#### From Fr. Fran

#### We Pray for Peace

The scenes from Israel and Gaza continue to be horrific. Even with behind-the-scenes diplomacy from a number of nations, including our own, the death and destruction continues. Last Monday Pope Francis put out another plea as he has been doing since the beginning of the conflict. The Pope said: "Humanitarian law is to be respected, especially in Gaza. Please, let no more innocent blood be shed, neither in the Holy Land nor in Ukraine, nor in any other place! Enough! Wars are always a defeat, always!"

How right he is. Wars are always a defeat and so is the hatred and animosity sweeping through, not only the Middle East, but the world at large. Antisemitism and Islamophobia are on display even close to home. We may feel helpless as we watch the news reports and wonder where God is in all of this, yet the scriptures, especially the Book of Psalms, reveal to us that what we are feeling has been felt throughout the history of the human race.

In the psalms of lament, the author usually begins by addressing God and laying out a personal or communal tragedy. Then the psalmist often asks why God has let such a thing happen. This turns into a plea for God's help. By the end of the psalm, once all the anger and frustration has been spoken, the psalmist concedes that, even in the midst of it all, the only sure thing we have is our reliance and trust in God.

When we bring the horrors of the present day to God in prayer, it might be good to follow the pattern of the ancient author. First, we might speak to God by lifting up the current situation along with our frustration, anger, and doubt. We should feel free to shake an angry fist at God as did so many of the authors of the scriptures. Then we might ask God to help us in our feelings of helplessness, and finally admit that we must trust in God's presence. In return God might very well reveal to us ways in which, in our small human circle, we can use our voices and our lives to advance the peace, justice, and compassion that Christ came to bring. Here are some of the Psalms of Lament that you might want look up and bring to prayer: Psalms 12, 13, 25, 31, 74, 79, 85.

#### **Happy Halloween!**

When you think of Halloween, what comes to mind? For most people, Halloween has become synonymous with candy, costumes, scary stuff, witches, ghosts, pumpkins, and increasingly elaborate yard displays. But there are deeply rooted Christian connections to the holiday, along with the more secular ones we enjoy today.

First for the secular roots. In the pre-Christian world, when the Romans conquered the Celts, they added their own touches to the Celts' Samhain festival, such as making centerpieces out of apples and nuts for Pomona, the Roman goddess of the orchards. The Romans also bobbed for apples and drank cider.

The custom of going door-to-door to collect treats comes from immigrants that come from Ireland. Groups of farmers would go door-to-door collecting food and materials for a village feast and bonfire. Those who gave were promised prosperity; those who did not received threats of bad luck.

Now for the Catholic contribution to Halloween. In 835, Pope Gregory IV moved the celebration for all the martyrs (later all saints) from May 13 to November 1. The night before the Feast of All Saints became known as All Hallow's Even or "holy evening." Eventually the name was shortened to the current Halloween. Following the celebration of the Saints, on November 2, the Church celebrates All Souls Day, a commemoration of the countless faithful who have gone before us not especially designated as Saints.

As you can see, our current traditions for this one holiday span millennia and incorporate many secular and religious symbols, just a few of which are mentioned here. While we may have fun with the spooky side of the holiday, let's remember that as Catholic Christians, Halloween represents the beginning of a time when we remember our beloved dead with special prayers and rituals.


