





Practical Activities



For the Individual -- Be Attentive to Christ's Presence at Mass

Make a conscious effort to pay attention to the words of the Mass, notice where you see the presence of Christ in the prayers and in those who are worshipping with you. This can be a little difficult to do if you have small children, but even in their squirmyness, Christ is there. Jesus isn't looking for perfection, he is looking for faithfulness.



For Couples -- Deepen your Relationship with Jesus

Three ways you can grow closer to Christ as a couple is to get to know Him better, spend more time with Him, and genuinely share your lives and your hearts with Him. If you are not sure where to start or what to do, pray together about it. God will help you. God brought you together and He wants to be part of your lives. Mike Schmitz has a video about How to Practice the Presence of God with some useful ideas.



For the Domestic Church --Participate as a Family in the Eucharistic Procession
November 27-30, four days of Eucharistic Adoration. Masses will be celebrated and a
car procession will take place on three successive days carrying the Blessed
Sacrament from Prince of Peace, to St. Ignatius, then to Christ the Good Shepherd, a
stopover at Frasatti High School, then on to St. Edward. Take time this week for an
opportunity for adoration, confession or take part in the Procession.



Missionary Mindset -- Go!

Jesus himself commissions us to go into the world, teach people about him; he is sending us out on our divinely appointed mission in the world. (Matthew 28:19-20) At the end of each celebration of the Mass the Priest sends us out into the world to take what we have learned through the readings and prayers and live like Jesus and show God's love to people in our daily lives. Consider ways that you as a disciple can do what he asks us to do.

Liturgy - the Joining of Heaven with Earth

The Church Fathers, who as bishops presided at liturgy every day, wrote often of the presence of the community of worshippers, saints, the deceased, and the company of the heavenly host at the public worship of the Church. The Fathers did so from the very first days of the Church, for the Jewish custom of praying for the dead, which memorialized their continued presence among the living, carried over into Christianity

Saint Augustine wrote that at the liturgy the angels, the saints, and those yet to be born all join together in the great act of worship of the trinitarian God, as though the faithful departed stood beside the living, and the angels flank the altar of sacrifice in the sanctuary.




Word of the Week - Liturgy


