




# HELLO, CHRIST THE GOOD SHEPHERD FAMILY!

Welcome to our weekly CGS Guide that helps our parish families to grow in knowledge of the faith and deepen our relationship with Jesus as his disciples. As we encounter Jesus, we come to know him, love him, and serve him so that we can be reasonably happy in this life and happy with him forever in heaven.

#### Confront, Discuss, Pray and Serve

During the Easter Season in the first reading of each Sunday we have been meditating on the book of Acts of the Apostles that according to Bible scholars is part of the work of St. Luke (the author of the gospel that bears his name). And just as in his gospel we find a development of the very life of our Lord and our Savior Jesus Christ; his birth, growth, his public life, his ministry and the difficulties he faced until his own passion, death and resurrection, we can affirm that the book of Acts handles more or less a similar process but now with the first Church and in a concrete way with the apostles. From their birth at Pentecost, their development, establishment and the impact they had, their ministry that will bear much fruit, just as their teacher, Jesus affirms in today's gospel: "You will do the works that I do and make them even greater." However, in this process the book of Acts also presents us with the difficulties they faced in the growth of the community, specially when it reached to the the Gentiles. This shows us that the new Church also faced difficulties, conflicts and tensions like every community, including ours here at CGS. The teaching in today's first reading wants to show us how the apostles and the members of the first Christian community in Jerusalem resolved that issue. Pope Francis in his reflection (Regina Caeli, May 2014) affirmed that it was by confronting, discussing, praying and letting the Holy Spirit guide them that they found harmony, unity and respect for the different needs but also by honoring the various gifts and talents that God himself provides to each community. As we continue in our process of responding to the concrete needs of all the families that make up our community, we ask that the Holy Spirit guide us so that we can confront and discuss when necessary to find prayerfully united and practical solutions so that all are served and deeply love in our community.



# What Makes us Catholic?

Deacon – Literally, a servant, the diaconate is the first of holy orders. Whether is a transitioning (later to be ordained to the priesthood or a permanent deacon, the Bishop confers the stole and the dalmatic and says the words "Receive the power of the reading of the Gospel in the Church of God, both for the living and the death, in the name of the Lord. Vatican II Declares: "It is the duty of the deacon, to the extend that he has been authorized by competent authority, to administer baptism solemnly, to be custodian and dispenser of the Eucharist, to assist at and bless marriages in the name of the Church, to bring Viaticum to the dying, to read the Sacred Scripture to people, to instruct and exhort the people, to preside at the worship and prayer of the faithful, to administer sacramentals, a to officiate at a funeral and burial services. (LG 29)



#### Word of the Week - Diakonia

Diakonia (Greek) is a noun used 32 times in the New Testament and variously translated as "ministry," "service," "relief," or "support." It is used in Acts 6:1 regarding the serving of food and in Acts 6:4 referring to the "ministry of the Word." In Acts 20:24 and 21:19, Paul uses the word to refer to his ministry among the Gentiles. In Romans 12:6–7 it is referred to as a spiritual gift—the gift of serving.




