

The second collection next weekend will be for our Diocesan Assessment. Each parish in the Diocese of Paterson has a responsibility to assist in the operation of various Diocesan ministry offices. Our parish's assessment this year is \$100,000. This collection is taken to help us meet this responsibility.

ADVENT BEGINS TODAY

Today we begin the New Year of Grace with the Season of Advent. Advent has a twofold character, for it is a time of preparation for the Solemnities of Christmas, in which the First Coming of the Son of God to humanity is remembered and likewise a time when, by remembrance of this, minds and hearts are led to look forward to Christ's Second Coming at the end of time. For these two reasons, Advent is a period of devout and expectant delight.

Advent begins with the Sunday that falls closest to November 30th and it ends on December 24th, the eve of Christmas. The Sundays of this time of year are named the First, Second, Third and Fourth Sundays of Advent. The weekdays from December 17th up to and including December 24th are ordered in a more direct way to preparing for the Nativity of the Lord. The liturgical color for Advent is purple, just like Lent-as both are seasons that prepare us for great feast days. Also, Advent (like Lent) includes an element of penance in the sense of preparing, quieting and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas. This penitential dimension is expressed through the color purple, but also through the restrained manner of decorating the church and altar: "During Advent the floral decoration of the altar should be marked by a moderation suited to the character of this time of year, without expressing in anticipation the full joy of the Nativity of the Lord...(also) the use of the organ and other musical instruments should be marked by a (similar) moderation..." (General Instruction of the Roman Missal n.305 and n.313).

The third Sunday of Advent is called "Gaudete" Sunday and the liturgical color may be rose instead of purple. This is the Church's way of further heightening our expectation as we draw ever nearer to the Solemnity of Christmas.

Thank you for a beautiful celebration.

My sincere thanks to all who made the parish celebration marking the 25th anniversary of my ordination to the Priesthood so extraordinarily beautiful last Sunday. Many people commented that the Mass was beautiful. Several people made mention that the celebration of Mass was like a glimpse of Heaven. The choir was amazing and the response of the congregation was wonderful. One could sense the fact that those who were gathered in prayer know the beauty of our faith and immersed themselves fully in the responses both spoken and sung of the Mass. It was so alive and inspiring to have a church filled to capacity with Catholics so in love with the Lord and it was palpable in the celebration. The choir, under the direction of Elena Bird Zolnick our wonderful Director of Sacred Music, joined by talented professionals of Elena's acquaintance, and the members of our parish choir sang music that truly pierced our souls. We were reminded of the beauty in the treasure of sacred music. It was delightful to see the line of Altar servers in the procession. Any server who wanted to vest and participate was invited to so do so. I think we had 16 or more and then 4 others who served the Mass—beautiful. It is such a gift to see our younger members so involved in the celebration of Mass by their service at the Altar. Deepening their understanding of the Mass and inviting them to love Jesus truly present at every Mass is a gift of faith that will form them for the journey of discipleship. God bless their parents for encouraging them to know, love and serve Jesus in this way.

As many of you saw, the huge tent in the back of the church was the venue after Mass for the reception. I initially requested that we have a simple gathering after Mass, in the hall, with coffee and bagels. The 'committee' who did all the planning smiled and then went ahead with their plans, ideas and hard work. They insisted, when I resisted, that they wanted to honor my priesthood and to give our parishioners an opportunity to come together to celebrate the faith and hope of this parish in the midst of great trials, scandal and hardship for the Church at this time. I am happy that they persisted and gently pushed me out of their way to make it happen as they envisioned. Again, the comments from those gathered on Sunday and since were so positive, especially as people related that it was so good to be with other people who they may see at Mass and in other places around the community but do not necessarily have the opportunity to chat with. I was thrilled to listen to a young couple who had given birth recently recount how a parishioner would see them at Mass, had been praying for the couple and their baby but who until Sunday did not have the opportunity to tell them, meet them and chat, and to see the baby. I am sure there are many other stories of that day which have similar themes. My sincere thanks to all those who helped in any way; from planning all that was needed—food, tables, chairs, decorations, setting up the tent, the extra chairs in the church, directing traffic before Mass, the flowers and banner by the Art & Environment Committee, the children who sang and read at the reception, the hundreds of prayers offered and beautifully decorated by our parish children, and the music at the reception by Theresa Guido, and Dan and Shannon Minogue. While many hands made light the work, and I am most grateful for all who helped make the reception so enjoyable for the 600 plus who attended, the following deserve our gratitude for their hard work and contributions —Theresa and Bob Gallic, Lynne and Michael Vreeland, Tim and Randa Wallisch, Lynnette Annunziata, Amy and Mike O' Mullan, Jim and Michele Gallic, Nancy and Bob Lucente, Mike and Monica Wizeman, Lyndsay and John Schlegel, the members of the Rosary Altar Society and the Sister Servants of Jesus from the Shrine who baked desserts, the Knights of Columbus, the members of the youth group with Sr. Niky, Scott Hildebrand for the anniversary cake and cookies, and all who helped with set up, take down, and the clean up afterwards...thank you, thank you and thank you.

Last Sunday, as we do everyday, but Sunday was so beautiful, we center around Jesus following the ancient tradition of the Church which He commanded for us. At Mass we offer ourselves with Jesus to the Father and we are formed by the Sacred Word, fed and nourished by the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus truly present in Holy Communion. This is our lifeline and the great treasure of our faith. As a parish community we assist in the formation of those who seek Christ and who want to unite their lives with Him. What an awesome privilege and challenge this is. I am blessed as pastor to have a staff who support this mission, faithful parishioners who participate so wholeheartedly and who give of their love and service to make this community such a wonderful place to be, grow in faith and worship. I am most grateful to God for 25 years of priestly ministry. It is a ministry that comes with various challenges each day. Those who love Jesus are a great source of encouragement for me in the joys and trials. At the conclusion of my homily on Sunday I referenced a prayer of St. John Vianney, patron Saint of priests who wrote, ""I love You Lord, and my only desire is to love You until the last breath of my life. I love You, O my infinitely loveable God, and I would rather die loving You, than live without loving You. I love You Lord, and the only grace I ask is to love You eternally. READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY

First Reading: Baruch 5:1-9

Baruch tells Jerusalem to rejoice because of God's plan to bring his exiled people back to Jerusalem. He emphasizes God's power and describes his plan to lower mountains and fill gorges to make their journey easier.

Second Reading: Philippians 1:4-6, 8-11

Paul encourages the Philippians to love each other completely. He hopes that their love and understanding will continue to grow so that they are prepared for the return of Christ.

Gospel: Luke: 3:1-6

Luke describes the work John the Baptist carried out to help people prepare for the birth of Jesus. Luke also discusses who was in power at the time, which helped historians to figure out the exact dates of certain events, including Jesus' birth.

THE JESSE TREE

This Advent the Art and Environment Committee debuts a new Jesse Tree banner. The meaning of the Jesse Tree as an Advent tradition stems from a passage in Isaiah: "But a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse and from his roots a bud shall blossom." The Jesse Tree reminds us (through the use of symbols) of the roles played in Salvation History, from Adam and Eve in Genesis to the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. This week the symbols are:

Adam and Eve: The <u>apple</u> represents the temptation and our separation from God.

Noah: Although God destroys the world for its sinfulness, in his mercy He saves us through Noah and his <u>ark.</u> The <u>rainbow</u> marks God's covenant with Noah.

Abraham: God had a close relationship with Abraham and promised him his descendants would be as numerous as **the stars in the sky**.

Isaac: At God's command, Abraham was to sacrifice his son Isaac. At the very last moment an angel of God deterred Abraham from proceeding, directing Abraham instead to sacrifice a <u>ram</u> which was stuck in the thickets.
