Blast from the Past(or) Second Sunday of Lent March 5, 2023

Lord, it is good for us that we are here ...

St. Peter's words are a masterclass in understatement. As the living legend Keith Richards once quipped, 'I'm happy to be here; I'm happy to be anywhere.' It is good for us to be here. From the lows of the desert last week, we now are shown the heights of Jesus's mountaintop Transfiguration. We are happy to be here. But our presence is not a passive one. The Transfiguration is not for peripheral, uninvolved spectators. Unlike Vegas, what happens on Mount Tabor does not stay on Mount Tabor. It is to be proclaimed from the rooftops! The Transfiguration gives us an active role in proclaiming the Truth of God, which is the Truth of humanity. That's no small Baptismal task. This mountaintop interlude reminds us that human joy is a relationship with God. And, that happiness that you are seeking and have a right to enjoy has a Name and a Face. It is Jesus of Nazareth (Pope Benedict XVI). The Christian life is just that: a personal relationship. The ballast of any plans, programs or policies must be a love affair with Jesus Christ. Jesus is Transfigured before us in order that we might enter into the same. This Lent a festering wound might be cauterized, a relationship restored, a reconciliation reached, a hurt forgiven or a longheld regret finally released to the mercy of God. These can be Lenten Transfigurations. Lord, it is good for us that we are here. You tell 'em, Keith! Rock on, indeed ...

Have I respected the physical and sexual dignity of others and of myself?

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. Have I gossiped, told lies, or embellished stories at the

expense of another?

You shall not covet your neighbor's spous Have I honored my spouse with my full affection and exclusive love?

You shall not covet your neighbor's goods. Am I content with my own means and needs, or do I com pare myself to others unnecessarily?

Christ's Two Commandments

How well do we love God and others? Do we love as Christ calls us to? In the Gospel of Matthew, Christ gives us Two Commandments: "He said to him, 'You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the great-est and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. The whole law and the prophets depend on these two com-mandments²⁴ (Mt 22:37-40).

Not sure what love is? St. Paul describes it for us in his Letter to the Corinthians. Is this how you love God and others? "Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, [love] is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things endures all things. Love never fails" (1 Cor 13:4-8). ngs,
