JULY 3, 2022 Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

First, a happy and safe Independence Day to all! Please note that the parish office is closed on Monday, July 4th. Also please note that there is no 5:30 p.m. daily Mass on Monday, July 4th.

Wednesday, July 6th is the feast day of St. Maria Goretti. She is the youngest canonized saint of the Church, who was only 11 years old when she died of 14 stab wounds received in a brutal attack following her resistance to an attempted rape.

St. Maria lived for about 24 hours following the attack. On her deathbed, she forgave the 20-year-old man who attacked her, Alessandro Serenelli, saying that she wanted him to be with her in Paradise. The day was July 6th, 1902.

Serenelli was initially sentenced to life imprisonment, which was later commuted to 30 years. Six years into his sentence, Serenelli experienced a vision of Maria and was profoundly transformed from a violent and brutal bully into a renewed and gentle person bent on spreading God's word and devotion to his victim. Thirteen years into his sentence, authorities wanted to release him, but Serenelli refused because he wanted to pay for his crime.

After his release, having served 27 years of the sentence, Serenelli went to see Maria's mother, Assunta, to beg her forgiveness. Assunta Goretti willingly gave it, saying that since Maria had forgiven him on her deathbed, she (Assunta) could do no less. The two attended Mass and received Holy Communion side-by-side the next day. On June 24, 1950, Assunta and Serenelli attended Maria's canonization together at St. Peter's Basilica. Serenelli later became a Capuchin lay brother and lived in the monastery, working as receptionist and gardener, until dying peacefully in 1970. It was reported that Serenelli prayed to Maria every day of his life following his conversion. St. Maria Goretti's body is in the crypt of the Basilica of Our Lady of Grace and St. Maria Goretti in Nettuno, Italy.

In the end, forgiveness and mercy such as Maria and her mother displayed are what God calls us to do to those who have harmed us. He does NOT call us to revenge or to getting even. He also calls us to guard our virtue as St. Maria Goretti did. Neither of these things are necessarily the easy path, but then Jesus did say that the path to eternal life is a narrow one.

History of Independence Day

When the initial battles in the Revolutionary War broke out in April 1775, few colonists desired complete independence from Great Britain, and those who did were considered radical.

By the middle of the following year, however, many more colonists had come to favor independence, thanks to growing hostility against Britain and the spread of revolutionary sentiments such as those expressed in the bestselling pamphlet "Common Sense," published by Thomas Paine in early 1776.

On June 7, when the Continental Congress met at the Pennsylvania State House (later Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the Virginia delegate Richard Henry Lee introduced a motion calling for the colonies' independence.

Amid heated debate, Congress postponed the vote on Lee's resolution, but appointed a five-man committee - including Thomas Jefferson of Virginia, John Adams of Massachusetts, Roger Sherman of Connecticut, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania and Robert R. Livingston of New York - to draft a formal statement justifying the break with Great Britain.

Did you know? John Adams believed that July 2nd was the correct date on which to celebrate the birth of American independence, and would reportedly turn down invitations to appear at July 4th events in protest. Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died on July 4, 1826—the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence.

On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of Lee's resolution for independence in a near-unanimous vote (the New York delegation abstained, but later voted affirmatively). On that day, John Adams wrote to his wife Abigail that July 2 "will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival" and that the celebration should include "Pomp and Parade...Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other."

On July 4th, the Continental Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, which had been written largely by Jefferson. Though the vote for actual independence took place on July 2nd, from then on the 4th became the day that was celebrated as the birth of American independence. From: www.history.com
