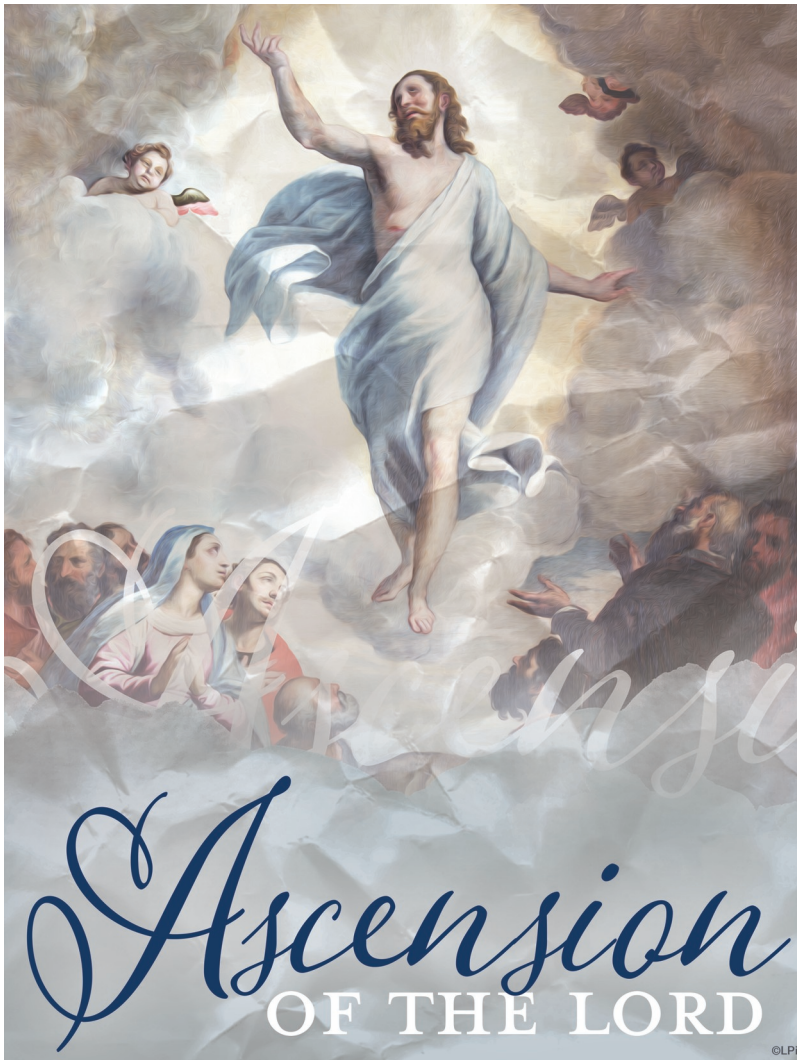

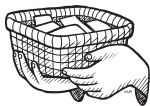

Corpus Christi Blood Drive

Our Lady Of Mount Carmel Parish is doing a combined blood drive and food drive in honor of the Catholic Feast day of Corpus Christi. We are doing so in a combined effort with all 6 north-side parishes. The actual blood drive will be held on Monday June 11th at the parish hall at Holy Rosary from 2:30pm to 7:30 pm. The food and money that is collected will be donated to support the homeless.

Sign-ups for the giving of blood will begin the middle of May (up to June 10th) - so please reserve that June time frame. Most people on medications can still donate blood. Please check the WWW.BCW.EDU website, if you have questions.

One donated unit of blood is capable of saving three lives. If you can't donate, enlist a friend or relative who can, or participate by donating food or money. Baked goods would be appreciated, and would need to be delivered to Holy Rosary by 2pm on 6/11.

Guide to the Catechism of the Catholic Church

"He Ascended Into Heaven and is Seated at the right hand of the Father"

"So then the Lord Jesus, after he had spoken to them, was taken up into heaven, and sat down at the right hand of God." Christ's body was glorified at the moment of his Resurrection, as proved by the new and supernatural properties it subsequently and permanently enjoys. But during the forty days when he eats and drinks familiarly with his disciples and teaches them about the kingdom, his glory remains veiled under the appearance of ordinary humanity. Jesus' final apparition ends with the irreversible entry of his humanity into divine glory, symbolized by the cloud and by heaven, where he is seated from that time forward at God's right hand. Only in a wholly exceptional and unique way would Jesus show himself to Paul "as to one untimely born", in a last apparition that established him as an apostle.

The veiled character of the glory of the Risen One during this time is intimated in his mysterious words to Mary Magdalene: "I have not yet ascended to the Father; but go to my brethren and say to them, I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." This indicates a difference in manifestation between the glory of the risen Christ and that of the Christ exalted to the Father's right hand, a transition marked by the historical and transcendent event of the Ascension.

This final stage stays closely linked to the first, that is, to his descent from heaven in the Incarnation. Only the one who "came from the Father" can return to the Father: Christ Jesus. "No one has ascended into heaven but he who descended from heaven, the Son of man." Left to its own natural powers humanity does not have access to the "Father's house", to God's life and happiness. Only Christ can open to man such access that we, his members, might have confidence that we too shall go where he, our Head and our Source, has preceded us.

"And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all men to myself." The lifting up of Jesus on the cross signifies and announces his lifting up by his Ascension into heaven, and indeed begins it. Jesus Christ, the one priest of the new and eternal Covenant, "entered, not into a sanctuary made by human hands. . . but into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf." There Christ permanently exercises his priesthood, for he "always lives to make intercession" for "those who draw near to God through him". As "high priest of the good things to come" he is the center and the principal actor of the liturgy that honors the Father in heaven.

Henceforth Christ is *seated at the right hand of the Father*: "By 'the Father's right hand' we understand the glory and honor of divinity, where he who exists as Son of God before all ages, indeed as God, of one being with the Father, is seated bodily after he became incarnate and his flesh was glorified."

Being seated at the Father's right hand signifies the inauguration of the Messiah's kingdom, the fulfillment of the prophet Daniel's vision concerning the Son of man: "To him was given dominion and glory and kingdom, that all peoples, nations, and languages should serve him; his dominion is an everlasting dominion, which shall not pass away, and his kingdom one that shall not be destroyed." After this event the apostles became witnesses of the "kingdom [that] will have no end".

IN BRIEF

Christ's Ascension marks the definitive entrance of Jesus' humanity into God's heavenly domain, whence he will come again (cf. *Acts 1:11*); this humanity in the meantime hides him from the eyes of men (cf. *Col 3:3*).

Jesus Christ, the head of the Church, precedes us into the Father's glorious kingdom so that we, the members of his Body, may live in the hope of one day being with him forever.

Jesus Christ, having entered the sanctuary of heaven once and for all, intercedes constantly for us as the mediator who assures us of the permanent outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

The Ongoing Significance of Our Lady's Message at the Fatima Apparitions

This Sunday, May 13, marks the 101st anniversary of Our Lady's first appearance at Fatima, Portugal. Her message that day, and at her subsequent appearances to the three little shepherd children, Lucia, Jacinto and Francisco (the latter two who are now saints), is basically the Gospel's call to do penance and pray (especially the Rosary) for the conversion of sinners.

In a Regina Caeli address of May 14, 2006, the day following the anniversary of the first appearance of Our Lady at Fatima and the 25th anniversary of the attempt on Pope John Paul II's life, Pope Benedict XVI stressed the ongoing significance of the Fatima message. After saying that Our Lady's message "was a strong appeal to prayer and conversion; a truly prophetic message, considering that the 20th century was scourged by unheard-of destruction caused by war and totalitarian regimes, as well as widespread persecution of the Church," he said: "Although there is no lack of anxiety and suffering, and although there are still reasons for apprehension about the future of humanity, what the 'Lady in White' promised the shepherd children is consoling: 'At the end, my Immaculate Heart will triumph.'"

One year later, during his apostolic journey to Brazil in May of 2007, Pope Benedict reiterated the ongoing relevance of the Fatima message. In a May 12 address to clergy, religious and seminarians at the Basilica of the Shrine of Aparecida, he invoked the Blessed Virgin, saying: "Our Mother, . . . make the resounding plea that you uttered in Fatima for the conversion of sinners become a reality that transforms the life of our society, . . ." And the following day, May 13, the 90th anniversary of Our Lady's first apparition, he said: "*Today is the 90th anniversary of the apparitions of Our Lady of Fatima. With their powerful call to conversion and penance, they are without doubt the most prophetic of all modern apparitions.*"
