

While there are many ways to donate to the Annual Appeal, there is one option unique to people who are 70 1/2 or over and have an IRA. If you are in this category, the IRS requires you to take a required minimum distribution from your IRA each year. As a result, this distribution is added to your taxable income and increases the amount of taxes owed to the government.

However, instead of taking your required minimum distribution, you can instruct your IRA investment manager to donate this distribution to a charity such as the Bishop's Annual Appeal and this automatically omits this amount from your adjusted gross income. This tax benefit can be realized by all qualifying individuals, whether you take the standard deduction or itemize your deductions. PARISH LIFE.....

Enclosed with the bulletin you will find the Financial Report for the Fiscal Year which ended on June 30, 2019. I ask that you take time to look over this condensed report and if you have any questions to make them known to me or to a member of the Finance Committee. Apart from fees charged for the materials for Religious Education and other Faith Formation programs we do not charge for the services provided here. We depend on the generosity of those who contribute primarily through the Sunday collections. Each year there are parishioners who go above and beyond those collections and make donations to the parish to help meet our operating costs. In the eight-plus years that I have been pastor here we have been pretty stable in the number of registered parishioners, the donations received and even though there have been difficult decisions, the closing of the school for example leading to the departure of several families, there has been little fluctuation in the increase of offerings. Meanwhile, costs continue to rise. You know that as well as I do. Our buildings age and are in constant need of maintenance. It is said that people tend to give more when they see how their money is at work. That is not always an easy thing to demonstrate in a parish setting. The donations given here provide staff, heating, air conditioning, lighting, all the amenities and goods necessary to provide a place for us. Maintenance costs are staggering and our facilities large. If we did not have your financial support we would need to reduce staff, programs and services offered. The day to day, week to week costs of operating are real and our challenge is to meet them while not surrendering the good that is offered in and through this parish. Each of us benefits from this parish and each of us has a contribution to make. The formula that 20% make contributions that enable the 100% to enjoy the benefits of the place is so true when we see the level of contributions each week in the offerings.

Our financial situation is of great concern. Note the deficit between budgeted need and collections in the bulletin each week. I have shared information from time to time relating to the upkeep and necessary projects we undertake. A friend in advertising tells me that a message needs to be repeated 1,000 times before the majority of people hear and understand it. I guess that is why we see the same advertisements over and over again. Take for example the roof of the school leaking all over; so in order to lease the building the project of replacing had to be undertaken. Whether we were leasing or not this was an essential project as we use the building for parish programs also. The cost is \$333,000. Not a penny of that came from the Sunday collections. Rather it is being paid from the bequest of \$201,310 from the estate of Bill Hosford, a generous parishioner who named this parish in his will. The additional monies come from the leasing of the building to Hudson Way Immersion School. If we had to carry this by ourselves it would have meant borrowing—we already have a mortgage on the church extension. The lighting system in the Church was redesigned and replaced all through the generosity of a family who are not even members here who asked to remain anonymous. If we cannot meet our week to week costs of operating, how will we face the necessary projects that come with wear and tear? We cannot simply presume that the leasing of the school will cover that—a tenant can decide to move out once a contract is due to expire. This parish depends on the commitment of her parishioners. This is why, as your pastor, I turn to each of you.

It is imperative that each of us ask if we are truly doing our part to ensure that the mission of this parish not only remains strong but has a stable future. Individuals may become indignant when money is spoken of but it has to be addressed. As I preached last week at Mass in light of the Gospel parable—all that is good, seen and unseen, belongs to God. We are stewards and have been entrusted with many blessings to bring growth to the Kingdom of God. The steward asks: how can I free up more time for the most important things of life — God, the Church, and family? How can I develop my talents so as to bring God glory? When it comes to money, good stewards ask: how can I make better use of the money I already have to further the work of God? It is essential that we each ask these questions and where necessary make changes that will be of benefit to this community of faith. God bless all those who sacrifice for the good of this parish.

On a separate note, I am thrilled by the response to That Man is You!, our program for Catholic men which began last Saturday here. Over 70 men signed up and I know that great good will come from this. For any man considering joining there is still time. If you want more information visit our parish website or contact Matt Zolnick, coordinator of the core team, at 973.307.7789 or me. The sessions meet on Saturday from 7-8:30AM. There are few other places where men can come together to grow in faith, share their faith and encourage each other in faith. My thanks to Matt, Greg Allen, Shawn Gallic, Dr. Don DeFabio and Tom Welsh for their efforts as core team members.

Next weekend Fr. Theo from our sister parish in Haiti will be visiting with us. I look forward to seeing him again and learning about all that is happening in our sister parish. These last months have been perilous and difficult for the people of Haiti. Let us pray for stability and peace for them. Our partnership with them is a blessing and surely brings glory to God as we respond to the plight of those in need who are so strong in faith. May God bless our efforts, your families and each one of you for all you do to serve the Lord. Peace.

READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY First Reading: Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4

The prophet Habakkuk cries out despairingly to God because of the state Jerusalem has fallen into. He asks why God does nothing to stop the violence and misery. God assures him that a time will come when only the just and faithful will live.

Second Reading: 2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14

Paul writes to Timothy from prison and urges him to continue to spread the gospel without fear or shame. He also tells Timothy to draw upon the strength of the Holy Spirit to help him face the hardships he will encounter while preaching.

Gospel: Luke 17:5-10

The disciples ask Jesus to increase their faith. Jesus replies that "faith the size of a mustard seed could transplant a sycamore," indicating that a person either has faith, strong and complete, or none at all. Jesus also explains that a servant will not receive gratitude for simply following his master's orders. In the same way, we are all God's servants doing no more than our duty when we obey God's commands.
