Minions Karamazov!*' Hmm...yeah...looks like I may need to resign myself instead to attempt number five.). Anywho, this Fire alters, and change is difficult. If you've ever thrown a green, wet log on a fire, you know that the log will snap, hiss and smoke a bit. But eventually the desired metamorphosis takes place, with the log giving off heat and light indistinguishable from the Flame itself. So, too, our Christ: we might make some noise and even rebel, but the Fire will come, and we will burn with Love to which we are called. Initially divisive, this Fire purifies. May we stay close to the Flame.



Apostolate of Saint Joseph Ministry

As reported in prior bulletins, in response to the State of New Jersey's "Aid in Dying for the Terminally Ill Act," and with the approval of Bishop Serratelli, the Diocese of Paterson has formed the Saint Joseph Apostolate to the Dying. This ministry is designed to accomplish the following:

1. Provide encouragement to the dying person to receive the Sacraments of Healing; Penance and Anointing of the Sick;
2. Prepare the person to receive the Most Holy Eucharist, the Bread of Eternal Life;
3. Plan opportunities for prayer during the person's last days such as the Holy Rosary, Divine Mercy Devotion, Prayers to Saint Joseph, the Patron Saint of the Dying, etc.; and
4. Put forward a compassionate and loving heart when a gravely ill person needs it most.
