
A Life of Simplicity is a Life of Peace

Some years ago, I became acquainted with the writings of Brother Lawrence, a 17th century Carmelite Monk who lived in France, in a book called <u>The Practice of the Presence of God</u>. After considerable grumbling about the misfortunes of life, he began to contemplate what it would be like if he could simply hand it all to God and perform his daily tasks without complaint, living in simple trust in God, keeping a steady mindfulness of God no matter what happened. To his surprise, he began to experience a deep inner peace—so much so that *other people* began to come to see him! He seemed to have something special and *very* compelling—what Jesus calls the "pearl of great price."*

What was it Brother Lawrence had? A sense of fulfillment that comes when one makes room for loving God. In his own words: "He does not ask much of us, merely a thought of Him from time to time, a little act of adoration, sometimes to ask for His grace, sometimes to offer Him your sufferings, at other times to thank Him for the graces, past and present, He has bestowed on you, in the midst of your troubles to take solace in Him as often as you can. Lift up your heart to Him during your meals and in company; the least little remembrance will always be the most pleasing to Him. One need not cry out very loudly; He is nearer to us than we think."

Modern life is so full; there is a plethora of things competing for our attention. Possessions, occupations, distractions, an over-abundance of options and choices. Life is complicated--sometimes because of the culture in which we live, and sometimes because of our own choices. In today's gospel, Jesus praises the "little ones" because they have chosen a simple life, becoming open to the secrets of the divine. Brother Lawrence shows that simplicity of life brings us closer to God, and therefore, closer to peace. To obtain that peace, we must evaluate what currently fills our lives. For some people, this means giving up material possessions to follow Jesus; for others, it means sharing material goods, or clearing the clutter--especially the clutter within our own minds. In other words, there is no peace without renunciation of something. In this Guide, let's explore what what it takes to live a simple life, and thus, a peace-ful life. As Brother Lawrence again says, ""There is not in the world a kind of life more sweet and delightful, than that of a continual conversation with God; those only can comprehend it who practice and experience it."



Jesus preached a simple life, suggesting that we imitate the birds of the air and the lilies in the field who do not worry about tomorrow, or about what they eat or wear. But this worry-free and simple life may seem an almost impossible, and perhaps abstract ideal, given the huge pressures we face living in a consumer society.

Living simply is more about revaluating our priorities, making a conscious effort to live well within our means and to purse what is meaningful in our lives, rather than being caught up in the trap of always wanting more and more.

To live simply is to seek joy and happiness in the simple and more important things in life. This requires us to slow down and to revaluate what is meaningful in our lives. Often mistaken for material things, we all know, deep down, that what we treasure the most in our lives are the relationships we have, and the connections we have made, where we are loved for who we are, the way we are.



For the Individual - Attitude of Gratitude

What Makes us Catholic? - Fasting


As Catholics, we are called to live a simple life and often we need to weed out the things that clutter our spiritual life. The practice of fasting allows us to deny ourselves of the things of this world so that we can focus on our spiritual needs and make more room for Christ.

The Catechesis of Fasting by Adam Deville reflects about fasting:

The most important lesson about fasting is that taught by Christ in the gospels: fasting is not to make us gloomy! It is not a bitter, excruciating ordeal: "And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites....

But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father" (Matt. 6:16).

Already the note is sounded: fasting, while a form of self-denial, is nonetheless a cause of our joy and it is this joy, rather than the fast, that we should manifest to the world.

Word of the Week - Sacrifice

A sacrifice is not only an oblation. Where an oblation offers something to God, a sacrifice immolates or gives up what is offered. In sacrifice the gift offered is something precious completely surrendered by the one making the sacrifice as a token of humble recognition of God's sovereignty. (The Supreme Act of the Priesthood of Christ: The Sacrifice of the Cross.)






