### Blast from the Past(or) Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time February 11, 2024

He reached out His hand, touched him, and said to him, 'I do will it...'

In preparation for next week's Lenten desert, we stumble upon the meeting of Jesus and the Leper. The Leper is one who lives in isolation. He is cut off from society and has no social media following. He has no likes on TikTok and is an outsider in his own community. History is replete with famous loners whom circumstance kept separate and apart from the group. We know Rudolph was excluded emphatically from any and all reindeer games. Quasimodo was rejected and cut off from the people of Paris. The Philadelphia Phillies are shunned by normal, sane people, because they are not I'm looking at you, Chase Utley and Darren Daulton. The Leper is the Yoko Ono of the band. But Jesus touches him. Oft-times we'll see a family out to dinner who are not engaging with one another. Instead, they are isolated and apart from one another, looking down at their screens. Our Lord and Savior puts down His phone and actually engages with this outsider, eye to eye, and the world is better for it. Mark's Gospel is often called the 'gospel of the present tense,' where Jesus's focus is seeking out the lost. Though forced to live in isolation (man is not made to be alone), the Leper kneels before Jesus requesting to be made 'clean,' which is to say, made whole. As Ash Wednesday approaches, we're reminded that we do not go to the desert to die alone. Christ touches us and we are made whole. Remind yourself that Christ takes solidarity with the Leper. What part of us might be disfigured? What part of our life is excluded of Christ? Today is an invitation to put yourself in the way of grace, to live in the fold and live fully, wholly and healthy again. We are created for the integration into full community of Love that is the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Don't be a loner. Simply ask, 'If you wish, Lord, You can make me clean...' Spoiler alert: He does will it. You got this.

#### Ashes Will be Distributed (only) at All Masses on Ash Wednesday, February 14 Masses will be celebrated at 8:15 am, 12:10 pm and 6:00 pm.

Just what is it about Ash Wednesday? So often pews in our churches sit empty, with "plenty of good seats still available" throughout Mass. They offer God's Word and the chance to actually receive the Body and Blood of Jesus but are rarely ever near capacity. But come Ash Wednesday, there's often standing room only. What brings this change? Is it Fear of Missing Out ("Get your ashes, one day only, before they run out!!")? A sentimental reminder of a childhood tradition? Perhaps it's a symbol of hope for the season that lies ahead.

We begin each Lent by recalling our last Holy Week, when we gathered on Palm Sunday to welcome Jesus, branches held high. Almost a year later, we're setting fire to those branches, placing their ashes on our foreheads. Why? Chances are, a lot has happened since last Easter. There were probably times we weren't so welcoming to Jesus. Burning those branches reminds us of this. Our sins may feel overwhelming, and the hope of Easter Sunday a distant memory. But the good news? We now have the chance to walk the Lenten journey anew. We're marked with ashes not because it makes for a great Instagram post of our foreheads or because we are holy or perfect or righteous. Instead, we put on an outward sign of all of the times we have failed, have separated ourselves from God. It is in recognizing our great need for His mercy that we can take our first steps towards His healing. As we gather on Ash Wednesday, let us give thanks for the 40 days of prayer, fasting and almsgiving ahead. May this season of repentance help us to be redeemed in God's mercy, prepare to fully celebrate the Easter Sunday to come, and hopefully inspire the filling of our churches once more!

#### What are We Called to "do" During Lent?

In addition to whatever personal prayer, fasting and almsgiving each individual may undertake after prayerful consideration, to further foster a spirit of reflection and penance, all Catholics age 14 and older are called to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all Fridays during Lent. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are also seen as days of fasting for Catholics between the ages of 18-59. This means there would only be one full, meatless meal, as well as food at other regular mealtimes together equaling less than one full meal.
