Scripture Readings February 17, 2019 Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Jeremiah 17:5-8

Jeremiah compares a man who seeks strength in flesh but abandons God to a bush in the desert, bereft of nourishment and unable to grow. Yet a man who trusts in God is like a tree beside a river, fed and strengthened by it even during times of drought.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:12, 16-20

Paul addresses those who believe in Christ's teachings, but are not convinced that he rose from the dead. He calls their faith worthless, because they have not been freed from their sins. Paul then emphatically declares that Jesus did rise up again, as will all those who truly believe in him.

Gospel: Luke 6:17, 20-26

Jesus tells his followers that those who are insulted in this life because of him will be rewarded richly in heaven. Yet those well received by all will despair in heaven, since people had often respected false prophets and mistreated true prophets. Those who hunger, perhaps for spiritual knowledge, shall be filled. Yet those who are full in this life will be hungry.

From the Desk of Fr. Jared

Papal General Audience and Catechesis

It has been the tradition of the Vatican to have a Papal General Audience on Wednesdays. This event gives pilgrims and visitors an opportunity to "see the Pope" and receive a Papal Blessing. The Wednesday Audience also consists of a brief catechesis (teachings and readings). At the end of the Audience the Pope leads the people in praying the Our Father in Latin (Pater Noster). At the end of the prayer the Holy Father imparts his blessing upon the crowd, which also extends to loved ones that are sick and suffering, and blesses any religious articles that people have brought with them for the purpose of the blessing.

For the next few weeks, I would like to share with you some of Pope Francis' catechesis (edited) on the Ten Commandments (Decalogue) which he gave over a year ago.

I am the Lord your God: you shall not have strange Gods before me.

We Christians can ask ourselves: who is truly my God? Is it the One and Triune Love or is it my image, my personal success, perhaps even within the Church? "Idolatry not only refers to false pagan worship. It remains a constant temptation to faith. Idolatry consists in divinizing what is not God" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, n. 2113).

The word 'idol' in Greek is derived from the verb 'to see'. An idol is a 'vision' which has the tendency to become a fixation, an obsession. Advertising, for example, uses this dynamic: I cannot see the object itself but I can perceive that car, that smartphone, that role — or other things — as a means of fulfilling myself and responding to my basic needs. And I seek it out, I speak of it, I think of it...everything serves that goal. Idols enslave. They promise happiness but do not deliver it and we find ourselves living for that thing or that vision, drawn into a self-destructive vortex, waiting for a result that never comes.

Dear brothers and sisters, idols promise life, but in reality, they take it away. The true God does not demand life but gives it, as a gift. The true God does not offer a projection of our success but teaches us how to love. The true God teaches how to live in everyday reality.

Today, I invite you to think: how many idols do I have and which one is my favorite? Because recognizing one's own forms of idolatry is the beginning of grace and puts one on the path of love. If something becomes absolute and supreme, then it is more important than a spouse, than a child or a friendship. Being attached to an object or an idea makes one blind to love.

Spreading of Germs Precautions

We are reminded that we are in the midst of "flu season" as we sit in church and hear the coughing, sneezing, and The reality of the spreading of germs is something we need to take precautions with. Last year, we temporarily suspended the distribution of Holy Communion under both species because of the concern that drinking from the same chalice could bring about the sharing of more than the Blood of Christ; namely germs and sickness. This year, I am asking each individual to take precautions. We will continue to distribute Holy Communion under both species, but I ask you to be aware of your own health and to take precautions when necessary. If you are not feeling well you may not want to come to church. If you feel well enough to come to church, I would ask that you refrain from receiving from the chalice. It should be noted that the Church has always taught the doctrine of concomitance, by which we know that under each species alone, the whole Christ is sacramentally present and we "receive all the fruit of Eucharistic grace." Therefore, Jesus Christ is truly present, Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity in both species. At the same time an appreciation for reception of "the whole Christ" through one species should not diminish in any way the fuller sign value of reception of Holy Communion under both kinds. For just as Christ offered his whole self, body and blood, as a sacrifice for our sins, so too is our reception of his Body and Blood under both kinds an especially fitting participation in his memorial of eternal life. Another precaution that should be taken is shaking hands. At the Sign of Peace, if you are not feeling well, feel free to refrain from offering a handshake. Please be respectful of a fellow parishioner's decision not to offer a gesture if they are not feeling well. Incidentally, this act is an optional part of the Mass. It does not have to be done. It is my hope that everyone feels welcomed and remains healthy at St. Catherine's.
