FROM FR. FRAN

The other day I was reading an article on a Catholic web site about Pope Francis' remarks to other Christian denominations on the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul, January 25. The Pope begged an apology for the way in which, over the centuries, Roman Catholicism has treated other Christian religions in a less than Christian fashion. On what was the last day of the international week of Christian Unity the Pope said: "We cannot undo what was done in the past, but we don't want to allow the weight of past sins to pollute our relationships." The Pope called division among Christians "an open wound in the Body of Christ."

This is just one of a number of speeches that Pope Francis has given in his pontificate concerning the reuniting of the Christian family. Just a few weeks ago, Lutherans and Roman Catholics celebrated the Eucharist together in Rome at the end of a conference. In significant ways we are seeing the fruit of many years' work to overcome differences and celebrate the commonalities of Christian denominations, rather than continue to embrace long held feuds and hurts.

After reading the article mentioned above, I was curious to see readers' reactions, so I scrolled down to the comments box. Big mistake! Many of the comments were anything but Christian. Some derided the Pope, saying that he shouldn't apologize for anything the church has done to those who hold beliefs that differ from Roman Catholicism. A few commenters said that if the Pope apologizes for anything, he should apologize for the harm that Vatican II has done to the church! To be sure there were positive comments as well. However, the level of incivility was striking.

I'm sure, regardless of the topic, you've probably read lots of nastiness in comment boxes on line. However, one would think that on a Catholic web site things would be different. Yet, I have read that some of the nastiest comments out there regularly occur on "religious" web sites. How sad. The unity and mutual respect that Pope Francis and other leaders of faith are calling for seems not even to be an option on this platform where you can say whatever you want with no accountability.

We have seen all too frequently the anger, prejudice and fear which underlies such comments play themselves out in real time in our civic, political, religious and family life. In a healthy pluralistic society differences of opinion and differing ideologies are just a part of life. The challenge is to make things work for the common good, to unite rather than divide. This seems to be what Pope Francis is up to in regard to our relationships with our Christian sisters and brothers. Yet, what are we to make of this when we hear representatives of denominations use religion to justify hatred, exclusion, prejudice and even violence?

Truly, there is a lot of healing to be done before the entire Body of Christ lives and moves as one. Last week, in our second reading at Mass, we heard St. Paul say that we all have our roles to play as part of the Body of Christ, and that when any one member is hurting the whole body hurts. Perhaps as we look towards what we will do for Lent this year we can ask ourselves questions such as these: What do I do to help the Body of Christ heal? How do I respond to people whose outlook is different from mine? How do I choose a candidate to vote for when so much political rhetoric is divisive, mean and unchristian? How do I speak about other people whether in groups or on social media? At end of the day, have I done more to unite the Body of Christ or to wound it?

On the night before he died, Jesus prayed that all be one. As baptized believers it is our challenge to take up Christ's prayer and make it our own by the way in which we live our lives. Christ came to unite, not divide, and as his disciples, he calls us to continue his work on earth.

ST. VINCENT DEPAUL SOCIETY

On January 19th we took our first step toward forming a St. Vincent dePaul conference through the St. Matthias Parish. We had an informational meeting with the presidents of the Sudbury and Hudson conferences. These Vincentians gave us a brief organization of the Boston Archdiocese. The St. Matthias chapter would be in the Metro-West district, which has 9 conferences. They also gave us a brief overview of a typical meeting agenda and gave us some ideas of how they assist the needy.

The mission of the SVDP society is to give food, clothing, housing, healing and help to individuals and families in our community who have nowhere else to turn for help. At the same time, it is an ideal opportunity for the Vincentians to grow spiritually. Jesus said what we do for the least of his children we do for Him! The Sudbury conference (Our Lady of Fatima) also has an extensive resource guide which will help us immensely as we start.

Our next step is to have another informational meeting with a representative from the SVDS central office. We will need people to help behind the scenes and also people to contact the needy who call for help and set up visitations to analyze their needs.
