Dear Friends of St. John the Baptist,

In a series of articles that appeared in *America*, a national Catholic magazine published by the Jesuit Fathers, the authors provide a summary of some of the major points of Pope Francis' apostolic exhortation on family life and marriage. The title of the Pope's teaching is "The Joy of Love."

According to the theologians who have reviewed the document, "Pope Francis not only **strongly** affirms the ideal of marriage; he also opens doors to those Catholics who can participate in it now only in an incomplete way because they are civilly married, living together or divorced and re-married." The Pope says the aim is to integrate, not exclude, these people who fall short of the Christian ideal. Pope Francis emphasizes the importance of reaching out to everyone to help each person find his or her proper way of participating in the Church and thus experience being touched by an unmerited, unconditional and gratuitous mercy. Pope Francis insists, "No one can be **condemned** forever, because that is not the logic of the Gospel." The Holy Father adds, "Here I am not speaking only of the divorced and re-married, but of everyone, in whatever situation they find themselves." He adds, "It can no longer be said that all those in any 'irregular' situation are living in a state of mortal sin and are deprived of sanctifying grace."

In a most important section, the Pope urges patience and mercy for those whose marriages have failed. He says, "it is important that the divorced who have entered a new union should be made to feel part of the Church." And he wants to abandon the old formulation, 'living in sin'. Pope Francis also reminds Catholics that "individual conscience needs to be better incorporated into the Church's practice. He reminds us of the traditional belief that we hold true, that a person's individual conscience is the final arbiter in defining the moral life. In other words, the Church has been "called to form consciences, not to replace them." Pastors, therefore, need to help people not simply follow rules, but to practice "discernment", a word that implies prayerful decision-making.

So, what does all this mean in our daily lives? To begin with, there is an awful lot to consume in the previous summary. The Pope is addressing some profound questions around marriage, divorce, and re-marriage, and how people in our faith who have undergone divorce and re-marriage should always be treated with dignity and compassion. Secondly, those who are not married in the Catholic faith should always be encouraged to be a part of the Church, and should be given greater assistance in order that they be included in the sacramental life of the Church. As Pope Francis says, "No one can be condemned forever", and no one should be deprived of sanctifying grace. (To be continued...)
