## To Be One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic: The Mission of Christ's Church

"This is the sole Church of Christ, which in the Creed we profess to be **one**, **holy**, **catholic** and **apostolic**. These four characteristics, inseparably linked with each other, indicate essential features of the Church and her mission. The Church does not possess them of herself; it is Christ who, through the Holy Spirit, makes his Church **one**, **holy**, **catholic**, and **apostolic**, and it is he who calls her to realize each of these qualities" *Catechism of the Catholic Church no. 811*.

**Catholic** means "<u>universal</u>." The Church is universal in two ways. First, the Church is universal because all baptized people are part of the Church and the Church possesses the means of salvation. Second, the mission of the Church is universal because the Church has been sent to proclaim Christ to the entire human race. In that sense the Church has no borders and has been commissioned to go to every place in the world to proclaim Jesus as Lord. As Catholics we do not do this just in words but in deeds. In essence, drawing others to Jesus has been the mission of evangelization. This is not simply a matter of speaking words but of putting the teachings of Jesus into practice. The central command of Jesus is love and the Church, by virtue of that command, is commissioned to bring Christ's love to the world through action.

Much has been going on in our nation this week. Much has been going on in other nations this week. Much has been going on in the Church this week. It will continue next week. The question is what has been attracting our attention, thoughts, directing our conversation and actions. There are many strong opinions and depending on which news outlet you subscribe to absolute opposites in news stories are reported to us. In the midst of all the politicking I received a letter from Sean Callahan the President and CEO of Catholic Relief Services. It reminded me that while much is swirling in the news and across the nation there are people whose lives are in peril and that organizations such as Catholic Relief Services are 'on the ground' to bring assistance, relief and humanitarian aid to those in great need. In his letter Sean wrote: "Over the years, I've met countless Syrian refugees and heard their stories. I've looked into their eyes, held their children, talked to mothers and fathers as they described the lives they had before the war—and after they were forced to flee. I've seen fear of what they left behind changed to hope for tomorrow. And I've seen how people like you have responded to this crisis of violent conflict for nearly 6 years—reaching out to fleeing refugees, and providing food, shelter, living supplies and trauma counseling. The war in Syria has killed more than 400,000 people, and has uprooted more than 11 million—half of them children. What do I tell children like Liane and her mother, Fadia, who fled Syria just over 3 years ago? I tell them that there are people like you. I tell them that people in the United States care about them. That there are women and men who practice living God's love, extending the hands and feet of Christ to the most vulnerable."

Politicians will do what they do. As Christians we must do what Christ has called us to do. First, pray for those in elected office that they will draw from God's wisdom in making good decisions. "The more prosperous nations are obliged, to the extent they are able, to welcome the foreigner in search of the security and the means of livelihood which he cannot find in his country of origin. Public authorities should see to it that the natural right is respected that places a quest under the protection of those who receive him. Political authorities, for the sake of the common good for which they are responsible, may make the exercise of the right to immigrate subject to various juridical conditions, especially with regard to the immigrants' duties toward their country of adoption. Immigrants are obliged to respect with gratitude the material and spiritual heritage of the country that receives them, to obey its laws and to assist in carrying civic burdens." Catechism of the Catholic Church no. 2241. While the political process unfolds there has been a call to allow for better vetting procedures so that citizens here may be safer. This is the responsibility of the government to protect the citizens of a nation. Hopefully once this review is completed, refugees fleeing their home countries for their life may begin anew. America must continue to be a land that welcomes all people yearning to breathe free. Second, we, the Church, are universal and so is the aid we can offer those in great need. Consider a donation to Catholic Relief Services at CRS.org or Catholic Relief Services, 228 W. Lexington St., Baltimore, Maryland 21201-3443 who, as part of the Universal Church, work with local Catholic institutions around the world. As a Catholic agency CRS provides assistance to people in need in 101 countries without regard to race, religion or nationality. Pray for those who live in fear and have been displaced from their homeland. There is always something that we as Christians can and must do.

## HAVE YOU BEEN ASKED TO BE A GODPARENT?



Parishes require certificates of sponsorship for Godparents and Confirmation Sponsors. Upon request, a Certificate of Eligibility will be issued only to those who are Confirmed Catholics, registered in our Parish, regular participants at Mass, and

validly married in the Church (if applicable).

It is difficult to have to refuse anyone but it has had to be done at times. You should be registered with the Parish at least 6 months before we can issue you a certificate to become a Godparent or Sponsor.

It is a privilege to be asked to take on this responsibility and to participate in the sacramental life of the Church.

#### **READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY**



### First Reading: Sirach 15:15-20

This passage from Sirach gives strong, unequivocal emphasis to free will in every person. Before each of us is set, sin or virtue, life or death, and each of us are free to choose the one or the other.

## Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 2:6-10

Paul explains to the Corinthians that there are two different kinds of wisdom — the wisdom of God and the wisdom of the world. The wisdom of God is mysterious, but this wisdom has been revealed "to those who love him" through the Spirit.

## Gospel: Matthew 5:17-37

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus tells the people he has come to fulfill the law. He speaks strongly against murder and anger, against adultery and lust, and against false oaths and lies. He warns the people that unless their virtue exceeds that of the Pharisees, they "will not enter the kingdom of God."



#### THE BRIDGE ACT

The **BRIDGE ACT** was introduced in Congress as a bipartisan effort to sustain the temporary relief from deportation and employment eligibility offered to youth through the Dept. of Homeland Security's Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program. The **BRIDGE ACT** allows young people who came to the United States as children to maintain their eligibility to work and live in the U.S. without fear of deportation and family separation so long as they meet certain requirements, such as showing a commitment to education or honorable service in our military and having no history of serious crime. As Catholics we believe in protecting the dignity of every human being, especially that of our children.

<u>Please act!</u> Ask Senators Booker and Mendez and Representative Lance to support and co-sponsor the **BRIDGE ACT** by sending this message:
