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

IT IS TIME TO RETREAT

A universal retreat for Christians is about to begin again this week with Ash Wednesday. I wonder how many will actually participate in this retreat experience? Some come for the magic of the ashes, sort of a superstition approach to the rituals of faith—got to get me some of those ashes—as if the ashes have some hidden power to cause or facilitate our conversion. If that were true, I would just walk into a gym and leave immediately with the hope that I would be fit and trim by Easter Sunday. If only it were that easy.

The Season of Lent calls for our participation. It can be as simple as adding something in our walk with the Lord. For example, it may be more fruitful to approach Lent with the perspective that we add one thing, work on one area for deeper conversion, and give up one thing that we know is impeding true growth in our life with God and probably those around us. First, it is essential that we give this some reflection. What is something that can add to my Lenten journey? Go to Mass, Confession, Stations of the Cross, the parish mission, the talks on the relics and the Shroud of Turin, participate in Bible Study on Thursday? Truth is you do not even have to go far to add something that will benefit your Lenten journey. Adding one thing could very well be the enriching experience needed. What can I give up? That can be a very long list indeed. Perhaps looking for fault in others, gossiping about others, limiting technology – television, phone, internet and such distractions, unhealthy habits, foods and vices. What can I work on to bring me closer to Christ? Sin is of course an obstacle to the life of grace which God seeks to bestow on us. It is a disordering of our desires where God is not the object of our desire but person/things become that object. In her teaching the Church lists seven sins that are deadly. While the brief definitions offered here are by no means exhaustive, you can gain deeper insight through the Catechism. Pride: an excessive belief in one's own abilities, Lust: a powerful craving such as for sex, power and money, Gluttony: the desire to eat or consume more than you require, Greed: the desire for material wealth or gain, Sloth: laziness and the avoidance of work, Anger: the loss of rational self-control and the desire to harm others, and Envy: wanting what others have, be it status, abilities, or possessions. Taking time to reflect on where these disordered desires manifest themselves in our life of faith can be most meaningful. Then, of greatest importance, in prayer we must ask Jesus to give us the strength and grace to overcome these disordered desires with His help. Conversion and growth by our own efforts is so limited but when we seek conversion through Jesus that is much deeper and more radical.

All of this is to bring us to greater freedom and a more meaningful relationship with God. Each is invited on this universal retreat. When we become aware of the transience of this world and we question ourselves on the meaning of our existence, when we enter into dialogue with the Lord, it is then that we make the leap and become real people. The search for food and shelter, the drive to give continuity to our species, the search for what gives pleasure, are "appetites" we have in common with animals. Only when we experience the intimate need for another food, the specific of being human manifests itself in us. Lent is a privileged time to return to ourselves, to nourish and to let the divine grow within us. It is the time to listen to God's Word, not a superficial, distracted listening, almost fearful that the message penetrates too deeply into the mind and heart, causing disturbances and requires radical changes of direction in our lives.

"Lent is like a long 'retreat' during which we can turn back into ourselves and listen to the voice of God, in order to defeat the temptations of the Evil One. It is a period of spiritual 'combat' which we must experience alongside Jesus, not with pride and presumption, but using the arms of faith: prayer, listening to the Word of God, and penance. In this way we will be able to celebrate Easter in truth, ready to renew the promises of our baptism." Pope Benedict XVI— during the Angelus at St. Peter's, February 21, 2010.

Receive the Lord's invitation once more to repent and believe in the Gospel, to truly believe. The ashes imposed on Wednesday are not magic, they will not be the cause of our conversion, but receiving them may be the moment when we begin to understand our need for change. When we cooperate with the grace of Jesus our conversion is not only desired it is attainable. Let us pray for one another this Lent that it may be a time of true growth and conversion for the Body of Christ, the Church. Please pray for me and for the renewal of the priesthood. With the help of the Blessed Virgin Mary may we live this period of retreat joyfully and fruitfully. May she intercede for each one who approaches her Son in faith, hope and trust.

Father Carlos Martins of the Companions of the Cross will be here with a very special collection of **over 150 relics**, some almost 2,000 years old. Those who attend will be able to examine and venerate each relic.


In the Church's history many miracles and healings have been worked in the presence of relics and many have been healed through this ministry. You are encouraged to bring your articles of devotion (such as rosaries, holy cards, etc.) and pictures of ill friends/family members which you will be able to touch to the reliquaries as a means of intercession.

Among the treasures will be relics of St. Maria Goretti, St. Therese of Lisieux, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Anthony of Padua, St. Thomas Aquinas and St. Faustina Kowalska. In addition, there will also be a portion of the veil of Our Lady as well as one of the largest remaining pieces of the True Cross in the world.

Parish Lenten Mission March 23 – 27 Come join us for an exciting Parish Mission, presented by the Marian Fathers of the Immaculate Conception. Our speaker will be Fr. David Gunter, MIC. Fr. David W. Gunter, MIC is a member of the Marians of the Immaculate Conception located at the National Shrine of The Divine Mercy in Stockbridge, Massachusetts. He was ordained in 2009 for the Archdiocese of Boston. Prior to entering the priesthood, he studied at Northeastern University receiving a BA in Economics and Geology in 1981. He went on to obtain an MBA from Babson College in 1984. He entered the Marian Fathers in July 2014, and completed his novitiate in August 2015, when he professed first vows. Over the last few years, Fr. David has been researching Marian apparitions, Marian teachings by saints and popes, and has compiled

Gunter will preach at weekend Masses on the 23rd and 24th, offering mission talks after the morning and evening Masses, Monday through Wednesday. 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LENTEN REGULATIONS

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding from age 14 onwards.

Christian tradition can name at least seven reasons for fasting:

- 1. From the beginning, God commanded some fasting, and sin entered into the world because Adam and Eve broke the fast.
- 2. For the Christian, fasting is ultimately about fasting from sin.
- 3. Fasting reveals our dependence on God and not the resources of this world.
- 4. Fasting is an ancient way of preparing for the Eucharist—the truest of foods.
- 5. Fasting is preparation for all the sacraments —for the reception of grace.
- 6. Fasting is a means of saving resources to give to the poor.
- 7. Fasting is a means of self-discipline, chastity, and the restraining of the appetites.
