

During this holy Advent season, we present a very special series of Catholic Family Guides to help our parish families to grow in knowledge of the faith and deepen our relationship with Jesus as his disciples. On this Fourth Sunday of Advent, we welcome Father Christian Bui, pastor of St. Edward parish in Spring, Texas, who preaches for us on the Gospel for this week's Guide.



This Week

Eucharist Brings Unity

As a Catholic pastor, I am deeply inspired by the theme of Eucharistic revival. The Eucharist, or Holy Communion, is at the heart of our faith, and its revival is a call to deepen our understanding of this sacred mystery. St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians and the gospel of John offer profound insights that can guide us in our reflection on the Eucharistic revival.

In Ephesians 5:21–32, St. Paul beautifully portrays the union between Christ and His Church as a reflection of the love between a husband and his wife. This passage reminds us that the Eucharist is not merely a ritual but a profound encounter with the love of Christ. Through the Eucharist, we are united with Christ, becoming one body. Just as the husband and wife become one, we, the Church, become one with Christ in the Eucharist. The Eucharistic revival calls us to recognize and appreciate this intimate union, drawing us closer to Christ and to one another.

John 6:60–69 presents a powerful moment in the life of Jesus when many of His disciples found His teaching about the Eucharist difficult to accept. Jesus asks the Twelve if they, too, will leave Him. Peter's response, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life," resonates deeply with the Eucharistic revival theme. It highlights that the Eucharist is not just a symbol or tradition but the source of eternal life. Like Peter, we must recognize that the Eucharist contains the very essence of Christ, the Word of eternal life, and cling to it with unwavering faith.

In this time of Eucharistic revival, we are called to rekindle our love for the Eucharist, recognizing it as the living presence of Christ in our midst. Let us remember the profound union between Christ and His Church, and let us echo the words of Peter, affirming our faith in the Eucharist as the source of eternal life. May this revival lead us to a deeper understanding of the Eucharist, strengthening our relationship with Christ and fostering unity within the Church, as we embrace the Eucharist with renewed reverence and devotion.






