### FOURTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

#### **FAITH FORMATION**

Poor Thomas! He made one remark and has been branded as "Doubting Thomas" ever since. But if he doubted, he also believed. He made what is certainly the most explicit statement of faith in the New Testament: "My Lord and My God!" (see John 20:24-28) and, in so expressing his faith, gave Christians a prayer that will be said till the end of time. He also occasioned a compliment from Jesus to all later Christians: "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed" (John 20:29).

Thomas should be equally well known for his courage. Perhaps what he said was impetuous—since he ran, like the rest, at the showdown—but he can scarcely have been insincere when he expressed his willingness to die with



Jesus. The occasion was when Jesus proposed to go to Bethany after Lazarus had died. Since Bethany was near Jerusalem, this meant walking into the very midst of his enemies and to almost certain death. Realizing this, Thomas said to the other apostles, "Let us also go to die with him" (John 11:16b).

## MISSION COOPERATIVE MISSION

Let us give a warm St. Matthias Parish welcome to Sr. Margaret Nyangireki, OLGC the USA Representative for the Mission Cooperative Plan. Sr. Margaret will be a guest speaker during weekend masses July 9 and 10 and sends to us the following brief history:

The Congregation of Our Lady of Good Counsel Sister is a diocesan African women religious institute. It was started in 1937 in Mbarara Diocese by the Canadian Sisters of Our Lady Of Good Counsel. In 1957 the congregation became an independent diocesan indigenous Congregation. Today the total No. of professed sisters is 310 sisters. 90 sisters are retired and aged.

The Mission of our congregation is Evangelization through integral education and formation for the lowly of society. Guided with this mission sisters of Our Lady of Good Counsel have provided skills that instill hope in the lowly of society. The sisters have founded schools, vocational training centers, and health centers. The Congregation supports many youths, those in schools and out of school. They teach and help those with special needs, like the blind, disabled, lame, deaf, orphans, especially the victims of HIV/AIDS. We counsel patients with HIV/AIDS and their families and help many other needy people that flock the doors of convents for help. This demand alone stretches the financial abilities of the Congregation.

On behalf of the Superior General Sr. Jacinta Tuhairwe, and the whole congregation, I thank you in advance. May God bless you all.
