#### Keep the Lamp Lit!

This week, Jesus provides us with the stark contrast between a group of wise virgins, who bring enough oil, and foolish virgins, who run out before the bridegroom comes. In those days, the Jewish wedding occurred at the bride's home. When the wedding ceremony was over, the wedding guests would travel to the bridegroom's home for the banquet. The bridesmaids were to wait at the bridegroom's home for the bridegroom and the procession to arrive. The bridesmaids had to be virgins according to Jewish custom. When the bridegroom arrived, the group would enter the home and the banquet would start.

Now, my guess is that the foolish virgins probably thought they had enough oil. They probably thought they were fine. And that's the problem. That's a dangerous place to be in our spiritual life. It's risky to think we've "done enough good," we've "given enough to God," we're "fine," or that God will certainly let us in to heaven. We hold back from giving ourselves fully and, eventually, are surprised by how much we still lack. "The five wise virgins, watchful and alert", writes St. Macarios the Great, "had taken oil in the vessels of their heart. That oil, not part of their own nature, means the grace of the Spirit. They were enabled to enter with the Bridegroom into the heavenly bridal chamber." St. Macarios goes on to describe the condition of the other bridal party. "The other five virgins, however, were content with their own nature. They neither watched nor busied themselves to receive the oil of gladness (Psalm 45:8) in their vessels, while they were yet in the

themselves to receive the oil of gladness (<u>Psalm 45:8</u>) in their vessels, while they were yet in the flesh. Instead, they sank into sleep through carelessness, slackness, idleness, and ignorance, or even fancied righteousness."

Therefore, we must be willing and we must always be seeking to discover "more", to know the Lord more, and to love the Lord more. This is the path of holiness: to hold nothing back, making our lives a complete gift of self. The more we learn about Christ and His Church, the more oil we receive.





Question of the Week

What does it mean to be prepared and vigilant?

#### **CONNECT** with our GOD through Prayer

- Let's start with the *The Sign of Cross*.
- As we gather to share our faith, ask the Holy Spirit to be present.
   Use your own words or offer a <u>Prayer to the Holy Spirit</u>.
- As someone reads out loud the Gospel for this Sunday, listen to the Lord speaking to you.
- Listen to one other as everyone shares what in the Gospel caught their attention.
- Pray the *Collect*—opening prayer of Sunday Mass.

It is also a constant struggle against the devil, the prince of evil. Jesus himself celebrates our victories. He rejoiced when his disciples made progress in preaching the Gospel and overcoming the opposition of the evil one: "I saw Satan fall like lightning from heaven" (Lk 10:18)."

## What Makes us Catholic? <u>Purgatory</u>

"Purgatory is a state of final purification after death, and before entrance into Heaven. Purgatory is the word the Church uses to describe this state of being. o understand Purgatory, it is important to know what happens after we die. At the moment of death, we undergo something called "particular judgement." There are three possible outcomes to this judgement. Based on a person's faith and life, they may go to Heaven, to Purgatory, or to Hell. The choice of fate is up to the individual."




