Parish Facility Closures:

<u>Funeral Rites:</u> All Funeral Masses are discontinued until further notice. The Rite of Committal as established in the *Order of Christian Funerals* may be used for a graveside service with no more than 8 members of the immediate family present. All are to keep the recommended social distance. The priest will offer a private Mass for the repose of the oul of the departed. A public memorial Mass can be arranged for a later date when restrictions on the enliet of large crowds have been lifted.

GET TO KNOW OUR NEW BISHOP-ELECT KEVIN J. SWEENEY

Below is his Easter message to his parish, St. Michael's Church in Brooklyn, that appeared in their Sunday bulletin...

Easter Sunday April 12, 2020 Dear Brothers and Sisters,

"Brothers and sisters: Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life." (Romans 6:3-4)

Jesus is Risen, Alleluia!!! Yes, we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus in this Easter Sunday, even as we experience an Easter Sunday that is different from any other Easter Sunday of our lives. Something struck me as I read and prayed with today's Gospel - it took time to realize and understand that Jesus had risen from the dead. The Gospel that we read on this Easter Sunday...tells us that Mary Magdalen, Peter and John all saw that the tomb was open and empty, but they did not appreciate or understand what it meant. The last line of the passage tells us, "For they did not yet understand that Scripture that he had to rise from the dead". Today, as we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus, we can say that we not only believe that Jesus rose from the dead, but that we understand what it means for us, as St. Paul writes to the Romans, "... we who were baptized ... into his death so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life."

Yet, when we experience what we are currently going through in the midst of this "pandemic" and see and hear about so many who are sick and so many who have died, we can wonder, "where is our Risen Lord?" and it can be very difficult to "feel" the "Joy of Easter". Sometimes, we need more time. We believe Jesus is truly Risen. He has conquered sin and death. He suffered, died and Rose for each and every one of us and for each and every victim of this terrible "Coronavirus". So, what do we do on an Easter Sunday when we can't go to Church to be at Mass and receive Holy Communion? So many of us will not be able to get together with our families as we usually do on Easter Sunday and we know there are families who, instead of feeling the "Joy of Easter", are feeling the terrible sadness of the

death of a loved one or are worried for a loved one who is sick or in the Hospital.

What do we do?

- 1. We PRAY and we ask our Risen Lord Jesus us to give us Peace, the Peace that only He can give. We ask Him to heal the sick and Bless and protect those who care for them. We ask Him to give the fullness of Eternal Life (the true meaning of His Resurrection) to those who have died.
- 2. We LIVE our Faith we do the best we can to help and support each other, especially at home with our families. We stay at home, if we can, until this crisis has passed. We look for ways that we can help those (neighbors and others) who are in need.
- 3. We Remember that every day is a GIFT and we try to make the most we can of every day, trying to recognize and "see" the presence of our Risen Lord Jesus, even on the most difficult days.
- 4. We look forward in HOPE we are learning in a new way, that none of us knows what "tomorrow will bring", but we know that death and darkness and sin will not have the last word that is the "Lesson" of Easter. Jesus is RISEN, there will be better days ahead, the Risen Lord will give us healing and Peace we just may need some time to appreciate and realize it.

Ways to Stay Spiritually Connected While Public Masses are Suspended and Churches are Closed

1. <u>View Mass Online or on Television</u>: Check out our parish website to view Mass each day celebrated by Bishop Robert Barron. You can also view Mass at <u>www.catholictv.org</u> or on television on EWTN. We will try to post a recording of the Sunday Mass Father Tom will be saying on his own as well, to the extent possible.

2. <u>Make an Act of Spiritual Communion</u>: This beautiful practice has been part of the lives of countless saints who found it drew them closer to God on a daily basis. Below is a traditional prayer of spiritual communion which can be prayed while watching Mass online or on television, in the midst of your daily work, or at any time during the day, lifting up your thoughts to God.

My Jesus,

I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul.

Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart.

I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You.

Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

3. **Pray the Rosary:** Appealing to our beloved, Blessed Mother and uniting with other Catholics throughout the world by praying the Rosary is a profound way to find peace and strength during these difficult times. A number of resources are available to assist in praying the Rosary at home, in the car, or wherever your social distancing might take you.

<u>Apps:</u> (*Free*, available in the Apple and Google Play stores) <u>Laudate App</u>- Combines a large number of Catholic resources such as Daily Mass, prayers (including the Rosary), the Bible, Stations of the Cross, the Catechism and much more.

<u>Mary App</u>- Created by the Marian Fathers of the Immaculate Conception, this app is a helpful resource on our Blessed Mother and includes, among many other things, an interactive Rosary with an audio option.

<u>Family Rosary's Mobile Rosary</u>- Offers the traditional Rosary with the text of each prayer. You can pray in silence or with the companion voice of Venerable Patrick Peyton. <u>iRosary</u>- Displays a fully-animated set of Rosary beads which displays each prayer as you move each bead with your finger, like a standard Rosary. YouTube: There are many videos of people praying the Rosary that you can join.
