


This Week

Called: Children of the Light

As a priest, I usually spend my day-off at my parents' house, where I grew up. I usually say Mass for my parents in the morning, in a room with a big window overlooking the lagoon adjacent to the house. I remember one morning the sun was shining really bright and was reflecting off of the water at just the right angle, so it beamed into the room. I knew the water wasn't the source of light and had no power to produce light in itself, it simply reflected the source. And yet, the reflection of the sun off of the water was, somehow, just a strong as the rays of the sun itself. What does it mean to be a Child of the Light? It means to reflect the Son, the light of the world. We don't have power to produce the light of Jesus ourselves and we certainly aren't the source. We can only reflect. And yet, our reflection can be incredibly strong for others. That's our call as Children of the Light: to reflect the Son and to point others to Him.




CONNECT with our GOD



For the Individual - Sharing the Light

This week, share with someone close to you (a family member or a friend) something new that you have recently learned about your faith. It may be something that you did not know or something that you understand in a new way and that it has illuminated your understanding and has given you clarity.



For Couples Bringing to light the qualities of one another

Often our spouse sees things in ourselves (good and not so good) that we can't see. This week we invite you to dedicate a moment to which each one puts in writing a list of all the qualities (the good things) that he/she finds in his/her partner. Then share this list with each other along with concrete examples of these qualities in your daily life.



For the Domestic Church Praying for clarity as a family

This week, we invite you to pray together to ask God with humility and trust to reveal the different areas or situations in which there is blindness or obscurities that do not allow you to advance in your life of faith and/or your family life. Then, share what you have received in prayer and ask God to help you see.



Missionary Mindset Going Out to Meet the Stranger

Let's meditate on whom in our community may feel like a stranger or may feel excluded. Then, decide to take a concrete action to go out to meet this person (or people). This will lead us to be a more hospitable and welcoming parish.

Lamps - Candles

First introduced into the Church out of necessity, lamps became later symbols of honor. In the early Middle Ages they were hung before reliquaries and the Tabernacle. From the XIII Century onward, the lamp has been used to honor continually the Divine Presence. It is now called the Sanctuary Lamp, and there is requirement that at least one lamp should burn continually before the Blessed Sacrament. If more than one lamp is used, the number should be uneven, it is required to be suspended or rise at least 7 feet off the floor, or above eye level.

Word of the Week - Sacred Relics

Any part of the bodily remains of a Saint is designated a sacred relic, they need to be authenticated, that is declared by sworn statement to be genuine (c. 1190). We just dedicated a new place in our church where we can venerate the relics of Saint Maria Goretti, Saint Paul of the Cross, Saint Gemma Galgani, and Saint Lawrence of Brindisi. We encourage you to come and expend some time of prayer and reflection on the life of these saints.
