- □ Psalms have long been the foundation of liturgical music. In the many centuries since their composition, they have been sung by Jewish, Catholic, and other Christian communities gathered in prayer. All three of our hymns today are paraphrases of Psalms. ## A WORD FROM YOUR PASTOR

Those inconspicuous little beetles take to the air over suburban lawns and rural meadows and the darkness comes alive and glowing with a special kind of fantasy.

We go out in the darkness and there they are; like a host of twinkling stars come down to spangle the night and create that incredible ballet of soft light. 




Disciple Maker Index Results

Thank you to the more than 21,000 Catholics from all parts of the Diocese of Columbus who completed the Disciple Maker Index (DMI) Survey during Lent. The results are in, and the Diocese wanted to share some of the highlights.

The DMI is a 75-question survey designed to provide an opportunity for parishioners to reflect on their individual spiritual growth and overall parish effectiveness. Almost 300,000 Catholics at more than 1,500 parishes throughout 40 dioceses have taken the DMI since 2013, providing not just valuable data for each parish, but for the Church nationally, as well. Now the Diocese of Columbus can be counted among these national benchmark dioceses.





# Reviewing the Results

## Phase I (May - June)

The DMI parish-specific results were sent to each parish to be reviewed by the pastor and his RPRF parish representatives, all of whom attended an information webinar in May to learn how to read and interpret the DMI data for their parish. They met to review the outcomes together and to draw meaningful conclusions from the data. The information generated from the DMI survey is quite extensive and required time, patience, and focus to understand it in its proper context. Thank you to pastors and RPRF representatives for your generosity in serving your parish in this way. Diocesanwide results that reflect the collective responses from the more than 21,000 respondents are included here.


## Phase II (late June - July)

Survey Participants



Over a five-year period, the Diocese of Columbus has averaged 72,000 Catholics attending Mass on a weekend. Almost 30% of the individuals completed the Disciple Maker Index this Lent. This is above the national average for other dioceses who have taken the DMI nationwide.

Among the belief questions, survey respondents indicated the strongest belief in the following areas:




With respect to faith practices, survey respondents indicated they most frequently engaged in the following activities:



## The Sunday Experience



## How I personally view the Sunday Mass




## **Opportunities**

With respect to the areas in which survey respondents felt they needed the most support from their parishes, the most significant were:




With respect to the faith practices that survey respondents indicated they were doing the least, the most significant were:

# Opportunities for Growth

As disciples, we have both the responsibility to come and to go. Not unlike the rest of the country, some of the biggest areas of growth for the Diocese of Columbus are based in our confidence in sharing the good news and inviting others whom we love into a deeper relationship with the Lord.

Especially as the *Real Presence*, *Real Future* initiative examines how best to serve our diverse diocese with fewer priests, our need to invite young men to consider the priesthood grows every year. Recently, many more women and men religious have accepted the invitation to serve our diocese. Through their presence, it is hoped that many more young women and men will be invited to consider religious life. As important as our priests, deacons, and religious are, the work of evangelization is not on their shoulders alone.

Similar to the rest of the country, the faithful in Columbus are looking to grow in confidence in sharing the richness of what the Church has to offer as well as our own personal stories of faith. The strategies and resources being researched and implemented as part of *Real Presence, Real Future* will seek to support parishes to equip their people for this important work.

## 5 Questions You Might Have

# 1. How will this, or can this, information be used by the parish or the diocese?

With any journey, you have to know your destination as well as where you are starting from in order to get there. While our journey as disciples and a Church is lifelong, the Real Presence, Real Future initiative wants to assist the entire Diocese of Columbus to take the next giant step toward our Lord. The Disciple Maker Index provides one snapshot of a large portion of our worshipping population. You are essential to the work of evangelization, in order to reach those who have not been practicing their faith. At a diocesan level, this information will help guide some of the research and resourcing that Bishop Brennan hopes to offer parishes and parish leaders in the future. At the parish level, it is the hope that by growing in understanding of where we are starting from, each community can help provide input and direction as to where we need to go. It is also a hope that several years from now, we can retake this index for another snapshot and see the progress we make together.

#### 2. Who didn't we hear from?

The Disciple Maker Index intentionally focuses on those "in the pews." It gives a parish a sense of where their worshipping parishioners are in order to be able to discern strategies to build up this core group of Catholics and send them out on mission.

Of the 17,909 individuals who indicated their age, almost 10% indicated that they were age 35 or younger. While this is two points higher than Catholic Leadership Institute's national database of over 300,000, reaching out to our young adults will be an essential area of growth for all parishes in the next decade.

Of the 17,856 individuals who indicated their ethnicity, 11% were non-Caucasian with half of those individuals (5%) indicating a Latino/Hispanic. According to projected Census information, about 3% of the total population in the counties that comprise the Diocese of Columbus are Latino. However,

we know this is a growing segment of the Catholic population in Central Ohio.

## 3. What effect does COVID-19 have on these perceptions?

Catholic Leadership Institute has been administering the Disciple Maker Index since 2014. Interestingly, parishioner perceptions in the aggregate were not dramatically different pre-pandemic and during the pandemic. Further qualitative research shows that parishioners have been extremely grateful for the efforts their parishes have made during these difficult times in many cases boosting positive feedback if anything. Of course, time and the fruit of our current and future outreach efforts will tell us what the long-term effects might be from the pandemic.

# 4. What if my parish's results are better or worse than these diocesan averages?

This feedback is one lens through which we can grow in understanding of where we are as a Catholic community. There are many lenses through which to look. As was previously mentioned, the Disciple Maker Index gave us a snapshot of our starting place in 2021. While the diocesan results are a helpful benchmark, the most important thing is where we go next in service to God's people.

#### 5. Where do we go from here?

The conversation continues. Key parish leaders from every parish have been reviewing this information and have been asked to share parish-specific thoughts over the summer. This Fall, there will be extensive consultation with all parishioners around strategies and models for the future based on this feedback as well as sacramental, financial, and socio-economic trends throughout the diocese. ## Monday, June 28 ~ Thirteenth Week of Ordinary Time Saint Irenaeus, Bishop and Martyr

**Holy Gospel: Matthew 8:18-22** When Jesus saw a crowd around him, he gave orders to cross to the other shore. A scribe approached and said to him, "Teacher, I will follow you wherever you go." Jesus answered him, "Foxes have dens and birds of the sky have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to rest his head." Another of his disciples said to him, "Lord, let me go first and bury my father." But Jesus answered him, "Follow me, and let the dead bury their dead."

**Meditation**: When the Lord Jesus calls us to follow him, he invites us into a personal relationship of love and friendship. That relationship also involves the commitment of our entire lives to Jesus as Lord and Master, Teacher and Healer, Messiah and Savior. To follow Jesus is the greatest of all calls. What an awesome privilege and an awesome responsibility to be a disciple of Jesus Christ! What does it cost to be a disciple? For the first disciples, they paid the ultimate price for being a follower of Jesus by not renouncing Christ as Lord, Savior, Messiah; by not renouncing Christ's teachings; by being steadfast disciples of Christ. A disciple must be willing to make sacrifices, even the sacrifice of his own life to follow Jesus as his Master and Lord. Notice how another would-be disciple responded by saying that he must first bury his father, that is go back home and take care of his father until he died. Jesus appealed to the man's heart and told him to detach himself from whatever might keep him from following as his disciple.

**Prayer:** O God, who called the Bishop Saint Irenaeus to confirm true doctrine and the peace of the Church, grant, we pray, through his intercession, that, being renewed in faith and charity, we may always be intent on fostering unity and concord. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

**Contemplation:** What can keep us from giving our all to God? Fear, anxiety, self-concern, pre-occupation and attachment to other things, to name a few. Even spiritual things can get in the way of having God alone as our Treasure if we put them first. Detachment is a necessary step is we want to make the Lord our Treasure and Joy. It frees us to give ourselves without reserve to the Lord and to his service. There is nothing greater we can do with our lives than to place them at the service of the Lord and Master of the universe. We cannot out give God in generosity. Jesus promises that those who are willing to part with what is most dear to them for his sake "will receive a hundred times as much and will inherit eternal life" (Matthew 19:29). Is there anything holding you back from giving your all to the Lord?

## Tuesday, June 29 ~ Thirteenth Week in Ordinary Time Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, Apostles

**Holy Gospel: Matthew 13:16-19** When Jesus went into the region of Caesarea Philippi he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" They replied, "Some say John the Baptist, others Elijah, still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?"

Simon Peter said in reply, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Jesus said to him in reply, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah. For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my heavenly Father. And so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys to the Kingdom of heaven. Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."

**Meditation:** Today the Apostles Peter and Paul are commemorated. Both were martyred in Rome in the first century. They tirelessly worked for the spread of the gospel, not only to the people of Israel, but to all the nations as well. They risked their lives in the process and gladly poured out their blood in loyalty to their Master, the Lord Jesus Christ. As Paul so eloquently stated in his second epistle to Timothy: "they courageously fought the good fight, finished the race, and kept the faith" (2 Timothy 4:7). So it is worth asking: How firm is your faith in the Lord Jesus Christ? At an opportune time Jesus tested his disciples with a crucial question: Who do men say that I am and who do you say that I am? (Matthew 16:13). Jesus was widely recognized in Israel as a mighty man of God, even being compared with the greatest of the prophets, John the Baptist, Elijah, and Jeremiah. Peter, always quick to respond, exclaimed that Jesus was the Christ, the Son of the living God. No mortal being could have revealed this to Peter; but only God. Jesus then conferred on Peter authority to govern the church that Jesus would build, a church that no powers could overcome. Jesus played on Peter's name which is the same word for "rock" in both Aramaic and Greek. To call someone a "rock" is one of the greatest of compliments.

**Prayer**: Grant, we pray, O Lord our God, that we may be sustained by the intercession of the blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, that, as through them you gave your Church the foundations of her heavenly office, so through them you may help her to eternal salvation. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

**Contemplation:** When Jesus asks: "Who do people say the Son of Man is?" he poses that question to each of us. Our response is twofold – one by word, and the other by action. We can proclaim Christ as our Lord and Savior, and share in his saving mission through word by sharing the message found in sacred scripture. But most important is to put the teachings of sacred scripture into action in our daily lives. If you are firm in your faith, this is something that occurs naturally. If you find yourself hesitating out of "fear" or "embarrassment" then there is work to be done in making sure that when you proclaim to be a Catholic, a Christian, a disciple of Christ, that you mean what you say and say what you mean. Don't insult Jesus with mere lip service – prove to him and to the world that you are a true disciple by living the Word day in and day out. Be a doer of the Word.

## Wednesday, June 30 ~ Thirteenth Week in Ordinary Time First Martyrs of the Church of Rome

**Holy Gospel: Matthew 8:28-34** When Jesus came to the territory of the Gadarenes, two demoniacs who were coming from the tombs met him. They were so savage that no one could travel by that road. They cried out, "What have you to do with us, Son of God? Have you come here to torment us before the appointed time?" Some distance away a herd of many swine was feeding. The demons pleaded with him, "If you drive us out, send us into the herd of swine." And he said to them, "Go then!" They came out and entered the swine, and the whole herd rushed down the steep bank into the sea where they drowned. The swineherds ran away, and when they came to the town they reported everything, including what had happened to the demoniacs. Thereupon the whole town came out to meet Jesus, and when they saw him they begged him to leave their district.

**Meditation:** There are many times throughout our lives when we feel compelled by forces that seem to be beyond our strength to repel. In today's Gospel, two men driven mad by the force of many evil spirits found refuge in the one person who could set them free. The Gospel describes this force as savage, which connotes wild and unmentionable atrocities. Our age has certainly witnessed untold crimes and mass destruction at the hands of possessed rulers and their armies. What is more remarkable—the destructive force of these driven and possessed men, or the bended knee at Jesus' feet imploring mercy and release? God's word reminds us that no destructive force can keep anyone from the peace and safety which God offers to those who seek his help. In times of trouble, let us remember the words of the Psalmist: A thousand may fall at your side, ten thousand at your right hand; but it will not come near you. ..Because you have made the Lord your refuge, the Most High your habitation (Psalm 91:7,9).

**Prayer:** O God, who consecrated that abundant first fruits of the Roman Church by the blood of the Martyrs, grant, we pray, that with firm courage we may together draw strength from so great a struggle and ever rejoice at the triumph of faithful love. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

**Contemplation:** Jesus took pity on these men who were overtaken by a legion of evil spirits. The destructive force of these demons is evident for all who can see as they flee and destroy a herd of swine. After Jesus freed the demoniacs the whole city came out to meet him. No one had demonstrated such power and authority against the forces of Satan as Jesus did. They feared Jesus as a result and begged him to leave them. Why would they not want Jesus to stay? Perhaps the price for such liberation from the power of evil and sin was more than they wanted to pay. Jesus is ready and willing to free us from anything that binds us and that keeps us from the love of God. Are you willing to part with anything that might keep you from his love and saving grace?

About the First Martyrs of the Church of Rome: There were Christians in Rome within a dozen or so years after the death of Jesus, though they were not the converts of the "Apostle of the Gentiles" (see Romans 15:20). Paul had not yet visited them at the time he wrote his great letter in A.D. 57-58. There was a large Jewish population in Rome. Probably as a result of controversy between Jews and Jewish Christians, the Emperor Claudius expelled all Jews from Rome in A.D. 49-50. Suetonius the historian says that the expulsion was due to disturbances in the city "caused by the certain Chrestus" [Christ]. Perhaps many came back after Claudius's death in A.D. 54. Paul's letter was addressed to a church with members from Jewish and gentile backgrounds. In July of A.D. 64, more than half of Rome was destroyed by fire. Rumor blamed the tragedy on Nero, who wanted to enlarge his palace. He shifted the blame by accusing the Christians. According to the historian Tacitus, a "great multitude" of Christians were put to death because of their "hatred of the human race." Peter and Paul were probably among the victims. Threatened by an army revolt and condemned to death by the senate, Nero committed suicide in A.D. 68 at the age of thirty-one. Wherever the Good News of Jesus was preached, it met the same opposition as Jesus did, and many of those who began to follow him shared his suffering and death. But no human force could stop the power of the Spirit unleashed upon the world. The blood of martyrs has always been, and will always be, the seed of Christians.

## Thursday, July 1 ~ Thirteenth Week in Ordinary Time Saint Junipero Serra, Priest

**Holy Gospel: Matthew 9:1-8** After entering a boat, Jesus made the crossing, and came into his own town. And there people brought to him a paralytic lying on a stretcher. When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "Courage, child, your sins are forgiven." At that, some of the scribes said to themselves, "This man is blaspheming." Jesus knew what they were thinking, and said: "Why do you harbor evil thoughts? Which is easier, to say, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Rise and walk'? But that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins" – he then said to the paralytic, "Rise, pick up your stretcher, and go home." He rose and went home. When the crowds saw this they were struck with awe and glorified God who had given such authority to men.

**Meditation:** *Question:* What cripples the mind and heart and stifles the healing power of love? *Answer:* Sin and an unforgiving mind and heart! You should not be amazed at the fact that sin cripples us more than any physical ailment can. Sin is the work of the kingdom of darkness and it holds us in eternal bondage. There is only one solution to sin – the healing, cleansing power of Jesus' forgiveness. Jesus' treatment of sinners upset the religious teachers of the day.

**Prayer:** O God, who by your ineffable mercy have been pleased through the labors of your priest Saint Junipero Serra to count many American peoples within your Church, grant by his intercession that we may so join our hearts to you in love, as to carry always and everywhere before all people the image of your Only Begotten Son. Who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

**Contemplation:** The crippled man in today's Gospel had been crippled not only physically, but spiritually as well. Jesus freed him from his burden of guilt and restored his body. It would be time well spent for each of us to look deeply and honestly at how we, too, may be crippled by our own sinfulness, and where we turn to for healing. It is all too easy to fall into the habit of letting society redefine what sin is and is not. Truth is truth, and sin is sin, as defined by God the Father (not civil or secular laws [e.g. abortion, same-sex marriage, etc.]); the timeless teachings of Jesus Christ (not a talk show host, newspaper or editorial columnist, or politician) and the one, true church – the Catholic Church – founded by Jesus Christ. Yes, we are sinners. And yes, all are welcome in the Catholic Church. But all are called to convert from sin, to humbly and lovingly submit ourselves to God, and to live our lives according to the will of God – not have God submit to us or to impose our will upon God. In this topsy-turvy world, there are many who place themselves and their wants, desires, lifestyle, et cetera, above God and, in doing so, recreate and relive the sin of Adam and Eve. When we search for the truth, when we search for answers, for

guidance and direction, for healing and reconciliation, it is the Lord in his infinite love and mercy who is every ready to bring us healing of mind, body, and soul. His grace brings us freedom from the power of sin and from bondage to harmful desires and addictions. A first step – primary action – is receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation with a priest, who has the power to absolve you of your sins and to get you back on the road to follow Jesus Christ. What is holding you back?

O God, Who wills not the death of a sinner but rather that he be converted and live grant we beseech you through the intercession of the Blessed Mary, ever Virgin, Saint Joseph, her spouse, Saint Junipero Serra and all the saints an increase of laborers for Your Church, fellow laborers with Christ to spend and consume themselves for souls through the same Jesus Christ Your Son Who lives and reigns with You in the unity of the Holy Spirit one God forever and ever. Amen.

#### **SERRA VOCATION PRAYER**

Lord Jesus, Son of the Eternal Father and Mary Immaculate, give to our young people the generosity necessary to follow Your call and the courage to overcome all obstacles to their vocation in life. Give to parents that faith, love, and spirit of sacrifice which will inspire them to offer their children to God's service and to rejoice whenever one of their children is called to the priesthood or the religious life.

Let your example and that of our Blessed Mother and Saint Joseph encourage both young people and parents, and let Your grace sustain them. Amen.

## Friday, July 2 ~ Thirteenth Week in Ordinary Time

**Holy Gospel: Matthew 9:9-13** As Jesus passed by, he saw a man named Matthew sitting at the customs post. He said to him, "Follow me." And he got up and followed him. While he was at table in his house, many tax collectors and sinners came and sat with Jesus and his disciples. The Pharisees saw this and said to his disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners?" He heard this and said, "Those who are well do not need a physician, but the sick do. Go and learn the meaning of the words, I desire mercy, not sacrifice. I did not come to call the righteous but sinners."

**Meditation:** We live in a world where Jesus constantly invites each of us to follow him. And yet, on this day when we celebrate our country's birth, there are many reasons to celebrate the blessings that God has bestowed on our country, and causes for concern about the freedoms we exercise. Does Christ invite us to follow him to view pornography? Does Jesus invite us to follow him by participating in any way in having an abortion? Does Jesus invite us to participate in same-sex marriage? Of course not, as these are contrary to God's laws and the teachings of Jesus Christ. And yet so many Americans – including those who call themselves Christian – regularly participate in these sinful acts and, in doing so, choose not follow Christ. On this day when we celebrate the birth of the United States of America, let us pray that our fellow citizens – men and women of all ages, walks of life, and religious faiths – will turn away from all that separates us from the love of God, and in doing so simply take up Jesus Christ on his personal invitation to each and every one of us when he says: "follow me."

**Prayer:** O God, who through the grace of adoption chose us to be children of light, grant, we pray, that we may not be wrapped in the darkness of error but always be seen to stand in the bright light of truth. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

**Contemplation:** What is God's call on your life? When Jesus saw Matthew sitting at his tax office – no doubt counting his day's profit – Jesus spoke only two words – "follow me." Those two words changed Matthew's life forever, from a self-serving profiteer to a God-loving God-serving apostle who would bring the treasures of God's kingdom to the poor and needy. Jesus says "follow me" to every man and woman on this earth. How do you respond to Jesus' invitation to follow him? Take Christ up on his personal invitation to "follow me," and in doing so let your life be forever changed.

## Know Your Saints

Sts. Peter and Paul ~ June 29 is the Feast Day of Sts. Peter and Paul. As early as the year 258, there is evidence of the tradition of celebrating both saints on the same day. Together, the two saints are the founders of the See of Rome, through their preaching, ministry and martyrdom there. Simon was a fisherman of Galilee and was introduced to the Lord Jesus by his brother Andrew, also a fisherman. Jesus gave him the name Cephas (Petrus in Latin), which means "Rock," because he was to become the rock upon which Christ would build His Church. Peter was a bold follower of the Lord. He was the first to recognize that Jesus was "the Messiah, the Son of the living God," and eagerly pledged his fidelity until death. In his boldness, he also made many mistakes, however, such as losing faith when walking on water with Christ and betraying the Lord on the night of His Passion. Despite his human weaknesses, Jesus chose Peter to shepherd God's flock. The Acts of the Apostles illustrates his role as head of the Church after the Resurrection and Ascension of Christ. Peter led the Apostles as the first Pope and ensured that the disciples kept the true faith. St. Peter spent his last years in Rome, leading the Church through persecution and eventually being martyred in the year 64. He was crucified upside-down at his own request because he claimed he was not worthy to die as his Lord. He was buried on Vatican hill, and St. Peter's Basilica is built over his tomb.

St. Paul was the Apostle of the Gentiles. Through his letters in the New Testament, we learn much about his life and the faith of the early Church. Before receiving the name Paul, he was Saul, a Jewish pharisee who zealously persecuted Christians in Jerusalem. Scripture records that Saul was present at the martyrdom of St. Stephen. Saul's conversion took place as he was on his way to Damascus to persecute the Christians there. As he was traveling along the road, he was suddenly surrounded by a great light from heaven. He was blinded and then heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, why do you persecute me?" He answered: "Who are you, Lord?" Christ said: "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting." Saul continued to Damascus, where he was Baptized, and his sight was restored. He took the name Paul and spent the remainder of his life preaching the Gospel tirelessly to the Gentiles of the Mediterranean world. Paul was imprisoned and taken to Rome, where he was beheaded in the year 67. He is buried in Rome, in the Basilica of St. Paul, outside the walls.

St. Irenaeus ~ was involved in Church controversies in the 2nd century. He was a student of apostolic teachings. As bishop of Lyons, he was concerned with the Gnostics (who took their name from the Greek word for "knowledge") who claimed access to "secret knowledge" imparted by Jesus to only a few disciples. Their teaching attracted and confused many Christians. After investigating the various Gnostic sects and their "secret," Irenaeus showed to what logical conclusions their tenets led. These he contrasted with the teaching of the apostles and the text of Holy Scripture, giving us, in 5 books, a system of theology of great importance to subsequent times. His work, widely-used and translated into Latin, gradually ended the influence of the Gnostics. His Feast Day is June 28.

## THIRTEENTH SUNDAY IN **ORDINARY TIME**

WIS 1:13-15, 2:23-24; PS 30:2, 4, 5-6, 11, 12, 13; 2 COR 8:7, 9, 13-15; MK 5:21-43 OR 5:21-24, 35b-43



Our readings today remind us that our God is a tender and loving God. In our Gospel, Jesus heals an ill child. An anxious and loving father sought after Jesus so that his daughter might be cured of

her illness. As Jesus was traveling to heal her, they got word that the daughter had died. In that deeply painful moment, a moment no parent wants to experience, Jesus turned and said, "Do not be afraid; just have faith." Recall a moment when you felt like you hit rock bottom. Maybe you received devastating news, someone died, you lost your job, you were fighting addiction, or you were suffering mentally, spiritually or physically. Maybe you are living that moment or maybe that moment is yet to come. In that time, imagine Jesus looking at you and saying, "Do not be afraid; just have faith." Remember this verse. May it bring you peace and comfort. Recall that in our First Reading, God does not rejoice in our suffering and death. He rejoices in our faith and our trust in His glorious plan for our lives. Whether we are healed like the little girl in our Gospel in this life, or we carry our suffering with us until we reach the next, if we remain faithful, Jesus will one day say to us, "Little girl or little boy, I say to you, arise!" Today, let us reflect on how much our Good and Gracious God loves us. Remember that whatever we are suffering in this life, do not be afraid; God is right there with us.

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




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
