Our COVID safety team met recently via Zoom to evaluate our indoor and parking lot masses.

While all agreed that we are doing quite well in keeping our parishioners safe, we have decided to suspend all inperson masses until February 21. We will reevaluate that decision on February 1st. We did talk of continuing drivein masses; however, with the precariousness of the winter weather and snow removal, we decided against this, at least for the duration of the winter.

This decision comes after much discussion of the current state of the pandemic, the number of cases in Marlborough and neighboring towns, along with the age and number of parishioners coming to mass. While this decision may be difficult for some who have been coming regularly, we see the safety of all parishioners as part of our mission to be Christ for one another.

Cardinal O'Malley has left decisions such as this up to the local pastors. I am grateful for this allowance. We will continue to record mass during this time and post it on social media.

My sincerest thanks to the members of our COVID Team and to all of you for your leadership within our parish family.

May the spring see us in a better position to gather as a community once more.

Annual Report to Parishioners for Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2020

A Note from the Finance Council

Dear Parishioners.

The Finance Council presents to you, on our website, stmattpar.org, a report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020. The Parish ended the year with a surplus of \$92,498.

Actual revenues were up relative to budget by \$61,292. The Weekly Offertory was below budget by (\$6,323). On the positive side was the Grand Annual where total donations of \$76,330 exceeded budget by \$11,330. Parish Maintenance collections of \$36,693 exceeded budget by \$3,093.

The parish received a very generous gift of over \$44,000 from the estate of a former parishioner. This amount along with donations made in memory of deceased parishioners resulted in Donations Other exceeding budget by \$56,887.

Actual expenses were below budget by \$21,879. Compensation was below budget by \$5,896 as an office position was eliminated with remaining staff assuming additional responsibilities. With the position elimination was a corresponding decrease in Benefits Expense of \$3,259.

Facilities Expense was under budget by \$7,333 as some maintenance projects were deferred when the Covid virus came upon us in the spring. Office expenses were under budget by \$3,245.

Pastoral/Liturgical was below budget by \$3,538 due to a decrease in weekend masses in the spring, and the overall decrease in funeral masses, as a result of the Covid pandemic restrictions. Note that the Diocese assessment expense was over budget by \$1,807 as the Parish came up short in meeting its Catholic Appeal assessment.

For the current fiscal year ending June 30, 2021, we are anticipating some minor heating repairs, roofing repairs, and other facilities repairs. We are expecting to break even in this fiscal year, assuming there are no major unforeseen expenditures. We have planned for a Grand Annual goal this fiscal year of \$70,000.

We would like to thank the parishioners for their financial support particularly in the way that the Grand Annual was supported in this past fiscal year, and for the parishioners ongoing support of the Parish in the midst of the Covid pandemic. May God bless you and your families.

FROM FR. FRAN

Sometime last fall, a young elementary school teacher read that one of her favorite movies, the Disney-Pixar production Ratatouille, was being turned into an attraction at Disney World. Being excited about the announcement, she started composing and humming a little tune about the main character, Remy the rat (yes, rat! I kid you not). She decided to turn her impromptu composition into a brief video on the social media platform TikTok. After posting the little tune she forgot about it, until weeks later when she noticed that it was becoming a "viral" hit.

Soon a young composer filled out the song and wrote an arrangement of it that he then posted on TikTok. Then others began taking this story of a Parisian rat who longed to be a famous chef (remember this is Disney after all) and wrote their own songs. People wrote songs for each character and each plot twist. Then others started to suggest that a full blown musical could be made out of the material.

Contributors of all ages and backgrounds from all over the world began to contribute ideas for costuming, stage settings, and all that goes into making a musical. Professional Broadway folk got wind of this and started to contribute to the project as well. Ultimately, an internet performance over Zoom was discussed and planned. A professional orchestra was hired to play the arrangements which were done by a number of composers. An "A" list of actors and singers from Broadway and TV signed Professional writers put together the narration, a professional director was tasked with creating a production that made it look like the actors and singers were in the same space, even though they recorded their parts in their bedrooms, kitchens, and living rooms.

On January 1st of this year Ratatouille, the TikTok musical made its debut on the internet. It was a smash hit as they say. To top it all off, the performance was a benefit for The Actors' Fund, an organization that has been taking care of the needs of actors for many years and especially now during the pandemic when all theater venues are in lockdown. The performance raised over 1 million dollars. And all this happened because a young school teacher made up a fragment of a song about Remy the Rat and posted it on line.

When we hear so much about how the internet is a wasteland and social media does more harm than good, this is a very heartwarming, positive story. It is the polar opposite of the stories in the news where a politician or "influencer" posts something that gets

people's blood boiling in dark ways, leading to acts like we saw at the Capitol building earlier this month.

Most of us who are on social media, whether it be Facebook, Twitter, Instagram or one of the many other services, know that there are many people who use these platforms to start trouble, to spread lies, to foment prejudice and violence toward those labeled as "outsider". The internet is a great place for likeminded people to organize from within their own bubbles. You can say whatever you want and rarely suffer any consequences, unless you cross the lines of the Terms of Service of the platform. And for the most part, those lines seem to keep moving.

As Catholic Christians living in this society and using these platforms, we bear a responsibility due to our baptismal call to love and serve the Lord and one another. Sadly, some of the most hateful and insensitive postings come from conversations on Catholic websites. Instead of living up to our calling, many feel that social media platforms exist outside of the realm of our faith.

Our Catholic faith is a 24/7 thing. We have the ability to make a positive impact wherever we are and through whatever we do. It's very easy to fall into bad behavior on social media. Perhaps, before we hit that "send" button, we need to think carefully about what we are about to put out there into the world.

As is clear by the story of the young school teacher who started the 'Ratatouille – the Musical' phenomenon, what we post, even in a casual way, can make an impact greater than we could ever imagine.

So, will we be creators of compassion, sensitivity, and honesty, or creators of discord, gossip, and prejudice? The answer is always a few keystrokes away.




