# FROM FR. FRAN

The other day I was reading in the paper that there was an open casting call in Boston for the next Mark Wahlberg movie. The casting directors were looking for the "mafia and construction worker" look. I thought to myself, this movie must be another Boston based flick, because they were searching for what has come to be known as the Boston stereotype.

A stranger to Boston might deduce from the movies that Boston is a dangerous town, full of thugs, juvenile delinquents, drugs, corrupt cops, even more corrupt politicians, that it's run by Whitey Bulger and the Irish mob, and that everyone has a wicked accent that no one can understand. Let me assure you, as a native Bostonian, the movies do a great disservice to the city, its residents, and its "accent".

Over the last decade or so, there seems to be a just as erroneous stereotype of the Catholic Church out on the street. With the latest round of revelations of abuse, this time involving one of the most powerful cardinals in America, the whole ugliness of priestly misconduct has along with stereotypical reactions pronouncements about the dangers of celibacy, gay clergy, and an all-male priesthood. To me this is just as much a scapegoating of the problem as the way in which bishops shuffled abusers around and hoped for the best. To get to the heart of the issue, and to resolve things in healthy ways, it's important to stop scapegoating and stereotyping.

What is clear and true is that the church is, thankfully, dealing with the very real scandal of abuse at the highest levels. In just over a week's time, two bishops, one being a cardinal, resigned their positions, one because of credible accusations of abuse, the other because of his complicity in covering up abuse in his diocese. This is a huge development in a church that has been accused, and somewhat rightly, of moving too slowly on these issues. What is stunning and long overdue is that those in power who covered up abuse are now being held accountable by Rome. This is very good news.

Those priests who have crossed boundaries with adults and preyed upon children are the ones we read about. Dioceses are now quick to take them out of ministry. What hasn't been quick in coming is any sort of systematic dealing with those in authority who enabled these priests to continue in ministry. That is what is now changing. Cardinal Sean O'Malley, in a very strong statement on the issue, declared that it is time to develop policies to systematically deal with bishops who enabled cover-ups in their dioceses.

While the ongoing scandal is incredibly painful, especially to those who were abused and their families, many good things have come out of this terrible time. Still, there is much work to be done. What is incredibly sad is that so many people have left the faith because of the sinfulness and unlawfulness that has been uncovered in the institution. While divinely conceived, the church is still made up of very flawed human beings. The church does herself no favors when she continues to reward a culture of clericalism that puts the clergy and the institution on a pedestal. Only when we acknowledge our personal and corporate sinfulness will we begin to heal.

If we strip away the stereotyping and scapegoating, we will find that being a follower of Jesus Christ as a member of the Catholic Church is truly life-changing. In an age when truth is of small value, when respect for difference is hard to come by, when people don't know where to turn for wisdom and guidance, the church has so much to offer. It's heartbreaking that, just when the church can offer solid guidance on how to live a moral, ethical, compassionate and so many people have turned away. It's merciful life, deeply disturbing that this situation has been brought about by church members themselves, especially by those in authority unwilling or unable to deal with sickness, sin, and unlawful acts.

In the end, there is much to be said for being a member of the Body of Christ in the Catholic Church. Even in these difficult times, the Holy Spirit is continually renewing the church. Christ is still our Good Shepherd, leading us through the dark valleys into places of light, hope and joy. Are you ready to follow him and show that the Church has much to offer a world in need of God's embrace?
