

Living Like Heaven-Bound People

How often do you think about heaven? Some years ago, Stephen Covey wrote *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People*; the second "habit" he states is: "Begin with the end in mind." Certainly this is what Jesus is doing this as he tells us in today's gospel what true happiness is and how to attain it. If you want to know what Jesus expects his disciples to be about, if you want to know what heaven-bound people are like, listen carefully to the Beatitudes.



Why are we doing this?



Jesus' life is an example of preaching the Kingdom of God through word and deed, and Christians are called to do likewise..

Using this Guide can be as simple or as "in depth" as you want. If you do only the opening prayer section, that's great! To go deeper, follow the steps as shown. For children, see "Resources," page 8.

Step Two

CONNECT with Scripture and Tradition

As a domestic church (your household) or Small Faith Group, pray and read through some of the following (you can select) Scriptures & Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) references as time permits.

In the HOLY SCRIPTURE we read:

- The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel--Mark 1:15
- "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father in heaven--**Matthew 7:21**
- Let the children come to me, and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these"--Matthew 19:14
- In the parable of the sheep and the goats, Jesus teaches us that active love toward the poor of every kind is a condition for entering his kingdom--Matthew 25:31-46

In the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), we read:

- The kingdom belongs to the poor and lowly, which means those who have accepted it with humble hearts. #544
- The coming of God's Kingdom means that Satan's kingdom is now defeated--#550.
- Jesus invites sinners to the table of the kingdom--#545
- One must enter the kingdom (that is, become a disciple of Christ), in order to "know the secrets of the kingdom of heaven"--#546

Discussion Questions

- 1. The first and core message of Jesus' preaching was: "The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel." Why do you think this was so important to him?
- 2. What do you think is necessary for a person to enter the Kingdom of God?
- 3. Can sinners enter the Kingdom of Heaven? Explain your answer.

4. Why do you think it is necessary to become a disciple of Christ in order to "know the secrets of heaven?"

Want more? Go Deeper!

Reflection Question

The work of each person in God's Kingdom is promoting action for the common good. How are my actions promoting the Kingdom of God? How might they be taking away from it?



The terms "Kingdom of Heaven" and "Kingdom of God" appear many times in Scripture. Matthew uses the term "Kingdom of Heaven;" Mark and Luke use "Kingdom of God." Catholics believe both terms mean the same thing.

Practical Activities

For the Individual

Mirror Reminder

Choose Entertainment Wisely

As married persons, our job is to help our spouse get to heaven. One way of doing this is to be careful when choosing our entertainment. Select movies and games that reinforce values we want to live by, and avoid those that place poor messages in our minds and distract us from our true goal.


Closing Prayer


