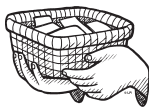

Religious Education

Confraternity of Christian Doctrine (CCD) classes are one dimension of faith formation and religious education for Catholic students in grades 1 – 11. The program teaches Catholic history and doctrine, fosters community, and prepares students for Christian service. This program is available to all who do not receive religious education classes on a regular basis at a Catholic School. As a reminder, receiving the Sacrament of Holy Communion (grade 2) requires two years of faith formation. The Sacrament of Confirmation (grades 9-11) is a three year faith formation. Elementary grades are 1st to 6th Grade & meet on Sundays, 11:00 -11:50 a.m. Middle School & High School grades meet on Sundays from 6:30-8:00 p.m.

There are several opportunities to share your talents and faith with the Religious Education program at Mt. Carmel Parish. Volunteers are needed to teach grades 3 and 4 class. KUDOS TO EVANGELICALS

Catholic League for Religious and Civil Rights president Bill Donohue comments on a statement issued by evangelical leaders August 29 (<http://www.catholicleague.org/kudos-to-evangelicals/>):

The Catholic League has a long history of mutual cooperation with evangelical Christians on a host of cultural issues. In that spirit, we condemn the unfair attacks against the statement on marriage, family and sexuality that was signed by more than 150 evangelical leaders following their conference in Nashville last week.

“Hateful,” “homophobic,” “anti-LGBT” are among the hysterical condemnations of the statement flying around print, broadcast and social media. But the statement is none of those things.

While restating long-held Christian teaching that marriage is ordained by God as the “lifelong union of one man and one woman,” and that differences between male and female are “divinely ordained” and unchangeable, the statement does not single out homosexual or transgender persons. It emphasizes that *all* human beings are called to “chastity outside of marriage and fidelity within marriage,” reiterating the immorality of heterosexual intercourse “before or outside marriage” as well.

Nor can the statement accurately be termed “hateful.” Quite the contrary. It affirms God’s “merciful” love and forgiveness. It rejects the idea that “divinely ordained differences between male and female” somehow “render them unequal in dignity or worth.” It refutes the notion that same-sex attraction “puts a person outside the hope of the gospel.” And it calls on Christians to “speak the truth in love at all times” and to never “speak in such ways that dishonor God’s design.”

In short, the statement is a loving, faith-filled affirmation of timeless Christian teachings on marriage, family and human sexuality. In these tumultuous times, we continue to stand with our evangelical brothers and sisters in defending these traditional moral values.

Guide to the Catechism of the Catholic Church—Man and Woman

Alfred McBride, O. Praem. *Article #15*

“Being a man and being a woman is a positive reality which is good and willed by God.” Catechism, 369.

Many cultures have believed in the existence of a soul distinct from the body. Ancient Egyptians called it “Ka.” The Coala Indians of British Columbia imagine it to be like a bird. Catholics believe in the reality of the spiritual soul, connected to but different from the body. We are made “a little less than the angels” (Ps 8:6). We have some kinship with animals, but God made us human and able to relate to Him. We are the only creatures able to share, by knowledge and love, in God’s own life. We have spiritual, immortal souls, created when we were conceived. The human soul as an image of God possesses four qualities: intelligence, love, freedom, and conscience.

Created Male and Female

The body also shares in the dignity of being an image of God because it is destined to be a temple of the Holy Spirit. God will raise our bodies from the dead on the Last Day. God is the author of masculinity and femininity, of sexual and gender differences. As husband and wife, man and woman should relate to each other as a communion of persons who reflect the communion of love in the Persons of the Trinity.

The Fidelity and Obedience of Love

This love rests on absolute fidelity in imitation of God. It should be creative—producing new human life as the Creator has willed and raising children to live out their divine and human calling. God also called man and woman to be stewards of creation, loving all that exists, and nourishing its potential. Mastery of self prepares for mastery of creation. The Son of God showed us how precious humanity is by being born the son of Mary. Jesus Christ reveals to us the fullness of human dignity. “Christ, the new Adam, fully reveals man to himself and brings to light his most high calling” (*Church in the Modern World*, 22). The best path to human fulfillment is obedience to Christ’s teachings and becoming His disciple by losing our self, taking up the Cross, and following Him. Then the dream of creation becomes real in us. Our life with Jesus becomes Paradise Regained.

SANCTUARY RENOVATION: PHASE I COMPLETE; PHASE II TO FOLLOW

Our new altar is in (Phase I) and looks beautiful (the adoring angels will be in next week, with some additional altar lighting). Our parish set aside \$130,000 of parish funds for the altar fabrication, the total cost of which was \$156,000. The remaining balance (\$26,000) has been paid through individual donations.

Individual donations at this time total **\$77,260**. If we subtract \$26,000 for Phase I (altar fabrication), that leaves us with **\$51,260** for Phase II.

The estimated cost for Phase II is **\$140,000**. That means **we need another \$88,740 to pay for Phase II**. We ask that people who may have been waiting to donate toward the project wait no longer. Here are estimated costs of the artwork/painting to be done, which make up most of the cost of Phase II:

- painting two big murals at sides of altar: \$20,000 each*
- painting the mural behind the altar (angels): \$10,000*
- painting ten Carmelite saints: \$5000 each

*One can donate part of the funds needed for these paintings; any donation is most welcome!

And the estimated cost of removing the two statues in the sanctuary (St. Francis and St. Catherine of Siena, patron saints of Italy) and the marble backdrops, and mounting them on columns, is \$10,800.

Let us pray for the intercession of the great Italian artist, Bl. Fra Angelico, that this project may give glory to God & Our Lady of Mount Carmel!
