


This Week

On June 19, 2022, the Feast of Corpus Christi, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops began a three-year focus on the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist that is intended to be a National Eucharistic Revival. The bishops state, "Our world is hurting. We all need healing, yet many of us are separated from the very source of our strength. Jesus Christ invites us to return to the source and summit of our faith in the celebration of the Eucharist". The National Eucharistic Revival is a movement to restore understanding and devotion to this great mystery (learn more about the Eucharistic revival). At Christ the Good Shepherd we have begun the work of highlighting the importance of the Eucharist in our lives in many ways. Last year on the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, we held our first ever Eucharistic Procession hoping that we can begin an annual event. We have also offered opportunities of prayer before the Blessed Sacrament in Adoration the First Friday of every month for 24 hours and the first Wednesday of every month from 6-8 p.m. praying for more vocations to the priesthood and religious life. Additionally, we offer times after daily Mass every weekday. We are happy to lengthen these times as more people sign up for adoration. Our Gospel reading today comes from John 6. This Apostolic teaching gives undeniable legitimacy to Jesus' teaching that the bread and wine that is offered by God's holy people, by the power of the Holy Spirit, is changed into the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity, at every Mass that is celebrated. "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you" (John 6:51–58). Through the dismissal at the end of Mass, we are commissioned, sent out into the world to bring what we have received through God's gracious gift, out into the world.



Question of the Week

How can we be Eucharistic people in the world?

CONNECT with our GOD through Prayer

- Let's start with the <u>The Sign of Cross.</u>
- As we gather to share our faith, ask the Holy Spirit to be present. Use your own words or offer a <u>Prayer to</u> the Holy Spirit.
- As someone reads out loud the Gospel for this Sunday, listen to the Lord speaking to you.
- Listen to one other as everyone shares what in the Gospel caught their attention.
- Pray the <u>Collect</u>—opening prayer of Sunday Mass.

At Mass, we gather to give thanks for all God has done for us in the person of his beloved Son, Jesus Christ. The Eucharist celebrates and makes present the relationship God has with his people. To be a Eucharistic people means that we are committed to living a Eucharistic life, a life patterned after Christ, a life in which we are willing to break open our lives and shed our blood for others just as Jesus did for us.

For the Individual - Jesus Taught Us to Pray

God shared in our humanity that we might share God's divinity, including teaching us to pray. This week pray for your family and friends that they may have love for the mystery of the Eucharist. Invite them to Mass so they may grow closer to Christ through the Eucharistic Prayers.



For Couples - Jesus Taught Us to Love

In Sacramentum Caritatis (#85), Pope Benedict XVI teaches receiving Christ in the Eucharist commits us to becoming witnesses of his love. As a couple you have a unique bond of love that is strengthened by grace. This week spend time talking about how you can be more intentional witnesses of Christ's love.



For the Domestic Church - Jesus Taught Us to Forgive

Loving others allows us to be open to being hurt by them. Jesus commanded us to forgive freely just as we have been forgiven. Recognize the importance of forgiveness by letting go of our feelings of vengeance is healthy for us spiritual and physical. Art is often a powerful way to confront your big feelings, release your emotions and turn them into something beautiful.



Missionary Mindset --Jesus Taught Us to Serve

Jesus Christ, King of Kings, humbled himself and became man like you and me in all except sin. Time and time again we read that Christ emptied himself and took on the form of a servant. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, Jesus is personally present with us and among us.






Closing Prayer



What Makes us Catholic?

We Become What We Receive

Many Fathers of the Church spoke of God becoming one of us, assuming our humanity, so that through grace we might become what God is. St. Augustine of Hippo said: "...he himself that justifies also deifies, for by justifying he makes sons of God. 'For he has given them power to become children of God' (see John 1:12). St. Irenaeus said, "The Word of God, our Lord Jesus Christ, who did, through His transcendent love, become what we are, that He might bring us to be even what He is Himself." Athanasius the Great, Bishop of Alexandria, said, "God became human that humans might become god. Just as the Lord, putting on the body, became a man, so also we men are both deified through his flesh, and henceforth inherit everlasting life."



Word of the Week - Divinization

St. Irenaeus said, "The Word of God, our Lord Jesus Christ, through His transcendent love, become what we are, that He might bring us to be even what He is Himself." St. John of the Cross said that "God communicates to each individual soul His supernatural Being in such way that it appears to be God Himself." God has made it possible for us to be so transformed that we come to resemble God so much that others can see Christ in us. **This process is called Divinization—being made holy.**






