## Reflecting on Living the Gospel

"The end of the world is at hand!" says the placard carried by the devout believer on the side of the street. Each age has had its share of those who maintained that the world was doomed, ready to be destroyed by God who was waiting for only a few moments before bringing down his fiery wrath on the heathens. In Jesus' own day, and in the decades that followed, apocalyptic fever was high. Messianic expectation combined with a desire for God's judgment of the wicked were commonplace. And yet, the world continued, and Rome dominated for hundreds of years hence. In our own day there are many prophecies and predictions about the end of the world. Zany predictions about pending doom can certainly attract attention and might even bring in the parishioners and churchgoers, but is it accurate?

In today's gospel perhaps the most significant line is at the end, when Jesus says, "But of that day or hour, no one knows, / neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father." Despite that rather stark, plain sentence, we have all undoubtedly heard some say, "Jesus says nobody knows the day or hour, but he doesn't say anything about the month or the year!" And then the wild predictions start again. Such interpretations miss the mark wildly. Rather than worry about when the world will end, it might be more productive to wonder about my own personal end. That is, when will I die? How have I lived my days knowing that nothing I accumulate on earth will be taken with me when I pass from this life? We are definitely going to experience our own personal end, our own death. We are less likely to be here for the end of the world.

# Closing Prayer

O God, you are the beginning and end of all things and seasons. Hear these prayers we offer in the hope of your mercy, as we live in joyful expectation of your eternal reign of peace. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.

#### For Reflection:

· What "signs" around me remind me of the brevity of life and the preciousness of time?

- Pray aloud the opening prayer (in The Roman Missal called the "collect");
- One person read aloud. the gospel;
- 3. Each read prayerfully "Reflecting on Living the Gospel" and spend some time in personal prayer;
