WELCOME FR. JACK CARMICHAEL **COFFEE SOCIAL**

From Fr. Fran

This month marks the sixtieth anniversary of one of the most important documents to come out of Vatican II, namely the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, "Sacrosanctum Concilium." This document is what has shaped the church's liturgical prayer at Eucharist and at the celebration of all the other sacraments.

The reformers of Vatican II based the renewal on the recovery of ancient practices in the church while streamlining the liturgical rites and even creating new ones, such as the Rite of Baptism for Children. (Before this, children were baptized with an abbreviated rite for adults.) Another important recovery was that of the restored Catechumenate, the process by which an adult joins the Catholic Church.

One of the most striking and immediately felt changes in the liturgy was the translation of Latin texts into the many vernaculars across the world. While the document suggested the translation of the scripture readings and perhaps some other prayers, when the bishops of the world started the process, most recognized that to carry forth the true spirit of the reform, all texts of the liturgies should be translated into the vernacular. In the United States we are now using the third edition of these translations into English.

The reform of the liturgy desired to open up more of the scriptures to the faithful. Prior to our current lectionary, we very rarely heard passages from the Old Testament and less than full accounts of the gospels. Vatican II opened wide the doors to incorporating much more of the scriptures in what we know now as a three-year Sunday cycle. Each year, A, B, or C, highlights a specific gospel. With some major interjections of the gospel of John, we read straight through the particular gospel beginning on the first Sunday in Advent, running through to the Feast of Christ the King, which is the last Sunday of the liturgical year. (We have just begun the year of Mark.)

One of the touchstones of the document on the liturgy is that "the faithful should be led to that fully conscious and active participation in liturgical celebrations which is demanded by the very nature of the liturgy." (article 14)

If you are of a certain age, you will remember that participation in the liturgy was very different pre-Vatican II. While the priest was "saying" the mass on behalf of the people, the people's participation meant reading along in a Latin/English missal or praying the rosary or other appropriate prayers. It was almost as if two actions were going on simultaneously.

The very heart of the liturgical reform offers a very different way of participating. This comes from a recovered baptismal theology which says that we are all baptized into the priesthood of Christ. Therefore, we all offer the sacrifice of the Mass with the priest presider as the one who collects our prayers, our mediator through ordination.

In this way of viewing the liturgy, we see ourselves as having an integral part to play in the celebration. We are not onlookers, or people uniting our private devotions to the "priest's mass," we are active participants in making Christ present in our midst. What an awesome and serious responsibility we have to one another when we gather for mass!

The sacred liturgy tells us that Christ is truly present to us in the word of scripture, in the sacrament we receive, and in the entire people gathered with the priest presider leading the prayer. Oftentimes we forget that we as a people, praying and singing together at mass, are the presence of Christ among us!

In a very practical way, this means that the more engaged we are proclaiming the acclamations, responses and songs, the more attentive we are to the scriptures, and dare I say the homilies, the more we become a community through which Christ lives. So, how can you be more fully conscious and active at mass? Well, that's up to you.

We are all invited to sing much of the liturgy. Do you sit back and let the cantor, choir, and others with "better voices" do that for you?

We recite many prayers and acclamations together, such as the Creed and Our Father. Are you listening to the people around you so as to pray as one voice, or are you going at your own pace as if you were praying in private? Admittedly, the set up of our church makes it harder to hear each other at prayer, however, it is worth the effort to listen to each other and pray as one to God.

We are all invited to listen attentively to the scripture readings. The key word here is *listen*. Reading along with the scriptures may be helpful for those who have hearing issues, but like a good story, the scriptures are proclaimed to be taken in by our ears on the way to our hearts. Are we making the effort to actively listen to God's Word? Do we read the scripture passages for a given Sunday before we come to Mass?

Do we listen to the homilist's attempt to "break open" the word of God or do we read the bulletin, text, or let our minds wander? Even if you aren't all that enthralled with the homily, God might be speaking directly to you in a turn of phrase, a thought, or a challenge that the homilist has chosen to offer.

Most importantly, as we receive the body and blood of Christ, do we realize that this is a call to become the body and blood of Christ in our world? The reception of communion is never a private thing. We approach the altar as a people united in Christ. Our greatest challenge may be to approach the week ahead united in our mission to bring the things of Christ to our world.
