

This Week

Why Must I Suffer?

People often ask the question, "Why must I suffer?" Jesus shows great compassion for suffering people throughout his ministry. Still, he doesn't answer the question "Why?" He says, "Take up your cross and follow me" (Matthew 16:24). Perhaps we have been asking the wrong question, then: It's not "why," but "how?" How do I imitate Jesus as he willing accepts is cross for the sake of the salvation of the world? Jesus didn't run from the cross; rather, he embraced it because, he said, "I will rise again on the third day." He didn't curse the cross, he accepted it. His closest disciples did not understand this, even Peter. They kept trying to talk him out of it. It wasn't until after the resurrection of Jesus and the coming of the Holy Spirit that they came to understand: Suffering is a pathway to something else. Learning how to walk this path is our life's project.

At the heart of every baptized Christian is the Cross of Christ. Jesus promises us two things: 1) That for his faithful people, suffering will not last forever and 2) suffering takes on new meaning when take up our cross and follow him. In my life, am I open to Christ's call to follow? Am I willing to die with him so I might rise with him? Do I curse my cross or do I accept it? Am I willing to lay down my life in whatever way Christ asks it of me? The Paschal Mystery asks all of these questions and provides the answer, giving redemptive meaning to the reality of human suffering and evil.* In this Guide, let us ponder and discuss what it means to unite our sufferings with Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection so that we, like Jesus, can also live a new life.



Question of the Week

How do I unite my suffering to Jesus' passion, death, and ressurection?

Prayer

CONNECT with our GOD

- Let's start with the *The Sign of Cross*.
- As we gather to share our faith, ask the Holy Spirit to be present. Use your own words or offer a <u>Prayer to</u> the <u>Holy Spirit</u>.
- As someone reads out loud the Gospel for this Sunday, listen to the Lord speaking to you.
- Listen to one other as everyone shares what in the Gospel caught their attention.
- Pray the *Collect*—opening prayer of Sunday Mass.

Step One

CONNECT with our daily LIVES

"Then Jesus said to his disciples, "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself," take up his cross, and follow me" (Matthew 16:24) What do you think he means in saying this?



Step Two

CONNECT with Scripture and Tradition

Choose from among the following Scriptures and teachings for reading, prayer, and discussion.

- ...if only we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him. Romans 8:17
- If we persevere, we shall also reign with him. <u>II Timothy 2:12</u>

Discuss

- 1. Describe a time when you got through a difficult or painful situation. Why do you think you were able to endure it?
- 2. How do you manage the suffering in your own life? To what or to whom do you turn when life is difficult? Is this helpful and good or does it make things worse?
- 3. In general, one of the worse ways to manage suffering it to dwell too much on yourself and your own pain, self-pity and selfish desires; one of the best ways it to get the focus off yourself and help others. How have you experienced this in your own life, especially during this Lent?

Practical Activities

For the Individual - At the Foot of the Cross

Spend time looking at a crucifix. No words are necessary. Simply be present to the moment and see what Jesus has to say to you. If you become easily distracted or find it difficult, gently move your attention back at the crucifix. Remain there for a time and allow the experience to enfold you.



For Couples - Wash each other's feet

On the day that Jesus washed the feet of His apostles, take some time to wash each other's feet. It was one of Jesus' last acts on Earth to remind us that we are to love and sacrifice for each other. It can also be an intimate moment between husband and wife. (See <u>John 13:1-20</u> for Jesus' words about the washing of feet.)



For the Domestic Church - Taking Time for the Sacred


This is the holiest week of the year. Minimize your shopping this week so you can focus on godly things. Slow down. Be mindful. Recall what Jesus has done for you and accept that he is always present with you. Choose an activity, such as reading a bible story, saying a rosary, doing the stations of the cross, or an act of service, together to remind you of this.



Missionary Mindset - Surprise a Servant

Think of those who serve you in your daily life, from the mailman to the waitress at your favorite restaurant. Take a moment to write a thoughtful message and a word of encouragement in a notecard, expressing your gratitude for what they do to help make your life easier. A little surprise might be exactly what they need to lift their spirits and remind them that there is hope in humanity and in Jesus Christ!

The holiest three days of the year--Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil, are coming soon. Not everyone can go to the Holy Land, but we can participate in the Church's sacred liturgies. It's like making a spiritual pilgrimage. Everyone should strive to participate in all three services at least once in a lifetime. Yes, they are long, but they are unlike anything else we do all year. Attend as much as you can. It will move your heart!


Closing Prayer

What Makes us Catholic? Veneration of the Cross

The tradition of the Veneration of the Cross dates back to the fourth-century. On Good Friday, the Christians in Jerusalem would gather before a relic of the true cross to kneel, bow, and kiss the cross in remembrance of the Passion of Christ. Today, most churches venerate the cross during their Good Friday services.

Adoration or veneration of an image or representation of Christ's cross does not mean that we actually adore the material image, of course, but rather what it represents. In kneeling before the crucifix and kissing it we are paying the highest honor to our Lord's cross as the instrument of our salvation. Because the Cross is inseparable from His sacrifice, in reverencing His Cross we, in effect, adore Christ. Thus we affirm: 'We adore Thee, O Christ, and we bless Thee because by Thy Holy Cross Thou has Redeemed the World.'


