

Consistency and humility

Today's gospel continues to describe this unpleasant tension and controversy with the Jewish authorities that began in chapter 21, 23 and is now reaching its climax with these series of "Woes."

The text helps us perceive at a first level the background of the crucifixion of Jesus at the hands of the Jewish authorities of his time. But, on a second level, it takes us to the historical context of the author "Matthew" addressing his community (75-90 AD) who is in full and clear controversy with a Jewish group, probably from the sect of the Pharisees, of the Yamnia community. The leaders of the Yamnia community thought of themselves as the successors of Moses and therefore, they claimed his authority. The conflict between this Jewish group and the Christian community at the end of the first century is at a time of great tension and rejection that will end with the expulsion of Christians from Jewish synagogues.

It should be noted that their teachings were good, since they were based on great zeal for God and the Torah (the law of Moses). The underlying issue was more about certain inconsistencies between what they preached and what was "behind" or inside them, their intentions are the ones that are questioned. They did things for appearance, for power, for vainglory, to have or obtain the main places, to show their greatness and their superiority. That was the problem!

And what about US? In our times, we sometimes become judges or think we are superior to others, either because of what we know or because of our pious practices. Sometimes we can think that these place us above others. We must be very careful with this; that our desire to teach others is to authentically seek their good and the extension of the Kingdom of Heaven in our midst and that, as our question of the week invites us, we live authentically with an attitude of humility what we preach. From vainglory and pride... Deliver us Lord!



Mendicant orders

It refers to those who divested themselves of all earthly goods as supported themselves by appealing to the charity of the alms. It started by two "notable" saints of the time (thirteenth century). Giovanni Francesco Bernardone of Assisi (St. Francis of Assisi) and Dominic Guzman of Old Castile (St. Dominic). There was a response to several issues happening in the world on those days including the response in vocations. Franciscans then years later after their founding there were already 5000 members.




