HISPANIC CATHOLICS AND THE FUTURE OF US CATHOLICISM

My high school and college years were spent in schools that were preparing candidates for priesthood in the Catholic Church. The high school courses I took were much the same as young people take today. The significant

difference was language choice. I studied Latin and French. In college, ancient Greek was added to my college seminary studies because it was the language of the New Testament. Sadly, Spanish was not offered. No one guessed that the future of US Catholicism would be with Hispanic immigration. I regret that I never learned Spanish. Fortunately at St. Kilian we are blest to have Father Jose Luis Tenas with us. Only two years a priest, he was born in El Salvador, and released by his bishop to serve in our diocese for 5 years, with the possibility of longer time.

St. Kilian has been designated by our bishop as an area parish in service of Spanish speaking (and praying) Catholics. Demographically, the village of Farmingdale has a population that is 12 percent Hispanic. But Fr. Jose Luis' ministry serves a five mile radius of parishes, and we attract hundreds of Spanish speaking Catholics outside our parish boundaries.

1. Hispanic immigration is reenergizing the church in the United States. Nearly one third of the Catholic population of 74 million in this country is of Hispanic background - 25,000,000. The millennial generation (as defined by sociologists) are those born between 1980 and 1993 - fifteen million out of the general US population of 320 million. 45% of the young millennial generation, or 7 million, are Hispanics, and the majority of these young people are Roman Catholic.
2. Like non-Hispanic millennial Catholics, they believe in core doctrines that emerged from early church history: the resurrection of Jesus, assisting the poor and needy, belief in Mary as the mother of God, and the sacraments. In fact, Hispanic Catholics believe in these teachings, and see them as more important to them personally, than do non-Hispanic Catholics of the same generation. They oppose abortion more

strongly than non-Hispanic Catholics. They believe in having a prayer life that is very active - more than do non-Hispanics. And they have greater interest in Catholic devotions like adoration of the Eucharist and praying the rosary - than do non-Hispanics.

3. In larger proportions than non-Hispanics, Hispanic Catholics have devotion to the mass and attending mass weekly; helping the poor and protecting the unborn from abortion; and support of the papacy as meaningful to them as Catholics.
4. The strong emphasis on concern for social justice (again stronger than non-Hispanic Catholics), helping the poor and advocating for the less fortunate, grows out of Hispanics' personal experience. One quarter of them in this country live in poverty. 28% have less than a high school education. Fewer than 10% have a college degree. This means that they have much less education than non-Hispanic Catholics.

Importantly, they understand poverty and the struggle to get a good education from the inside. For them, it is a fact of life. Consequently they have the expectation that the Catholic Church will support the dignity and the rights of all peoples. They have the expectation that the church will advocate for those who are suffering deprivation, and work to change unjust systems that demean rather than promote the quality of life of human beings.

In recent sociological studies, Hispanic women, even more than Hispanic men, are shown to be devout and committed to Catholicism. On the other hand, non-Hispanic women (born between 1980 and 1993) in the millennial generation - are the least involved with the church and with Catholicism.

Hispanic women, in their traditional commitment to Christ, the Blessed Mother, the sacraments, and social justice, seem to be the vibrant future of the church in the United States. If current trends continue, and there is no indication that they will not, and as non-Hispanic Catholics stop going to church and the sacraments, Hispanics, especially Hispanic women and their children, will become the backbone of US Catholicism.

Stewardship Witness Talks

My name is Jeri Fioravanti and I have been a member of the St. Kilian community for nearly 13 years. I am going to speak to you this morning about my walk toward this community, and how becoming a part of it has helped me understand the presence of God in my life.

I grew up in a very religious and practicing Catholic family. The driving force for faith in my family was my aunt Nancy, the Franciscan nun Sister Mary Euphrasia. Aunt Nancy became a guiding light for me when I was young, and remained so for many many years. Her example of sisterhood, of a family rooted in a deep faith in Christ, left a profound impact on me.

She was clearly telling me something important about faith, but I was not yet fully aware of what it was.

The path was not always smooth and straight.

Although I have believed my entire life, although I prayed my entire life, I was at times inconsistent in practice. There was a period when I could have been characterized as on-again, off-again Christian.

I never looked away from the light, but sometimes while I was focusing on my life, I would not realize it was lit. Although surrounded by my beautiful family, a supportive husband, terrific kids, I felt slightly alone in my faith.

After attending several different parishes over the years I found St Kilian when my grandchildren became students at LaSalle.

I have always taught my three children to receive their sacraments, and be good Christians. I have guided my grandchildren as well, and still today I am teaching my youngest grandchild Catechism along with many of your children and grandchildren here at St Kilian.

This inspiration was telling me something important, but I was not yet fully aware of what it was.

Through teaching I began meeting you - the parents and grandparents of the children. I began to feel ever more directly a congregation in Christ, and my interaction with you only left me wanting to be involved more. About this time I began reading a book "The Holy Souls"; a book, which encourages us to renew and deepen our efforts in prayer. Through these prayers I found myself moving closer and closer to the Holy Spirit. I began praying every day.

I was called to become involved with the Consolation Ministry, an important element of community of the sharing of grief as well as the celebration of a joyous life. In community in Christ we are there for each other in good times and challenging times.

As an Extraordinary Minister, I grow deeper into the community that I have become a part of. Seeing you and serving you weekly is another way and another day to communicate with my brothers and sisters in Christ.

The Adoration Ministry is another step along my path of a place of reflection and meditation where I get to be mindful of the presence of Jesus in my life one on one.

When I joined the St Kilian Women's Guild, I was again delighted, this time meeting the most wonderful and spiritually-aware women who deeply believed in the sense of community that they shared, and the sense of community they shared in Christ.

Getting involved was telling me something again, but I was not yet fully aware of what it was.

What I came to realize is that Aunt Nancy's sisterhood, my desire to teach children, my joy at becoming part of this lovely parish were indeed all telling me something.

They were signs that in community we find God.

In the relationships with our brothers and sisters in Christ we find what it means to be a part of Jesus' family, a disciple. This was the awareness I needed to become an on-again, off-again Christian.

But this was not my own doing or you see I have been led to this parish and led to these initiatives over and over as I aim to move closer to an awareness of the Holy Spirit in my life. I prayed, surrendered, and was led here.

My path of enlightenment was through my relationships and through community in God. Yours may be different. But I encourage you to open your mind to it. Surrender to God who will reveal what your path is. Don't get frustrated, because like me, you may not realize you're on it already. You may not see it is at work in your life, but it is. And when you discover it you will be a deeper and more cheerful person for the awareness of God's presence in your life.

Jesus has provided me with a joy, cheerfulness, happiness, and completeness I could not find on my own.

I invite you to become part of the joy of Jesus in our lives, find your meaning and run with it, be open to let him lead the way, surrender and the path will unfold before you as it did for me, and the reward is the most inspiring and enlightening relationships with the people around you, our brothers and sisters here in this Church, in this Parish, and beyond. The rewards are greater than we can ever expect.



11° Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

El Papa Francisco en su pontificado ha insistido mucho en la necesidad que existe en el mundo del perdón, añadiendo que esta necesidad debe ir acompañada de misericordia. El Evangelio de este domingo nos ofrece un retrato característico de Cristo, liberador de la enfermedad, de la muerte y, ahora, liberador del pecado. La experiencia del ser humano es la fragilidad al pecado. La respuesta de Dios al mundo dada por medio de Cristo es el triunfo del amor y del perdón. Las lecturas de hoy son ricas en este misterio, perdonar-amar. David peca y trata de esconder su pecado, poniendo a su servidor, Urías, frente a su enemigo para que muera y así tomar a su mujer. David se arrepiente e inmediatamente escuchamos la respuesta de Dios por medio de Natán. *óDios te perdona tu pecado, no morirás.*

¿Cómo aplicamos el perdón de Dios recibido en el sacramento de la reconciliación? ¿Qué respuesta damos a los demás al sentir el perdón de Dios en nuestra vida? Dios es fuente de amor y su respuesta es el perdón. Pidamos al Señor que nos haga conscientes de nuestras faltas, para así llegar a sentir la urgencia de su perdón en nosotros. El mensaje es rico en la misericordia de Dios que libera, ayudando a nacer a una nueva vida. Vivir en otro estilo, buscar sin tregua la ricura de ese Dios que se complace en su Hijo que da la vida por cada persona y que en sus últimos momentos aun le pide al Padre por nosotros: *óPadre, perdónalos, porque no saben lo que hacen (Lc 23, 34).*
