

DISCIPLES OF JESUS!

During this holy Advent season, we present a very special series of Catholic Family Guides to help our parish families to grow in knowledge of the faith and deepen our relationship with Jesus as his disciples. On this First Sunday of Advent, we welcome Father Tom Ponzini, pastor of Prince of Peace in Houston, Texas, who preaches for us on the Gospel for this week's Guide.



This Week

Guess Whose Coming to Dinner

A woman was hosting a dinner party and, at the table, she asked her 6-year old daughter to say "Grace". The little girl responded: "I don't know what to say!" The mother replied: "Just say what you hear Mommy say." The little girl nodded and prayed: "Dear Lord, why in the world did I invite so many people to dinner?"

In today's Gospel, we hear about the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes. Jesus and His disciples find themselves in a remote place, with a large crowd – 5,000 men not including women and children. That's probably close to 20,000 people! And these people were hungry!

Now, it was clear that Jesus' disciples did not have the means to feed all these people – neither in ready available cash nor access to a huge, nearby market. Yet, surprisingly, Jesus asks Phillip: "Where can we buy enough food for them to eat?" (John 6:5b) But, the passage continues: "He said this to test Him..." (John 6:6)

This passage reminds us that God sometimes allows our challenges to become so big and so desperate to show us His incredible power. How great is our Lord in solving the unsolvable and making possible the impossible! As stated in Luke 1:38: "Nothing is impossible with God." Ask yourself the following question: "Why do I easily give up hope when I don't see a human solution to a situation?"

Today's Gospel also shows us that Jesus wants us to play a part in His miracle. Even though God has the power to create something out of nothing, He asks for human collaboration – even if it is minimal. The disciples could bring Jesus only five loaves and two fish from a boy they found in the crowd. Jesus wants us to contribute because He wants us to be generous – even when we think we have nothing to give. Lack of resources is never an excuse for lack of generosity in serving the Lord. This miracle accentuates that God can never be outdone in generosity! The gospel for this Guide foreshadows the self-giving love of Jesus in the Eucharist.

Ask yourself the following question: "Why do I sometimes feel that I have nothing to offer in certain situations?"



What Makes Us Catholic?

The Eucharist

What makes us Catholic? The simple answer is, "the Eucharist." Yet, like an iceberg, there is much more under the surface. As Catholics, we believe that the Eucharist is what Jesus Christ says it is: His Body and Blood and, by extension, soul and divinity. The bread and the wine brought forward to the altar during Mass are changed by Jesus himself, using the words of the priest, into His Body and Blood. This means that once the host is consecrated we are now in the physical presence of Jesus and are to show the respect we would if he appeared in his human form. This understanding and acceptance of the Eucharist is what makes us uniquely Catholic. This is indeed a hard saying, even as it was when Jesus himself said this in person (John 6:60). Many of his followers left him. Centuries later, this belief is part of the reason why the Protestants left the Catholic faith. Learn more here in paragraph 1402 and beyond in the Catechism of the Catholic Church.



Word of the Week - Eucharist

Eucharist is "The ritual, sacramental action of thanksgiving to God which constitutes the principal Christian liturgical celebration of and communion in the paschal mystery of Christ. The liturgical action called the Eucharist is also traditionally known as the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, glossary). It is one of the seven sacraments of the Church; the Holy Eucharist completes Christian initiation (CCC #1332). The Sunday celebration of the Eucharist is at the heart of the Church's life" (CCC #2177).







