Reflecting on Living the Gospel

To test Jesus the Pharisees questioned him about "which commandment in the law is the greatest." Each Pharisee, no doubt, had some commandment governing religious practice he judged to be the most important. Jesus' answer to the Pharisees takes his hearers beyond any individual commandment or practice to the foundation of them all: loving God with one's whole being and loving neighbor as oneself. Keeping religious laws—no matter how meticulously—means nothing if the motivation for our actions is not love for God and others. Law and love cannot be separated if either is to bring deepened relationships and unity, harmony and justice, which are ultimately the goal of both law and love. The law of love is a law of hearts turned toward Other and others.

In a crime-laden society such as ours we tend not to trust the stranger—the one we meet on the street or the one who might come to our door. On the one hand, we must be careful and protect ourselves and our loved ones. On the other hand, we must be genuinely sensitive to others' needs. If someone comes to our door and needs to use the phone, we can offer to make the call for them; if we see something happening that is wrong, we can take responsibility and call the police or other agency; we can do something so simple as hold a store door open for someone who is package-laden. In these and countless other ways each day we not only *do* our love for our neighbor, but in those acts we also show our love for God. This is our most important priority: to love God in the neighbor we meet every day.

May we show loving concern for those who come to us for guidance and help, love and support.

May we grow in our love for each other and in our outreach to those in need.
