

How to Reduce Your Taxes and Adjusted Gross Income by Giving to Charity

Required minimum distributions (RMDs) from IRAs can be a burden for many a taxpayer, uncomfortably boosting their annual income, sometimes even into a higher tax bracket. But there is a way to do good with the RMD, both for others and for one's own bottom line. In 2015, Congress made permanent a qualified **charitable distribution (QCD) rule**. This rule allows traditional IRA owners to exclude their RMDs from their adjusted gross income if they give the money to a qualified charitable group. Given the impact RMDs can have on one's tax bill, it's worth creating long-term planning strategies around this rule.

Who Can Use the QCD Rule?

- Any Traditional IRA owner or beneficiary who is at least 70.5 years old can use the QCD Rule to exempt their RMD from taxation. The age limit here applies to the exact date on which the IRA owner turns age 70.5. If an owner turns 70 on February 15, he or she cannot make a QCD until August 15.
- Roth IRA owners are also allowed to use the QCD rule, but they will not see any benefit from doing so because their distributions are already tax free.

Eligible Distributions

- All contributions and earnings that accumulate inside a traditional IRA are eligible for the QCDs. The exception is nondeductible contributions, as they are considered a tax-free return of basis.
- Joint gifting strategies are also not available for the purpose of QCDs, meaning a couple cannot take both of their aggregate RMS amount from a single account and exclude the entire amount from their adjusted gross income (AGI). Each of them must take their RMD from their own accounts for both to qualify.

The AGI Advantage

One of the biggest advantages the QCD rule provides is the ability for taxpayers to lower their adjusted gross income. This is much more valuable than taking an itemized deduction, which merely lowers taxable income. Because AGI is used for many tax calculations, having a lower number can allow the donor to stay in a lower tax bracket, reduce or eliminate the taxation of social security or other income, and remain eligible for deductions and credits that might be lost if the taxpayer had to declare the RMD as income.

Payout Rules

- The main rule to remember when it comes to QCDs is the distributions must be made directly to the charity, not to the owner or beneficiary. This means, have the distribution check made out to the charity or it will be counted as a taxable distribution. The IRA owner or beneficiary can receive the check and deliver it to the organization, but they cannot deposit the check and make out another one to the charity.
- The IRA owner can, of course, take a sum larger than his or her RMD and give it to charity. However, the maximum amount of a QCD is \$100,000. Any distribution in excess of \$100,000 will not be excluded from AGI, and the taxpayer must qualify for itemized deductions to deduct the excess contribution.
- The receiving charity must also be a qualified 501(c)3 organization. Vehicles such as charitable gift annuities will not qualify. The donation amount must also be substantiated by the charity with a written receipt.

The Bottom Line

IRA owners who wish to lower their AGI can use the qualified charitable distribution strategy to efficiently disperse money to a charity of their choice. This strategy is superior to taking constructive receipt of the distribution and then donating to charity because the second option will not reduce the owners AGI. If used properly, the QCD rule will provide charitably minded IRA owners with a convenient tax deduction for years to come.

Morality Concerning Use of Covid-19 Vaccines

The United States Bishops have approved the use of the Moderna and Pfizer Covid-19 Vaccines for Catholics as an "act of charity" in light of the public health risks of the pandemic. The USCCB Committee on Pro-Life and Doctrine stated: "People may in good conscience use the vaccines produced by Pfizer and Moderna, which made only limited use of those unethical cell lines (for lab testing of the vaccine)." Moral theologians refer to this as "remote material cooperation." The Vatican has agreed with this. At this time the Church allows the use of the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines to combat Covid-19 if you choose to be vaccinated.

However, given that these companies did make use of cell lines from aborted babies in their research for production of the vaccines, one is free to refuse to be vaccinated, as long as one does his best to avoid transmitting the virus to others.

Obtain Plenary Indulgences during the Year of St. Joseph

The Apostolic Penitentiary (a Vatican office) issued a *de-cree* granting plenary indulgences for the special year of St. Joseph proclaimed by Pope Francis for the Universal Church, from Dec. 8 2020 to Dec. 8, 2021. During this period, the faithful will have the opportunity to obtain, in multiple ways, with prayer and good works, with the help of St. Joseph, plenary indulgences.

As with any plenary indulgence, a person must do the specified act/good work with a spirit detached from any sin, and it must be accompanied by the usual conditions: sacramental confession (within 8 days), Eucharistic Communion (if possible on the same day) and prayers for the Pope’s intention (Creed, Our Father and Hail Mary).

Here are the good works to obtain a plenary indulgence:

1. Meditate for at least 30 minutes on the Lord’s Prayer or take part in a Spiritual Retreat for at least one day that includes meditation on St. Joseph.
2. Perform a corporal work of mercy: feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, give shelter to travelers, visit the sick, visit the imprisoned and bury the dead.
3. Perform a spiritual work of mercy: instruct the ignorant, counsel the doubtful, admonish the sinner, forgive offences, bear patiently with those who wrong you, comfort the afflicted and pray for the living and the dead.
4. Recite the Holy Rosary in families or among engaged couples.
5. Entrust their daily activity to the protection of St. Joseph.
6. Invoke the intercession of St. Joseph for those seeking employment to find dignifying work.
7. Recite the Litany to St. Joseph (Latin tradition) or the Akathistos to St. Joseph (Byzantine tradition) for the persecuted Church and relief of all Christians suffering persecution.
8. Recite any legitimately approved prayer or act of piety in honor of St. Joseph on his feast days, March 19 and May 1; on the feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, December 27; on the 19th of each month; and on every Wednesday, a day dedicated to the memory of St. Joseph.

The gift of plenary indulgence is also extended to the sick, the elderly, the dying and all those who for legitimate reasons are unable to leave their homes. They can obtain the plenary indulgences if they are detached from sin and have the intention of fulfilling, as soon as possible, the three usual conditions and recite an act of piety in honor of St. Joseph, offering to God all the pains and hardships of their lives.
